FEATURED SPEAKERS



SESSION 1

Micro Practice Tools for a Macro World: Social Justice through Direct Practice

Amy M. Alberton, PhD, MSW, Assistant Professor, School of Social Work, Wichita State University

Session Description

Both domestically and internationally, social workers have an ethical obligation to challenge

social injustice. However, incorporating social justice work into direct practice can seem overwhelming even at the best of times. This presentation will provide an overview of social justice and hands-on tools for integrating social justice work into already hectic schedules. As well, it will provide opportunities to reflect on and share how social workers in this community are already incorporating social justice work into frontline practice.

Speaker Bio

Amy M. Alberton, PhD, MSW, received her undergraduate degree in Criminology (with a minor in political science) in 2010, her MSW in 2016, and her PhD in Social Work in 2021, all from the University of Windsor, Ontario, Canada. Dr. Alberton's research agenda is focused on the pursuit of social justice through anti-oppressive practices, programs, and policies. Particularly, the foundation of her area of interest is the elimination of structural violence, including colonialism, or systemic barriers. Notably, between 2017 and 2019, Dr. Alberton served as the principal writer and researcher for the First Nations Youth Suicide Prevention Curriculum which was released online in September 2019. She has presented at more than 20 peer-reviewed and invited conferences, has had nine articles published in peer-reviewed journals.

Dr. Alberton has experience teaching undergraduate and graduate courses in the USA and Canada related to policy, social welfare, direct and indirect social work practice, research (both practice and program evaluation), and statistics. She serves as Managing Editor for Critical Social Work: An Interdisciplinary Journal Dedicated to Social Justice, as a peer reviewer for several academic journals, and as a member of several committees for Wichita State University's School of Social Work.



SESSION 2

See My Color, Acknowledge My Trauma, Change the Outcome Crystal Rozelle-Bennett, LMSW, CEO, THRYVE, LLC

Session Description

In the last several decades, suicide attempts among Black adolescents have increased by 73% while attempts among White youth have decreased. The rate of suicide for Black youth ages 5-12 is double that of their White counterparts.

What is behind this growing crisis? Why aren't we sounding the alarm and doing more to raise awareness and examine the root causes and systemic factors that exist?

During this workshop, participants will evaluate the necessity in acknowledging the role that race plays in the experience of systemic oppression, marginalization, internalized oppression and feelings of hopelessness and helplessness. Strategies to increase safety, break down barriers and practice humility will be presented as well as the use of racial socialization as a protective factor.

SESSION 2, CONTINUED.

Speaker Bio

For the past 25 years **Crystal Rozelle-Bennett** has been driven by her personal experiences of trauma to educate, advocate, and amplify the voices of individuals and communities in order to promote healing and opportunities to move from surviving to thriving. Crystal was the first in her family to attend college and earned a Bachelor's in Arts in Psychology from Wells College, located in Aurora, NY. She went on to earn her Masters in Social Work from Florida State University and currently holds her LMSW.

During her career, Crystal has demonstrated a passion in sharing her experiences in order to help individuals heal from their personal traumas and work alongside professionals to create trauma informed, culturally inclusive and personcentered spaces. Her experiences include advocacy within the child welfare system, oversight of child and youth programs, crisis hotline response, delivery of community based mental health services and implementing trauma informed strategies and programs for school districts. She has been called upon to provide training, coaching and consultation across the nation in the subject areas of Human Trafficking, Suicide Prevention, Motivational Interviewing, Child Trauma & Maltreatment and Racial Trauma. She is a fierce advocate for social justice and leads courageously to dismantle oppressive systems and create equitable and just services, policies and programs.



SESSION 3

City of Wichita Housing and Police: Working Together for a Better Tomorrow Brandy Niblett, LMSW, Senior Housing Specialist, Housing & Community Services Department, City of Wichita **David W. Nienstedt,** Sergeant, Patrol South Community Policing/Homeless Outreach Team, Wichita Police Department



Session Description

As a beacon of change and an aide on the path of peace and social justice, The City of Wichita

Housing & Community Services Department has expanded capacities to identify barriers to housing and ways to partner with community service providers as well as the Wichita Police Department to reduce violent crime, increase safety, and provide housing to the unhoused. Through a new internship offered to area MSW students, a grant to establish case management for individuals experiencing homelessness in a high-crime area of town, and continued leadership stewarding the Housing Choice Voucher Program, our community Housing Department has envisioned change, researched available resources, implemented strategies through collaboration and partnership and witnessed lives changed.

In this session you will learn about the Housing Choice Voucher Program as well as new initiatives the city has implemented in working together towards ending homelessness in our community. We will discuss housing as well as new approaches the city is moving towards with social workers and police working together.

Speaker Bios

Brandy Niblett is a two-time graduate of Wichita State University School of Social Work and started her social work career at COMCARE Children's Services in 2009 as a case manager. Brandy then moved over to work as an Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) case manager at ResCare before returning to school to complete her master's degree, where she completed her master's practicum with the Wichita Child Guidance Center, proving play therapy for children. Upon graduation, Brandy began working at The Salvation Army as a therapeutic foster care worker providing in home supports to foster parents and children in their homes, followed by a position as a case manager for Supportive Services for Veterans Families (SSVF).

Brandy worked with SSVF for four years, successfully building the Wichita office from a staff of two employees to a staff of eight. She was promoted from case manager to Service Coordinator in 2017 where she supervised the Wichita and Hays offices. During her time at SSVF she worked on programing and obtaining CARF accreditation. She worked alongside other homeless providers through the Wichita Continuum of Care (CoC) and Balance of State CoC as well as the VA in collaborating together towards ending Veteran Homelessness.

SESSION 3, CONTINUED.

Brandy came to the City of Wichita in January 2020 as a Housing Specialist with the Housing and Community Services Department. She currently oversees homeless service programs including Emergency Housing Vouchers, Homeless Preference Program, Refugee Program, and Social Work intern program (a collaboration with the WPD Homeless Outreach Team).

When not at work Brandy enjoys spending time with her husband of 19 years and their children and grandchildren. She enjoys going camping and hanging out at the lake during warmer months and bowling with her son during the colder months.

David Nienstedt has been a police officer with the city of Wichita for over 26 years. He began his career with the Wichita Police Department as a reserve officer in March 1995 and was appointed as a full time officer in October 1995.

As a patrol officer David has worked on every shift and at all four patrol bureaus. He spent two years as a beat coordinator in Community Policing in both the Patrol East and South bureaus. He was assigned to the Homeless Outreach Team for three years beginning in 2014 while the unit was still a pilot project. He helped develop team procedures with the unit becoming permanent in 2015. During his career with the city David also spent three years with the Airport Police and Fire Department serving as both a police officer and aircraft rescue fire fighter.

David was promoted to the rank of detective in June 2017. He worked in person crimes in the Domestic Violence/Sex Crimes Unit and property crimes in the Financial Crimes Unit.

David was promoted to sergeant in 2018 and returned to patrol to supervise 2nd watch officers at the South Patrol Bureau. In 2019 he became the supervisor over the South Community Policing Unit and Homeless Outreach Team. During his career David has been a Field Training Officer, assistant firearms range instructor, recruit class mentor, recruiting team member, Mental Health First Aid instructor, and emergency vehicle operations course instructor at the state training academy. He is certified in basic and advanced Crisis Intervention Team training. David has been awarded the Bronze Wreath of Merit, Bronze Wreath of Valor, Civic Achievement award, 20 Year Safe Driver award, 5 year Perfect Attendance Award, Life Saving award, Certificate of Commendation, Kansas Association of Chiefs of Police Silver award, and 19 letters of commendation.

David has spent 17 years working with Kansas Special Olympics, and served on the Torch Run executive council for 13 years. He spent several years coaching both Miracle League Baseball and Kickball, and he enjoys spending family time with his wife of 22 years, and their two children.



SESSION 4

Migration: What Does it Take to Reach the American Dream? Yeni Telles, LMSW, Community Organizer, Sunflower Community Action

Session Description

Our nation is evolving and thriving because of the influence of immigrants. But what does it take for immigrants to reach the American Dream in our current times?

Many people are challenged and have the belief that immigration is a controversial topic because it's related to illegal activities when crossing the border. Migration is associated with criminals and violence. But what is the real reason immigrants come to our Nation?

As agents of change, we are responsible to promote and engage in social justice and value the dignity and worth of a person. Social workers provide services directly to children and families and face the challenges that immigrants of our community face daily.

Immigrants bring with them a few material belongings, but they also carry a heart full of pain, uncertainty, and hope. While integration in our communities our services impact families and communities.

Come and learn about the immigrants in our community. Where are they coming from? What are some of their challenges while integrating to our community? How can they feel supported?

SESSION 4, CONTINUED.

Speaker Bio

Yeni Telles has worked with children and families for more than fifteen years, including Latino families nationally and internationally who have experienced trauma related to substance use, sexual abuse, homelessness, international migration, domestic violence, community violence and poverty. She is collaborating with innovative initiatives focused on services to refugee and immigrant families with a variety of community organizations.

Yeni served as the Director of Saint Francis International Ministries US, a non-profit, child welfare and human services organization. In this role she managed programs in the United States including leading the organization's affiliation with U.N. Global Communications. She managed Migration Ministries which provided services to refugee families in the community. assist children facing removal from their home due to abuse and neglect with legal immigration services. Yeni collaborated with a team of professionals in Central America in developing an Evidence-Based Model to mitigate violence and strengthen families and communities. She collaborates with Lutheran University in El Salvador to support the social work profession through participation in forums and presenting at webinars.

Before her director role, Yeni provided services as a case manager/therapist with the Family Preservation Program. During this time, she provided in home-therapy utilizing evidence-based models including Strengthening Families and Seeking Safety. She was able to break cultural barriers and stigma by engaging immigrant families and addressing generational trauma. Yeni's case management skills have been refined through her work as a case manager at a local hospital where she addresses service gaps and assesses safety with patients and families.

Yeni is an adjunct professor at Wichita State University in the Social Work Department teaching students Ethics, Diversity and Generalist Practices with Children and Families, and Field Practicum. Social justice is a vital social work attribute she promotes through her engagement in the organization, Sunflower Community Action where she is a community organizer. She is also part of the leadership team for the Immigration Advocacy Network (IAN). Yeni is a member of the board of directors and serves as the treasurer of Immigration Support Services Network (ISSN). She is an associate of the Congregation of Saint Joseph.

Yeni was appointed to by Governor Laura Kelly to serve for 3 years in the Kansas Advisory Group on Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention in September of 2020. Born in Mexico, Yeni is the youngest of twelve siblings. She migrated to the United Stated at age 10 and is first-generation high school graduate who furthered her education to include a master's degree, a source of pride to herself and her entire family.
