Prior to your admission to the Teacher Education Program, you should make all your advising appointments in College of Applied Studies Advising (CASA), 978-3300, Corbin 107. Once you have been admitted to the Teacher Education Program, I am your advisor, and you will no longer report to CASA. Instead, you will contact me (preferably by email) when you have questions about your course work or plan of study. In addition, I teach the English methods courses and supervise field experiences, so I will also see you in class and in schools. I look forward to working with you!

# **Requesting an Advising Appointment**

While you are not required to meet with me for advising, I encourage you to do so if you have questions about your program of study. I am happy to meet with you in-person, by phone, or by Zoom. I can also answer your questions via email.

If possible, please schedule your appointment during my office hours (Thursdays 2:30-4:30). When you set up your appointment (Katie.Cramer@wichita.edu), you should include 2-3 dates and times that would work for you, as well as your full name and MyWSU ID.

In the subject line of your email, type your full name followed by a 1-3 word summary of the purpose of your email (e.g., John Smith: Request for Appointment, or Diana Martin: Question about English courses).

If my availability does not fit your schedule, I can be available other days/times of the week, but you will need to allow me plenty of *advance* notice.

Please also keep in mind that I am generally not immediately available to visit with you. Plan to schedule your appointment at least one week in advance, and do not wait until registration periods to meet with me. It's up to you to plan ahead and be proactive about your program of study.

In addition, please check out your folder from CASA (Corbin 107) before arriving for your appointment. You can use your Shocker card to check out your folder and bring it to our meeting.

# **Recommendations & Reminders to Assist You in Your Planning**

- 1. **ENGL 315 Intro to Linguistics:** To move through the program in a timely fashion, please register for **ENGL 315** as soon as possible, <u>no later than Core 1</u>. *It is a prerequisite for ENGL 317.*
- 2. **ENGL 317 History of the English Language:** Register for **ENGL 317** immediately after completing ENGL 315. These courses are offered somewhat irregularly, and there are no substitutions for them at WSU. Take them as soon as you can, starting no later than Core 1 for ENGL 315.
- 3. **ENGL 330 Nature of Fiction** has multiple sections available each semester. It is also sometimes offered during the summer. Please consider taking this course <u>later</u> in your academic career simply because it is so readily available. Take other courses that are not offered as frequently earlier in your program.
- 4. CI 616 Literature for Adolescents is only offered once a year, usually in the fall.
- 5. **ENGL 680 Theory and Practice in Composition** complements Core 3 course work very well and is usually offered at a time that does not conflict with CI 435E.
- 6. **Starting Core 1**: You must begin Core 1 in a fall semester. Core 2 occurs during spring; Core 3 in fall; and Core 4 during spring. No exceptions. If you need to take a year-long break from the program, set up an advising appt.
- 7. **Core 4 Teaching Internship:** You must complete all course work prior to starting Core 4. Your teaching internship is full-time in your school—every day, all day. Do not plan to take any additional courses beyond Core 4 requirements.
- 8. **Minimum Grades**: You must earn a B- or better in all CI and CESP courses in order to be recommended for licensure.

# **Registration Tips**

- 1. Review updated semester and academic calendars (and deadlines) on WSU's Office of the Registrar's website.
- 2. **Review your course work** in your <u>Degree Works Audit</u> in MyWSU, and determine which courses you still need and when you plan to take them.
  - a. Log in to MyWSU.
  - b. Select the My Classes tab.
  - c. Scroll down and in the center of the page click on **Run My Degree Works Audit**.
  - d. If you have questions about Degree Works, please visit this FAQ page.
- 3. After reviewing your course work in Degree Works, note which courses you still need and when you plan to take them. **Create a realistic plan** for yourself that takes into consideration your responsibilities outside of school (work, family, hobbies, etc.).
- 4. **Review the <u>Schedule of Courses</u> online**, and **plan course schedule**. If you notice problems in the schedule (e.g., two required courses overlapping—and only one section of each), email me immediately!
- If you have questions about your general education course work, contact the <u>College of Applied Studies</u> <u>Advising (CASA) office</u> at (316) 978-3300 to review the advising you received prior to admission to the Teacher Education Program. I can advise you regarding your education and English course work, but CASA office advisors are better equipped to answer questions about general education requirements.
