The team was impressed by the Advanced Generalist Curriculum and noted several strengths of the program. The concerns raised were mostly in the area of resources to sustain the size and growth of the program. We have addressed these concerns in the School's response to the Report and feel optimistic about the final determination, which will occur at the June meeting of the CSWE Commission on Accreditation. Although we have to wait until the middle of June, the faculty and staff of the School feel a sense of relief that this part of the process is over! I want to thank all of you faculty, staff, students, and community partners — for your commitment to the School and for your many contributions to this demanding process.

Once again, we look forward to the ceremonies of Spring and to celebrating the accomplishments of our students, particularly the graduating students of the BSW and MSW Programs. This year will be an especially poignant year as we say farewell to Dr. Elwin Barrett, who is retiring after 32 years on the faculty of the School. As I noted in the last Newsletter. 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Student Highlight Emily Miller

March 17, 2007 marked the 4th anniversary of the start of the war in Iraq, as well as the 40th anniversary of the historic March on the Pentagon during the Vietnam War.

More than 1,000 protests took place in the United States between March 17th and March 20th. I was fortunate enough to be able to attend "March on the Pentagon" in Washington D.C. on Saturday, March 17th. Iraq war protesters began gathering early Saturday morning across from the Lincoln Memorial, waiting for the march to begin at noon. Buses from all over the country poured in as more than 20,000 protesters assembled. Unfortunately, the East Coast was hit with a bad winter storm the night before and over 60 buses from all over the country were unable to make it.

Held back by police on foot, horseback and motorcycle, angry war-supporters threatened and bullied people protesting. Gold Star families, active duty service members and veterans (including Iraq) led the march from the Lincoln Memorial to the Pentagon. The bridge over the Potomac River was lined with war supporters so angry they spit on people, ripped signs out of people's hands, yelled racist comments to Arab and Muslim protesters, pushed elderly people, yelled horrible things at parents whose children were killed in the war, and at one point punched a grandma who was part of a group from Minnesota. I'm very proud to say that I never saw a protester respond in violence.

Once at the Pentagon, speakers such as Cindy Sheehan, former U.S. Attorney General

Ramsey Clark, Congresswoman Cynthia McKinney, and several Iraq War veterans and active duty service members delivered powerful speeches. Immortal Technique, a progressive hip-hop artist, was scheduled to perform, but like thousands of other protesters trying to get to the Pentagon, he was denied access by riot police, who demanded he leave.

This experience has not only been one of the best things to happen to me, but it's changed my life. To be amongst 20,000 people who are so passionate about the same thing creates an amazing sense of solidarity and gives hope to people who feel like they're working by them self to end this war. WE NEED YOUR HELP!

InterHab and its member organizations, such as Starkey, are joining to gather 100,000 signatures on a statewide petition **urging legislators and the governor to support multiyear funding for disability services in Kansas.**

In January, the interim Legislative Budget Committee, comprised of leaders from both the House and Senate, proposed a multi-year funding plan for community developmental disability services that would help close the funding gap providers are experiencing. The plan calls for an investment of \$70 million dollars in state funds over the next three years to boost reimbursement to community providers and eliminate waiting lists.

Why is this important to Starkey?

Starkey has struggled with high staff turnover rates during the past several years due to chronic underfunding by the state. The most recent staff turnover reports indicate an 84 percent turnover rate among staff in day programs, and 57 percent among staff in community living. **Starkey is not alone in this challenge.** Organizations across Kansas have faced a similar dilemma. Consistent staffing creates continuity and the assurance of quality care for the individuals at Starkey. Personal relationships contribute to progress in individual lives, and peace of mind for family members.

How can you help?

You do not have to be 18 years old to sign it, nor do you have to be a Kansan (as long as you are affiliated with someone receiving disability services in Kansas). Multiple members of the same household can sign the petition. You can be of help in gathering additional signatures by considering the following:

Our volunteers get the same respect as our professional staff since we go through the same thorough process to find and train our volunteers: Application, References, Interview, Orientation, Training and Placement.
