We are thrilled to introduce three new full-time faculty members to the School of Social Work! They are Fred Besthorn, PhD; Lisa Hines, PhD; and Karen Countryman-Roswurm, LMSW.

Fred H Besthorn, PhD, LMSW, MDiv

Dr. Fred H. Besthorn holds a BA in education from Sterling College, Sterling Kansas. He also holds an MSW and PhD in social work from the University of Kansas and a Master of Divinity from Grace Theological Seminary.



Before coming to the Wichita State University School of Social Work, Dr. Besthorn was for eight years Associate Professor of Social Work at the University of Northern Iowa, Cedar Falls, Iowa. Dr. Besthorn has taught across the social work curriculum but in the last number of years has concentrated on graduate and undergraduate courses in Social Policy, Administrative Practice, Community, Organization and Individual Practice, Human Behavior in the Social Environment, and Spirituality and Social Work Practice - to name but several. Prior to his tenure at the University of Northern Iowa, Dr. Besthorn was Assistant Professor of Social Work at Washburn University, Topeka, Kansas.

Dr. Besthorn has training and experience in the faith community, psychotherapy, environmental activism, spirituality, direct practice, corrections and law enforcement, peace studies, social policy, legislative advocacy, and social, economic and environmental justice.

Dr. Besthorn has over 40 published articles, book chapters, and monographs and has presented dozens of scholarly papers at both national and international conferences. He is the author, along with Dr. Katherine vanWormer, of *Human Behavior and the Social Environment: Groups, Communities and Organizations* (Oxford University Press, 2010). His creative and scholarly interests over the past years include continuing to develop a theoretical framework and empirical base for the integration of a deep ecological awareness with social work policy and practice. This entails conducting research on the relationship between environmental degradation and the social, physical, economic and spiritual impact on disadvantaged and/or marginalized populations.

He is the founder of a new social work organization entitled *The Global Alliance for a Deep-Ecological Social Work*. This group is made up of concerned social workers from around the world who share a commitment to incorporating a deeper environmental awareness into traditional social work practice domains. The organization has a web site at <u>www.ecosocialwork.org</u> and held its first North American conference on social work and the environment in 2001 in Washington, D.C. The organization has become an important resource for practitioners and educators seeking ways to strengthen social work's commitment to environmental concerns.

In his free time, Dr. Besthorn relishes spending time with his daughter and fiancée while enjoying his hobby of ballroom dancing and riding his Harley neither of which he does with great skill. Dr. Besthorn is a native Kansan and is excited about his return to Kansas and the many wonderful opportunities that a great institution of higher learning like Wichita State University offers to both students and faculty.

search activities. I am so pleased to tell you that we were able to hire three outstanding faculty members who joined the School at the beginning of fall semester. Veronica Pyles

BSW student Veronica Ealey Pyles received an award from the McNair Foundation for having the highest GPA among this year's students, and for her presentation on Clinical Assessment of Eye Movement desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) effectiveness. EMDR is a neurotherapeutic technique for the treatment of Post Traumatic Stress disorder, common among assault victims and military vets. She did a survey of practitioners in the region who use the tech nique to gauge their perception of the effectiveness, and to assess what other techniques are used by those working with these issues.

City. After high school, my family decided to move to South Carolina. I attended the University of South Carolina for my Master of Social Work and Doctor of Philosophy in Social Work degrees. I have never lived in the Midwest but everything I have heard about it is true. Everyone has been very friendly and very helpful. I made a good decision by moving here.

Multiculturalism and tolerance are important values in my life. Living in cities like New York and San Francisco really helped me to become a well rounded person who is accepting of people and their differences. Many groups express their culture through food, music, and art. These creative expressions are important to me. I am a foodie who enjoys Asian American cuisine. Also I'm a huge fan of Julia Child who specialized in French cuisine, but who isn't? I come from a family of great cooks, who prepared mostly soul food, but other cuisines as well. I started cooking as a young child helping my mom in the kitchen while she made breakfast, lunch or dinner. Cooking and talking about food was how my mom and I bonded. My dad liked to cook too, mostly breakfast on Sundays. Recently, I have found myself wanting to cook more vegetarian recipes with vegetables that I know I hated as a child.

One of my first jobs in NYC at age 14 was a summer counselor for kids in different neighborhoods around the city. The experience working with kids and other teens in small groups was my first introduction to helping others. Prior to teaching, I had a 20 year career as a medical social worker working with poor communities mostly on the East Coast in community health centers. When I was 28, my best friend, David, disclosed his HIV+ status. He said he was going to beat the disease by staying around for the cure. Unfortunately, he died in 1995 and I was devastated. We have to find cures for diseases like HIV and cancer; our communities simply can not afford to lose the human capitol.

My experience with David helped create my research interests include eliminating health disparities, perinatal substance abuse and social work with groups. Over the next few years, I plan to continue publishing in the area of health disparities and health equity. Currently, I am working on an article from a study I conducted on what it means to be pregnant and addicted. A second article from the same study will determine the effectiveness of substance abuse programs designed for pregnant women. There is an increase in face to face and online support groups designed for a variety of problems. I want to further determine the variety of group modalities, the efficacy of these groups and the therapeutic factors associated with both types of groups. Lastly, I am developing the multicultural motivational strengths perspective as a social work modality for use with vulnerable populations such as immigrants, the LGBTQ community and other oppressed groups.

Karen Countryman-Roswurm, LMSW

Greetings Social Workers! My name is Karen Countryman-Roswurm (aka Professor Roswurm) and I am excited to introduce myself as one of the newest faculty members in

the School of Social Work. This semester I am teaching Social Work 710 Micro Human Behavior and the Social Environment, as well as, two sections of Social Work 720 Field Practicum I. And I must say, I look forward to, and I enjoy, class with the students who are enrolled in such courses!

Though this Fall Semester is young, I am impressed with student's immediate willingness to make connections with each other and engage in interactions which create a safe and encouraging environment to learn and explore. It is truly apparent that that doing so fosters an environment which brings about a willingness to think critically, and share openly, thoughts and knowledge regarding deep and systemic Social Work practice issues. In addition, I appreciate the response and the opportunity to bring my passion, experience, and commitment to Generalist Social Work Practice into the classroom. To give you all a little background, I am a Licensed Master Social Worker just hours and a test away from earning my LSCSW. Furthermore, I am a Doctoral Candidate in the Community Psychology Program here at Wichita State University. But, perhaps more influential than "credentials" is my more than 12 years of experience directly serving young people and families.

I began my career in Social Work at the Wichita Children's Home as a Street Outreach Worker. It was there that my true interests and expertise emerged and where much of my heart and commitment to a population will always remain. Building on such experiences and knowledge, I have since developed my passion for Social Work with many agencies locally, regionally, and nationally as an individual, family, and group therapist; a founder and coordinator of youth programs; a researcher; a community organizer, and an advocate/human rights activist. I realized early on in my career that if I were to truly address an issue and make a sustainable difference, I not only had to work directly with the target population, but I also had to engage in various activities ranging from research (such as that with the Midwest Longitudinal Study of Homeless Adolescents) to working with Federal grant funders in preparing proposals, writing grants, and chairing panels of grant reviews; and from assisting in the development of Public Policy (such as Senate Bill 353 regarding Kansas State Law on Human Trafficking) to organizing community collaboration (such as that with the Anti-Sexual Exploitation Roundtable for Community Action). Thus, with an ultimate passion and commitment to more effectively serving the most marginalized, I value the importance of bridging the gap between direct practice, academia, research, and policy.

All of these professional experiences are a real life illustration of what it means to be a Generalist Social Worker and I am thrilled to bring such work, such real world practice, into the classroom. More so, I am grateful for the gift to "fly" with each and every one of you on this journey called Social Work. We should all feel honored and proud to be Social Workers...I know I am... it is what I've always "wanted to do so badly."

Bridges Out of Poverty

Presentation: This program will introduce the participant to some of the concepts from the Bridges out of Poverty training curriculum developed by Dr. Ruby Payne and her organization AHAProcess. Mr. Johnson will take the participant through a co-investigative process of the mental models of Generational Poverty, Middle Class and the Wealthy in America. The goal of discovering our own mental models of the social classes begins us on the journey to reaching a deeper understanding of how people operate largely from their own set of rules based on the class from which they came. The participant will explore some of the Hidden Rules of class, and by creating the mental models the stark differences will be illustrated among the three classes in America.

Learning objectives: 1) Identify the driving forces of the three classes. 2) Gain an understanding that we all operate from the Hidden Rules of the class from which we came. 3) Know the differences in the social classes to assist in better communication among the classes.

Presenter: Danny Johnson currently serves in the training coordinator Staff Development Specialist position at Social and Rehabilitation Services at the Wichita Regional office. Mr. Johnson has spent his entire 20-plus years of service in the human services arena, from the early years as a substance abuse counselor to an independent living therapist in youth corrections. He has been with the Wichita SRS office for 8 years. He has spent the majority of his career in training and professional development, and says of the Dr. Ruby Payne's Bridges out of Poverty training that he has never taught any subject material such as this. He has watched this powerful information transform lives. His unique perspective of not only working with people from generational poverty but also from his personal experiences in growing up poor offer an intriguing look into Generational Poverty.


