The Association of Social Work Boards is a national Social Work organization responsible for creating licensing tests for Social Workers across the USA and Canada.

Dr. Elwin Barrett (pictured on the far right) was President of the AASSWB (American Association of State Social Work Boards) in 1983-1984.

In 1999, the organization changed their name to ASWB, dropping "American"

and "state" in order to be more inclusive.

Speakers at the Anniversary Celebration remembered the early years when licensing and national examinations were provided by the NASW (National Association of Social Workers). A number of the members didn't feel right about the professional association spearheading the exam, so they decided a second organization was needed.



There are now members of ASWB from forty-nine states, Washington, D.C. the Virgin Islands and several Canadian provinces..

Greetings!

Our academic year began on August 18th and we have been involved in many exciting activities over the past several weeks. Approximately 50 field instructors attended orientation to field supervision on August 26th. We were pleased to see so many of our instructors, and were especially pleased that many attended the All-School Fall Convocation that followed.

Speaking of the Fall Convocation, this year's event was the first ever for the School. We filled the auditorium in Lindquist Hall as faculty, staff, students, and field instructors celebrated the beginning of the new academic year. In my remarks to the assembly, I noted that social work is one of the fastest growing professions in the United States, and is expected to grow 30% by 2010. I also shared some key findings of a recent NASW study. These findings, which have significant implications for the growth and health of the profession, include the fact that the current social work labor force is aging, and that growth will come through recruitment into the profession, by way of our BSW and MSW programs. Sadly, even as our need for professionals is growing, the profession is not keeping pace with population trends in our ability to attract social workers of

Welcome Back! I am so excited to have begun the new 2005-2006 school year as BSW Program Director. I think about the over 150 students in the program this semester and their renewed commitment to their social work education here at WSU School of Social Work. Many of you are just beginning this journey in social work and many of you are knocking on graduation's door. Many of you are teaching

color. We must do better in our programs and community outreach to attract a diverse group of students to our profession. In light of this need, I have asked our new BSW Program Director, Courtney Boettcher, to explore ways to increase our visibility in the community and to strengthen efforts to recruit students.

The School of Social Work is expanding in other areas, and enrollment is increasing in both the BSW and MSW Programs. Our MSW Program has a recordbreaking 110 students enrolled this year. In the area of research, Dr. Joanne Levine received a grant to develop webcam communication to rural practicum instructors and to begin development of a web-based portal for delivery of continuing education. We are extremely excited about this new venture and will tell you more as it progresses. In other news, we are very happy and relieved that Dr. Cathleen Lewandowski has rejoined the faculty after a one-year assignment in Iraq.

Last, but certainly not least, the MSW Program's initial accreditation is up in June, 2007. That means that we will be undergoing reaffirmation in the coming year, with a site visit expected in early spring of 2007. We will be working on the self-study and all the other aspects of preparing for re-accreditation this year. We cannot do this without the support

and assistance of the practice community, our students, and the entire faculty and staff of the School of Social Work. Stay tuned for further news on the reaffirmation effort, and for opportunities to participate and provide feedback and support. For the coming year, the reaccreditation of our MSW Program will be center stage, which is both exciting and challenging.

As I write of these exciting times for the School, I do so in the midst of the horror and devastation of the New Orleans hurricane.. Desmond Tutu once said:

"Compassion is not just feeling with someone, but seeking to change the situation. Frequently people think compassion and love are merely sentimental. No! They are very demanding. If you are going to be compassionate, be prepared for action!"

These are times that call for compassion, action, and working together. As the Kenyan proverb states, sticks in a bundle are unbreakable! I am looking forward to working with each of you to do what we can as educators, students, and professionals to make our School and community a symbol of excellence, hope, and progress.
