The Social Action, Violence, and Inequities (SAVI) research group, lead by Dr. Jennifer Demers, welcomed two new graduate students, Carolyn Allred and Robin Moore. Sa-

vannah Redfern also joined the lab as an undergraduate research assistant. The lab is wrapping up several projects, including: examining the impact of sexual assault allegations during the 2020 U.S. presidential election on voter decisions and survivor outcomes; exploring survivors' decisions to disclose victimization experiences on social media; surveying student and community experiences of "stealthing"; and investigating the potential effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on the work and wellbeing of first responders to interpersonal violence. Second year doctoral student, Madi DeFrain, presented research at three professional conferences this year (SCRA, SWPA, & SPSSI), while SAVI undergraduate, Ava Munzinger-DeFrain, and recent graduate, Breanna Johnston, won 2nd place in their category at WSU's undergraduate research forum. Recent MA graduate, Adrianne Ralston, also presented at the SPSSI conference and spent the summer at a practicum with the Center for Research for Infant Birth and Survival at KU-Wichita.

The SAVI lab recently received their first grant, \$15,000 from the Wichita Medical Research & Education Foundation to evaluate the efficacy

of a community-based medical forensic services program for victims of intimate partner violence. This work is done in partnership with Hope Medical Forensic Services.



The Community Response to Sexual Assault (CRSA) Lab is led by Dr. Rachael Goodman-Williams. We have just about put a lid on data collection for our Prevention Curriculum

Project, having interviewed 20

sexual assault/domestic violence educators in the Midwest about their work providing prevention education services to middle and high school students. We are also continuing our work on Alternative Reporting Options for sexual assault survivors with Adventist HealthCare Shady Grove Medical Center and the Montgomery County Sherriff's Office in Maryland, and Dr. Goodman-Williams is preparing to take a trip out east to collect data with those community partners. In collaboration with Dr. Katy Holland at University of Nebraska Lincoln, Dr. Goodman-Williams received a research grant from the Center for Institutional Courage, which Dr. Goodman-Williams and Dr. Holland will use to survey Title IX Coordinators about their perceptions of trauma-informed care and survivor-centered mandatory reporting policies. This fall, the CRSA lab welcomed new doctoral student, Sam Smith, and two new undergraduate research assistants, Estella Armenta and Kristy Lowry, who have joined second year doctoral student Kat Fishwick.

The Behavioral Community Research and Action

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Team (BCRAT), led by Dr. Rhonda Lewis, was busy conducting a community needs and asset assessment survey and listening sessions in the community on Racial and Ethnic minority

involvement in the juvenile justice system. The results were presented at a virtual conference for Team Justice, a local advisory council. The results were also presented at the Society for Community Research and Action in June. Rosaline Canare presented her 2nd year research project at GRASP and won 2nd place. Stormy Malone and Rosalind Canare presented their research at the Midwestern Psychological Association in May virtually. Dr. Lewis was a part of the presidential opening at the Society for Community Research and Action Biennial Conference in June 2021. BCRAT continues to provide capacity building to community agencies in the community. Hana Shahin and Keyondra Brooks graduated in May. We welcomed Joshua Villa to the BCRAT family as an incoming student. Ngoc Vuong, is working with Dr. Lewis as the Wichita Undergraduate Diversity Scholars Award in Psychology recipient (WUDSAP). Vangsness were awarded funding by the FAA to begin later this year. They will be assisting the FAA with developing a Human Error taxonomy and working to implement a recent FAA certification process for new aviation systems.

Dr. Baldwin was able to complete important repairs and updates to the department's driving simulator.



In unfortunate news, despite our best efforts to find a permanent position, **Dr. Traci Hart** left her role as Director of Optimize. The good news is that she is still at Wichita State. She accepted a full-time position at NIAR, so we still get to work with her and see her around.

Dr. Joel Suss did an excellent job of continuing HF Tea Time entirely virtually via Zoom due to the pandemic.



HF STUDENTS AND FACULTY GATHER FOR VIRTUAL TEA TIME The Wichita Auditory Research Group (WARG) Lab lead by Dr. Carryl Baldwin conducted research on issues such as how people understand advanced automation systems in vehicles, using EEG to better understand the benefits of AR/VR training and continued work sponsored by NHTSA examining the necessary level of vigilance and vigilance maintenance strategies for Level 2 and Level 3 partially automated vehicles. Dr. Baldwin gave an invited presentation as part of the International Neuroergonomics Webinar series and continues to be on the organizing committee for the Neuroergonomics Conference set to take place virtually in September 2021.

The Regional Institute of Aging, also led by Dr. Baldwin conducted several focus groups examining the strategies older adults were using to cope with social isolation due to the pandemic.

Taylor Shupsky continued his internship at Basic Commerce & Industries and Kevin Morales continued his internship at National Institute for Aviation Research. Shivani Nagrecha conducted research examining the mental workload and stress associated with nuisance

The Visual Perception & Cog**nition Lab (VPC)**, directed by Dr. Rui Ni, continues its active research on visual perception and cognition in 3D environments, perceptual

learning, driving, and aging. Dr. Ni is continuing his active collaboration

with colleagues in other institutions on a variety of projects, including research on working memory, visual attention, depth perception, and perceptual learning.

The Applied Cognition & Expertise (ACE) Lab, directed by Dr. Joel Suss, continued its research on expertise in applied domains. The lab acquired a video-based law enforcement judgment-and

-decision-making simulator. The simulator is part of a grant awarded by the National Institute of Justice and the lab collected data aimed at investigating the effect of online cognitiveskill training on police officers' decision making. Monica Connelly completed a 6-month internship for Harley-Davidson and was their first ever Human Factors intern! Second-year graduate student Dakota Scott was selected for the competitive Naval Research Enterprise Internship Program.



The Challenge, Metacognition, and Perception (ChaMP) Lab, directed by Dr. Lisa Vangsness, has gotten a very strong start and continues to grow. Dr. Lisa

on two grants including the NASA/EPSCoR Partnership Development Grant and the Regional Institute on Aging Interdisciplinary Grant. Rachel Sutton won Ronald McNair Graduate Fellowships in 2020 and 2021. Additionally, Dr. Vangsness is continuing her statistical consultation work with colleagues at WSU and abroad. She recently gave an invited symposia at ABAI on multi-level modeling and her talk was selected to be offered in perpetuity for continuing education credits. Dr. Vangsness will also be funding an undergraduate student on an NSF Future of Work grant in collaboration with the College of Engineering to evaluate percep-

tions of safety and teamwork among human-automation teams in manufacturing contexts.

The Vision and Accessibility Lab, directed by Dr. Quan Lei, is also growing after being

Name: **Bill Bui**

Location: Honeywell Aerospace Title: R&D Scientist (Human Factor's Masters Intern)

I was a HF researcher in the Human Machine Interface team. I worked on a myriad of projects such as touchscreen displays, Human Factors Design Standards, voice detection, flight tests, and connected worker solutions. I learned time management skills (juggling multiple projects), aerospace domain knowledge, data analysis, and communication skills. Our core HF courses (Human Factors Methods and Software Psychology) and Mathematical Modeling in R were very helpful for my internship. Overall, I had a great experience interning at Honeywell! the VA, and evidence-based practices.

Location: KU School of Medicine— Neuropsychology

I did a significant amount of neuropsychological testing, but I was also able to gain experience with full neuropsychological evaluations as well. While there was some overlap with clinical presentations seen at the VA, I was able to see some rarer neurological and neurodegenerative disorders at this site. Additionally, I gained experience with tele-testing due to COVID-19 limitations. Didactics included a variety of neuropsychology-related topics as well as fact findings to help prepare for board certification in the future. I also got involved in research projects and presented it (virtually) at national conferences.

Under the supervision of two neuropsychologists, I conducted neuropsychological evaluations

with Veterans to assess for cognitive changes. Evaluations consisted of a clinical interview, neuropsychological testing, scoring, lots of report writing, and providing feedback on the results. I gained experience with a variety of clinical presentations including neurodegenerative disorders, mild traumatic brain injuries, and PTSD. This is my second consecutive internship at the Naval Information Warfare Center (NIWC). I applied through the Naval Research Enterprise Internship Program. I collaborated with professors and students from the Arizona State Human Systems Engineering PhD program and senior research scientists from NIWC on the development of a cyber-behavior model. We analyzed data from a large red-team network penetration experiment. I learned about cyber attacker behavior when searching for vulnerabilities, running reconnaissance, and exploiting systems in a network. I learned how to apply qualitative data analysis methods (e.g., a thematic analysis) on large datasets when working in a team, how to communicate research methods and statistics to those without a background in research methods and statistics, and how to effectively juggle multiple projects. Taking Human Factors Methods and completing my 2YP was helpful when I conducted gualitative research methods and conducting literature reviews.
