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College of Health Professions Overview

The College of Health Professions (CHP), founded in 1970, is one of seven degree-granting colleges at Wichita State University. The Health Management program is housed within the Department of Public Health Sciences, one of seven departments in the College of Health Professions. The Department of Public Health Sciences offers the following degrees, certificates and minor programs:

- Master of Arts (M.A.) in Aging Studies
- Master in Health Administration
- <u>Dual Accelerated Bachelor's to Master's in Aging Studies</u>
- Dual Accelerated Bachelor's to Master's in Health Administration
- Graduate certificates in public health, aging studies and health administration
- <u>Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree in Health Management with concentrations in Aging Studies, Health Administration, and Public Health</u>
- Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree in Health Science
- Minors in aging studies, health management, health science and public health
- <u>Undergraduate certificates in aging studies</u>, health management, health science and public health science
- The Administrator-in-Training (AIT) program for senior services (long-term care administration).

The College resides on the WSU campus in Ahlberg Hall, a 105,000 square foot building constructed in 1980 specifically for the College and its programs. Ahlberg Hall contains general purpose classrooms, lecture halls, instructional classrooms/laboratories, a multi-purpose Instructional Services Laboratory (ISL) with multimedia classrooms, a distance education classroom, computer classrooms, and computer- and media-assisted instructional technology for CHP students. Students have computer, internet, and e-mail access through the College's ISL.

The faculty and staff of the College of Health Professions have worked hard to develop a strategic plan for the College, as well as a mission, vision, and set of core values which reflect a renewed commitment to excellence in health professions education! Bachelor of Science in Health Management

It provides details about the academic and administrative mechanisms specific to the BSHM major. As new policies and procedures are developed or revised, updates will be provided. This handbook will be a valuable resource during your studies.

Association of University Programs in Health Administration (AUPHA)



The BSHM program at WSU was selected as a candidate for AUPHA Certification in summer 2023 and completed the self-study phase in academic year (AY) 2024. AUPHA Certified Undergraduate program members are recognized for withstanding rigorous peer review, where curricula, faculty, and educational outcomes are critically examined. Certification distinguishes a program from its peers, attracting prospective students and their families seeking a reliable investment in their future.

Programs seeking AUPHA certification must undergo a process similar to other specialty program accreditations, including an extensive self-study detailing the program's structure, educational processes, and assessment mechanisms based on AUPHA and Undergraduate Program Committee (UPC) criteria. An external peer panel conducts a thorough review, culminating in a virtual review session around the AUPHA Annual Meeting. The panel's report and recommendations inform the certification decision and drive program improvements.

WSU received favorable feedback from the AUPHA certification review committee and the AUPHA Certification Committee and expects to be designated an AUPHA-certified program in October 2024.

Career Areas

Career options for health management professionals are abundant and diverse, encompassing roles such as hospital management, senior living community administration, quality improvement, infectious disease control, and community health education. A degree in health management equips students with the skills needed for employment in clinical care, public health organizations, and aging programs/services.

A strong academic foundation is crucial for entering the health management field. Approximately 100,000 individuals currently serve in health management roles, from middle management to CEO positions. In Kansas, the largest growth areas are health services, educational services, and business services. Employment of medical and health services managers is projected to grow 28 percent from 2022 to 2032, much faster than the average for all occupations. There is a significant need for dedicated, well-qualified individuals in healthcare, as the public health sector faces a workforce shortage, particularly in community healthcare policy, management, assessment, and practice. The median wage for all medical and health services managers in 2023 is \$110,680 per year. The lowest 10 percent earned less than \$67,900, and the highest 10 percent earned more than \$216,750.*

Graduates from the Bachelor of Science in Health Management program can hold various job titles, such as Directors, Program Coordinators, Program Managers, Health Educators, Health Promotion Managers, Public Health Educators, Grant Writers, Policy Analysts, Program Administrators, and Program Evaluators. While job titles may vary, the required skill set is similar, including business and management knowledge in healthcare, quantitative and analytic skills, quality of care, long-term care management, public health management, leadership, change management, and special populations. Local employers seek employees skilled in coalition building, critical thinking, problem-solving, community assessment, computer technology, and interpersonal communication. The BSHM program faculty are dedicated to preparing outstanding graduates for the complex and dynamic healthcare system.

Program Overview

The Bachelor of Science in Health Management prepares you to plan, direct, and coordinate medical and health services, adapting to changes in healthcare laws, regulations, and technology. healthcare is a business with all the challenges of effective operations. As a healthcare manager, you will need strong business skills combined with a commitment to service.

This fast-paced field requires managers who can apply creative approaches to healthcare delivery and support services. If you aim to impact clinical healthcare, public health, or aging services, this program is for you. The BS in Health Management also prepares students for graduate studies in healthcare administration, public health, or aging studies.

Degree Planning

Your preparation for a career in Health Management is a four-year process requiring at least 120 credit hours. Choosing a major can be challenging. When you choose Health Management, you'll be admitted to the College of Health Professions and assigned an advisor to help you meet general education and degree requirements. Regular meetings with your advisor will help you make the best use of your opportunities in Health Management, whether you focus on Health Administration, Public Health, or Aging Studies.

The HM program includes three preparatory courses: PHS 100 Intro to Aging Studies, PHS 101 Intro to Public Health, and PHS 310 Intro to US Health Service Systems. These courses will give you a feel for a career in health management and help you choose a concentration. Planning and consulting with advisors and faculty are crucial. You must consider three areas in your degree planning:

- 1. The University's General Education Program requirements and graduation requirements.
- 2. The HM program's coursework requirements and standards for the B.S. in Health Management.
- 3. Minor requirements if you choose to pursue one (highly encouraged).

These three areas account for about 87% of the 120 credits needed for a degree. This percentage may vary if you've transferred credits or depending on your minor selection. Free electives may be as limited as nine credits.

Taking an active role in planning your degree path is essential. Our faculty advising system is designed to empower you in this process.



General Education Program Overview

All undergraduates must master a core of skills as a common foundation for their major studies. In addition, the general education program is designed to develop an understanding and appreciation of the richness and diversity of human achievements in the arts, humanities and sciences.

The College of Health Professions Advising Center provides advising services on general education requirements. Students who entered WSU before the Fall of 2020 can fulfill the general education requirements established at that time. Below is a brief overview of the general education program requirements. The requirements for graduation are detailed in the Wichita State University Undergraduate Catalog. The Undergraduate Catalog should be consulted for complete information on general education requirements.

General Education Requirements

General Education Program requirements at Wichita State follow the KBOR system-wide General Education Program framework and are comprised of 34-35 credit hours organized in six discipline-based "buckets" and an institutionally designated bucket. A student who satisfies all seven buckets will complete the General Education Program.

The four courses in Buckets 1-3 must be completed within the first 48 credit hours of enrollment with a grade of C- or better. Foundation courses cover the fundamental skills needed throughout college and should be taken at the very beginning of a student's studies.

Note: Some general education courses can count for both the General Education Program requirements and program/college requirements. Students should work with their advisor to determine the most efficient path.

Program Preparatory Courses

In addition to your general education requirements, the HM program requires the completion of program preparatory courses, which include one course in Medical Terminology, PHS 100 Intro to Aging Studies, PHS 101 Introduction to Public Health, and PHS 310, Introduction to the U.S. Health Services System. All preparatory coursework must be completed with a grade of "C-" (1.7 GPA) or better.

Courses recommended to fulfill the medical terminology preparatory course, select one:

- MLS 203-Medical Terminology (2 credits)
- MLS303-Medical Terminology (3 credits)

Professional Curriculum

The Health Management curriculum has been designed to reflect the profession's increasing demands for an extended and multi-contextual knowledge and skill set appropriate to the maturing healthcare field. The curriculum prepares graduates for entry-level positions in the acute care, long-term care, and public healthcare sectors. We continue to evaluate the curriculum to ensure it meets the needs of the students and the practice community.

Students are advised to choose one of the four (4) concentrations (aging studies, public health, health administration, or health science) early in their progress toward the degree to avoid taking extra or unnecessary classes. Students should select a concentration before enrolling in any concentration specific courses.

Degree Concentrations

- The aging studies concentration has two options to prepare students for either a career in aging services or for management in senior living communities. Both options prepare students for graduate education in aging studies.
 - The <u>general aging studies</u> (AGEG) option prepares students for a variety of entry level positions in senior centers, and nonprofit or for-profit aging organizations.
 - The <u>senior living management</u> (AGESL) option prepares students to complete the administrator in training practicum or operator's license after completion of the BS in health management. This concentration can be taken for credit towards the dual accelerated bachelor's to master's degree in aging studies.
- The <u>public health</u> (PH) concentration prepares students for a variety of entry level positions in state and local health departments or health-related nonprofit and for-profit organizations and graduate education in public health.
- The <u>health administration</u> (HA) concentration prepares students for a variety of entry level management positions in nonprofit and for-profit clinical healthcare organizations and graduate education in health administration.
- The <u>health science</u> (HS) concentration prepares students for a variety of professional healthcare positions providing clinical, laboratory, and sales support through government, academic, and private organizations.

Program Learning Objectives

- 2. <u>Analytic Assessment</u>: Use healthcare information for analysis and decision-making.

- 4. <u>Evidence-Based Practice and Quality Improvement</u>: Demonstrate how to connect and use data to promote, protect and assure improved health outcomes and knowledge.
- 5. <u>Leadership and Management</u>: Exhibit an understanding of healthcare leadership, management, and policy, using systems thinking.
- 6. <u>Health Equity and Justice:</u> Describe social, behavioral, cultural, and environmental factors that impact health.
- 7. <u>Professionalism</u>: Demonstrate a commitment to professionalism, ethics, stewardship, and lifelong learning in healthcare.

You are strongly encouraged to consult with your faculty advisor when selecting an appropriate minor. Additional information on appropriate minor programs can be found in the Appendix under Minors.

Students must have a program GPA of 2.00 or higher to be eligible for graduation. The program GPA is not the WSU or Cumulative GPA but the GPA of the Health Management program courses. Students with a GPA of 2.25 or lower will be placed on a program "Watch List" and will be contacted in regards to program performance. Students whose program GPA falls below 2.00 will be contacted by their faculty adviser for an in person meeting regarding the program.

Curriculum

PHS Departmental Honors

Scholarship and research are encouraged at the undergraduate level. Students who meet the qualifications should explore adding the honors program to their undergraduate major. Students who are not PHS majors and are involved in the Cohen Honors College, should contact the PHS department for permission to enroll in these courses, as appropriate.

Admission requirements include:

- 1. Status as a PHS major;
- 2. An overall GPA of 3.500 in all major coursework;
- 3. A one-page, double-spaced letter describing reasons for applying to the honors track, goals and potential benefits to participating in the program; and
- 4. Agreement by a PHS faculty member to mentor the final project.

Honors Program Requirements

Students admitted to the PHS honors track must complete the following:

- 1. Maintain a 3.500 cumulative GPA in all major coursework;
- 2. Be a participating member of the Health, Education, Advocates for Leadership, Teamwork, and Humanity (HEALTH) student organization;
- 3. Maintain a portfolio of assignments, activities and reflections throughout the honors track;
- 4. Complete and present a mentored scholarly activity during the last year of the program by enrolling in a 1-3 credit hour of PHS 401H Field Research in Public Health Science; and
- 5. Enroll in and complete the honors assignments with a minimum of 12 credit hours of PHS coursework selected from the following options:
 - PHS 408H Adaptive Leadership Honors
 - PHS 325H Epidemiology Honors
 - PHS 344H Culturally Informed Healthcare Honors
 - PHS 356H Foundations of Healthcare Policy, Law, and Ethics Honors
 - PHS 410H Health Communication Honors

Students who have completed two or more of the non-honors sections of the above courses (PHS 325, 344, 346, 408, and 410) can earn honors credit be enrolling in one of the 1-credit hour honors bridge courses (PHS 375AH, PHS 375BH, PHS 375CH, PHS 375DH, and PHS 375EH).

Applied Learning

Students in the BS in health management program are required to complete an applied learning or research experience to graduate from the program. The requirement can be met by completing the following program course requirements: <u>PHS</u> 485 Health Management Capstone and <u>PHS 495</u> Health Management Practicum.

Professional development outside required coursework creates application and deeper understanding of key concepts, and is essential to success after graduation. Employers emphasize that students who have experiences beyond the classroom are better suited for their career post-graduation. Your applied learning experience will assist you with developing goals, skills, and the necessary attributes to have a successful career.

BSHM Student Progression, Advising, and Counseling

The BSHM program uses team advising throughout a student's academic journey. Freshmen receive guidance from OneStop advisors, who specialize in first-year student advising at Wichita State University. Starting sophomore year, students transition to CHP advisors for preparatory and general education courses.

Students will be assigned a faculty advisor and should not select Health Management program concentration coursework without their advisor's input. During their junior and senior years, students work with their faculty advisor to develop a plan to meet major and minor requirements. Advisors can regularly meet with students to address academic and professional issues and monitor progress. Policies on academic and professional standards, honesty, and academic warning/probation are detailed in separate sections of the handbook.

Students are encouraged to meet with their advisor at least once per academic term to discuss progress, plan degree requirements, and review course selections for the next term. Students should prepare for these meetings by understanding academic policies, identifying professional goals, and observing registration deadlines. Useful documents, such as the Student Code of Conduct Handbook and Undergraduate Catalog, are available on the Wichita State University Registrar's website.

Professional counseling services are available through <u>Counseling and Psychological Services</u>, located in the Student Wellness Center inside the YMCA, or by calling 978-4792. Students may arrange appointments directly or through faculty referral.

To take PHS 485 "Health Management Capstone," or PHS 495 "Health Management Practicum," students must have senior standing and have chose Health Management as their major.

BSHM Academic Policies

University policy allows students to retake a course up to three times without restrictions. For a fourth attempt, regardless of the previous grade earned, students must receive permission. The Public Health Sciences Undergraduate Faculty Committee will hear petitions for permission to retake BSHM core courses. For access to the form and any questions, please contact sarah.taylor@wichita.edu.

Students in the Health Management program must maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.00, with no individual course grade in the major lower than a "C-" (1.7 GPA). Students whose program GPA falls below 2.00 will be put on a program watch list. Those whose cumulative GPA or WSU GPA falls below 2.00 will be placed on academic probation by the university. Information on academic probation and dismissal can be found in the WSU Undergraduate Catalog.

Accelerated Bachelor's to Master's Degree Options

The Department of Public Health Sciences offers accelerated bachelor's to master's programs in both the MA in Aging Studies and the MHA.

Aging Studies

The online accelerated bachelor's to master's in Aging Studies prepares students for graduate work at WSU while earning credit towards their bachelor's degree. This program is ideal for juniors and seniors across various disciplines. Admitted students can enroll in up to 9 graduate credit hours while completing their undergraduate degree. BSHM students in the Senior Living Management concentration can choose to use the 9 credit hour concentration towards the accelerated master's degree.

Health Administration

The Accelerated Bachelor's to Master's program in Health Administration prepares students for graduate work in health administration at WSU. This coordinated program leads to both a Bachelor of Science in Health Management and a Master of Health Administration. Admitted students can enroll in up to 9 graduate credit hours while completing their undergraduate degree. Eligible courses include PHS 621, PHS 622, and PHS 807.

Department Communications

Students will be enrolled into the Department of Public Health Sciences Blackboard site when they declare BSHM as their major. Emails used for Blackboard courses are the students' WSU email. Even if students have their own email account, they will also need a WSU email account, which will make it easier for the program to communicate, as all students' email addresses will be in a wichita.edu list-serve.

Weekly email newsletters will be sent out to all BSHM majors. These weekly communications will include important program information. Students will have the option to unsubscribe from the email list, but it is highly discouraged.

Blackboard and Class Handouts

All courses throughout the program use Blackboard as a tool to enhance or deliver the course presentation and content. For HYB1 courses faculty will place most of the class handouts on Blackboard for students prior to scheduled classroom lectures. You will be responsible for downloading and printing these handouts at your own expense if you require a hardcopy. It will be your responsibility to print your handouts PRIOR to class, you should not expect to print them from the PHS office printer just prior to starting class. Printers are located in Ahlberg Hall ISL, Library, and computing center.

Online courses use Blackboard to provide a comprehensive and flexible learning platform tailored to enhance the educational experience. Through Blackboard, faculty will organize course materials including lectures, readings, and assignments into structured modules, making it easy for students to find and access. Interactive tools including discussion boards, quizzes, and multimedia content will be integrated into the platform to engage students actively in the learning process. Faculty will track student progress, offer timely feedback, and communicate important updates. Blackboard ensures student have access to a dynamic and supportive online learning environment, available anytime, anywhere.

Grades

Coursework for undergraduate credit will be graded A, B+, B, B-, C+, C, C-, D+, D, D-, or F. Faculty have the option of assigning an "I" (incomplete) if they feel that sufficient justification exists for the student's failure to complete the course. All Health Management courses are graded with letter grades. Grades below C- (1.7 GPA) may not be used to satisfy degree requirements, but such courses may be repeated. Students must maintain a program GPA of 2.00 or higher to be eligible for the B.S. in Health Management.
