Course Description

General education advanced issues and perspectives course. Student Involvement's Alternative Spring Break program exposes WSU students to complex social and cultural issues through community visits and direct service. This experiential course uses an applied learning method of service-learning to explore food and shelter insecurities in Washington D.C. and Human Impact in Catalina Island, CA. Class explores social justice issues related to service through readings, discussion, writing, reorientation service in Wichita and research-based reflection.

Definition of a Credit Hour

Success in this 3 credit hour course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction and preparation/studying or course related activities for a total of 135 hours.

Measurable Student Learning Outcomes

Department Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Social Responsibility and Civic Engagement- Student leaders must role model social responsibility and be civic minded at all times but especially when representing the college/university. On and off campus behavior should match the values of the organization and institution leaders represent.
- 2. Leadership Development- Student Leaders involved in campus activities must understand that their role is to be a positive change agent, to influence others and create a vision. Leadership is a process rather than a position. Leadership is relationship oriented and situational in nature.
- **3. Clarified Values-** Understanding personal and organizational values play a significant role in achieving effective leadership in Campus Activities. Clarified values offer the leader a compass to navigate through a variety of leadership situations and challenges. Student leaders and programmers should reflect and engage in the process of values clarification to enhance personal growth and organizational effectiveness.

Class Protocol

Student Involvement's Alternative Spring Break program exposes WSU students to complex social and cultural issues through community visits and direct service. This experiential course will utilize an applied learning method of Service-Learning topics related directly to the trip. This class will explore social justice issues related to service through readings, discussion, writing, re-orientation service in Wichita and research-based reflection. Class attendance is vital to the success of the student in this course as much of the work is done in class, in teams, and through discussions. Use of a laptop is encouraged for blogs and project work. Cell phones are only permitted if being used to supplement the in class learning or activity.
