 - *Brain Science initiative between Psychology and OSU Center for Health Sciences.*
 - *Partnership between Geology and the National Groundwater Association.*
 - *Partnership between the School of Music and the New York Philharmonic.*
 - *Establishment of a two-year CAS faculty fellow on DEI, which we made a permanent Assistant Dean position working with our Equity Advocates Council.*
 - *Establishment of a new Center for the Humanities (with an endowed chair director)*
 - *Creation of the Center for Africana Studies with new space in our CAS building next to the Center for Sovereign Nations.*
 - *Investing more heavily in faculty start-up, external pre-peer-review of research proposals, and subvention publication funding.*
 - *Establishment of Cowboy Concurrent Online, bringing high school concurrent enrollment with OSU faculty to high schools in all 77 Oklahoma counties.*

 - *Dramatic expansion of CAS programs at OSU-Tulsa with 10+ transfer agreements established with Tulsa Community College.*
