ARTIFACT SPOTLIGHT



Shell hornNew Ireland/Melanesia/Oceania
Conch shell

The use of a shell as a "trumpet" to call attention is a somewhat universal concept - in the Andes of South America, a shell is used as a trumpet in dances and festivals. Traditional Yoruba music in West Africa employs the use of a conch shell (referred to as agogo), and associates the use and sound with Shango, the god of thunder. In New Zealand Maori groups, the pū is used to call out messages and warnings, and the alelu in Hawaii is used a symbol for royal communiques. The design of a shell horn will ultimately determine the trumpeting sound. Typically, a hole is carved into the side [seen in image] and the opening is smoothed out for the user to blow into. Sometimes, a mouthpiece is added to the opening - in this case, the horn was left as close to its natural state as possible. The spiral shape of the conch creates a resonating chamber for the sound waves to bounce off from and echo. Regardless of its purpose, the shell horn is a powerful and ancient instrument, carved from the sea itself. 2012.10.017
