

TRIO STUDENT ACCESS AND SUCCESS CONFERENCE

Three students from Wichita South High School had the opportunity to attend the 2025 TRIO Student Access and Success Conference, hosted by North Carolina Central University (NCCU) in Durham, North Carolina, from April 10–12. The event, aimed at supporting TRIO and first-generation students, was a powerful experience in college readiness, leadership, and service.

Students began their journey at Eisenhower National Airport in Wichita, where they checked in, passed through security, and enjoyed breakfast before boarding their flight. Upon arrival in Durham, they settled into their hotel and registered for the conference on campus at NCCU. The event opened with a keynote address by Dekendrick Murray, Executive Director for Student Access and Success at NCCU. Murray shared personal insights from his work and encouraged students to "network, reflect, and be themselves."

High-energy performances by NCCU's sorority chapters and elite cheer team added excitement to the opening day.

Throughout the three-day conference, students participated in dynamic breakout sessions focused on preparing for college, building successful habits, and understanding financial literacy. Meanwhile, staff engaged in professional development sessions covering stress management, access coaching, and educational innovation.

A highlight of the conference was the TRIO Day of Service. Wichita South students volunteered at NCCU's campus food pantry, helping to stock shelves and organize supplies. The experience emphasized the importance of community service as part of personal and academic growth.

Students returned to Wichita inspired, more informed about their college options, and grateful for the chance to grow academically and personally through this unique travel opportunity.







Spring 2025 Campus Visit Attendance



TEAMWORK


Respect self and others. Manage conflicts efficiently. Establish clear structure and achievable goals. Create sense of belonging and a safe space for open communication.

Whether those plans include technical school, college, a new job, or the unconventional (military or community service), the future can be intimidating. However, TRIO is still here to help. TRIO offers college assistance through its Student Support Services, Disability Support Services, and McNair Scholars Programs. The Educational Opportunity Centers (EOC) can help prepare students for higher education by providing free counseling and assistance regarding two-year and four-year college programs and technical training opportunities to enhance their career. EOC services include training sessions to help adults prepare for college, assistance with the college application process, financial aid advising, career guidance and more. This includes help with time management, study skills, soft skills, interest assessment, career exploration, and connections to scholarships.
