Back to School!



Any student considering college should take advantage of College Jump Start (CJS). This annual event provides information to students and their parents or guardians on the Talent Search Program and the services it has to offer: Connections to tutoring, homework assistance, financial literacy (FAFSA, scholarship newsletters, and searches), assistance with course selection, college admission applications, fee waivers, campus visits, and more. It also reviews information on qualified admissions and rigorous curriculum requirements, as well as things to consider when applying for postsecondary education, such as class size, admissions requirements, fee waivers, total cost, and how ACT and GPA scores influence college admission. Both TRIO Talent Search programs are 100% federally funded by the Department of Education and are hosted by WSU. Funds for 2024-2025 are \$672,135 for TS and \$288,470 for TSS.
