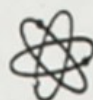

DID YOU KNOW?

- ◆ Madam Walker was the first black American woman to be a self-made millionaire, founding her own haircare company.
- ◆ Alexander Miles patented a mechanism that made automatic elevator doors safer and more efficient in 1887.
- ◆ John Standard's improved refrigerator design (patented in 1891) was inexpensive and more efficient than the previous iceboxes that had to be manually refilled.
- ◆ Garrett Morgan created the modern three light traffic signal in 1923. He is also responsible for the gas masks used in World War I and by today's firefighters and industrial workers to protect against dangerous chemicals and fumes.
- ◆ Richard Spikes invented the first automatic gear shift for cars in 1932, making driving easier and more convenient.
- ◆ Marie Van Brittan Brown and her husband Albert Brown created the first home security system in 1966.
- ◆ Katherine Johnson developed the world's first human-programmable computer language, which was used by NASA for space travel.

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Why Applying for FAFSA is Essential for Your Future

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is one of the most essential steps for students and families who are planning for college or vocational school. By applying and completing the FAFSA, students can unlock access to different financial aid options, including grants, scholarships, work-study programs, and low-interest federal loans. Every year, many students miss out on thousands of dollars given to them for school by not applying for the FAFSA. Students are encouraged to submit the FAFSA early to maximize their chances of receiving aid as some funds are limited and others work on a “first come, first served” basis. The FAFSA is a vital tool that can help make college or vocational school more affordable and accessible. Students can reduce the burden of school costs by filling out the FAFSA which allows students to focus more on their education and less on financial stress.

Steps to Applying for FAFSA:

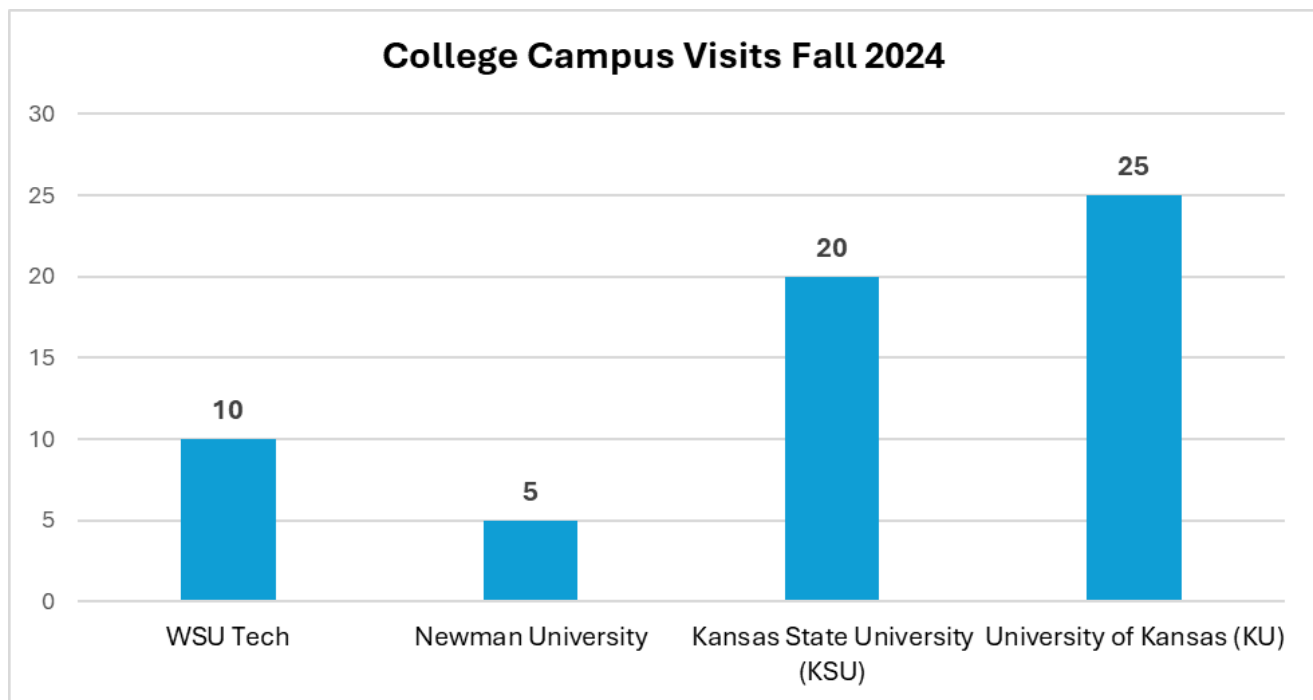
- ◆ **Create an FSA ID:** Unique username and password that allows students to sign FAFSA electronically.
- ◆ **Gather necessary documents:** Social security number, parents’ social security numbers, federal tax returns, W-2s, and records of any untaxed income.
- ◆ **Fill out the FAFSA form:** Visit FAFSA.gov to start the application. Questions will include financial background, family income, and any assets.
- ◆ **Review and submit FAFSA:** Once the form is filled, carefully review the answers for accuracy.
- ◆ **Check Student Aid Report (SAR):** The SAR summarizes students’ FAFSA information.
- ◆ **Review aid offers:** Aid offers explain the types and amounts of aid a college is offering and the expected costs. Compare the costs and aid offers.
