
























College Jump Start

Any student considering college should take advantage of College Jump Start (CJS). This annual event provides information to students and their parents or guardians on the Talent Search Program and the services it has to offer: Connections to tutoring, homework assistance, financial literacy (FAFSA, scholarship newsletters, and searches), assistance with course selection, college admission applications, fee waivers, campus visits, and more. It also reviews information on qualified admissions and rigorous curriculum requirements, as well as things to consider when applying for postsecondary education, such as class size, admissions requirements, fee waivers, total cost, and how ACT and GPA scores influence college admission. 
ACT Prep

Talent Search offers informational sessions and ACT prep workshops for high school students. The ACT workshop is conducted by Talent Search in collaboration with Power Prep. The cost is normally \$85 per student but TRIO Talent Search participants are able to attend the workshop for FREE and lunch is provided. ACT Power Prep workshops will be held in WSU's Woolsey Hall, Room 110B on October 15, February 7, and June 9. Registration is now open for the October session. Students will need to contact their TRIO Talent Search Program Educational Advisor for registration for the ACT Power Prep Workshop. The information provided is not only relevant to the ACT test but useful for other tests as well. The ACT workshop is especially beneficial for juniors who will be required to take the USD 259 district-wide ACT in February 2025. ACT waivers are available to Talent Search participants. 

Maximize High School Time Productively

High school is four years of schooling from the 9th through 12th grade. Once students complete 12th grade, they graduate with a high school diploma. Upon graduation, they have several choices: get a job, enroll in a vocational school to develop technical skills required for a specific job, or go to college and earn a degree that will increase earning potential and explore different career options. Below are some suggestions on how to use the time more productively.



Admissions counsellors at colleges want to know whether students have taken all the core courses, which include math, science, foreign language, English, and social studies. They also take note of whether students progressed to higher-level classes in the core subjects.

- ⇒ Take advanced courses like honors or AP classes.
 - These classes help students develop skills in critical thinking, problem-solving, and working with others. Moreover, AP classes help students earn college credits.
- ⇒ Get involved in extracurricular activities. Join clubs, sports teams, or other groups that align with personal interests. This allows students to explore new hobbies, develop new skills, and build leadership experience.



- ⇒ Volunteer and participate in community service. Look for opportunities to give back locally or globally. This demonstrates values and commitment beyond academics.
- ⇒ Develop time management and study habits. Learning to balance schoolwork, extracurricular activities, and a social life will serve students well in college and beyond. Experiment to find techniques that work.
- ⇒ Explore interests and potential career paths.

 Use high school to try out different subjects and activities to discover natural passions and strengths.
- ⇒ **Build meaningful relationships.** Nurture friendships, get to know teachers, and network with peers who share similar ambitions.

Finally, do not think high school is a waste of time. Some classes may seem boring or not make much sense. There may be teachers that students do not like or subjects they are not interested in, but remember, every experience helps students develop both as a person and intellectually. It is up to each student to choose to engage with the education and personal development opportunities available.
