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4 THE SUMMER


Even though school is out, it is important to keep the brain working, so that there is no summer learning loss. This happens to students' academic skills and knowledge over the course of summer vacation when they have lengthy breaks in the school year, such as the U.S. and Canada.

When students return to school after the summer break, teachers need to re-teach previously taught material. The learning loss may result in achievement gaps that widen each year for students.

Here are ways to prevent summer learning loss:

- Read a book 15-20 minutes a day.
- Go to the library.
- Practice math skills using Khan Academy (khanacademy.org).
- Create a routine for learning even during summer. This can help students stay on track and remain motivated to learn.
- Make time for learning- short periods of dedicated learning can make a difference.
- Use Technology find educational apps, games, and quizzes.
- Explore hobbies of interest.
- Write or journal.
- Try cooking from recipes this helps with math and reading.
- Explore new things.

Talent Search offers informational sessions and ACT Math prep workshops for high school students. The ACT Math workshop is conducted by Talent Search in collaboration with Tinka Davis, WSU associate educator for Mathematics and Statistics. The cost is FREE to all TRIO Talent Search participants and lunch is provided.

The ACT Math workshop is being planned for the fall. Students will be notified later in the year on the exact date, time, and place. Talent Search students will need to scan a QR code from the flyer sent via REMIND messaging. Students will need to bring an ACT approved calculator, pencil, and water/drink. Lunch will be provided for all who attend.

The information provided will not only be relevant to the ACT test but useful for other tests as well. The ACT math prep workshop is especially beneficial for juniors who will be required to take the USD 259 district-wide ACT in February 2026. ACT waivers are available to Talent Search participants. Request a waiver from a TS advisor.

Fee Waiver Eligibility Requirements

- TRIO Talent Search can provide up to <u>four</u> fee waivers for students that are eligible:
 - Currently enrolled in high school in 11th or 12th grade
 - Meet one or more of the indicators of economic need listed below:
 - Enrolled in a <u>federal free or reduced-price lunch</u> program at school, based on US Department of Agriculture (USDA) income levels
 - · Resides in a foster home, is a ward of the state, or is homeless
 - Family receives low-income public assistance or lives in federally subsidized public housing.



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


