Remembering Vietnam: 45 Years After Saigon

Forty-five years ago, on April 30, 1975, the Vietnam War was brought to a very bitter end as Communist North Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces captured the South Vietnamese capital of Saigon and forced South Vietnam to surrender.



After the United States began to withdraw support, South Vietnam was left in a weakened position and unable to defend themselves against North Vietnam. But in the weeks prior to Saigon's fall, the U.S. had begun efforts to evacuate Americans and South Vietnamese orphans and refugees from Saigon. On April 29 and 30, the U.S. made a frenetic last attempt to rescue all remaining Americans and as many

Vietnamese as possible via helicopter from the U.S. Embassy. However, thousands of South Vietnamese desperate to escape were left stranded outside the embassy.

This was a tough mission, to say the least. The conditions were deplorable. The orders were impossible. Our men lost leaders, battle buddies, and witnessed unspeakable acts. The antiwar protests on the U.S. home front were impassioned and consuming, and our veterans did not receive a warm welcome home.

Today, we honor all our veterans and endeavor to understand the conditions they face and the sacrifices they made. We can never make up for the way our Vietnam veterans were treated upon their return, but today, and every day, we can honor our Vietnam veterans for their service, their answer to the call of duty, and their tremendous sacrifice for the United States and Vietnam. •



Veterans Upward Bound Commemorates National TRIO Day at The Lord's Diner

Every year at the end of February, TRIO institutions celebrate National TRIO day to commemorate the annual achievements of the Federal TRIO programs in communities across the country. Throughout the eight different TRIO programs, it's seen as an opportunity to allow themselves and students the opportunity to give back to their local communities through acts of service.

This year, Veterans Upward Bound chose to serve the dinner shift at The Lord's Diner at 520 N. Broadway on Friday, February 21st. The Lord's Diner is a local community service that provides nutritious, hot meals at dinnertime 365 days a year and has served over 5 million meals to-date since they opened downtown in 2002. Their mission is to combat hunger in the community. The Diner's singular mission is to serve a nutritious meal with dignity and respect to anyone who is hungry.

The Lord's Diner operates at 5 different locations within Wichita. There are two brick-and-mortar dining halls: one downtown at Central and Broadway, and one in Planeview near Hillside and 31st St. South. There are also three mobile food trucks: one at Evergreen Recreation Center (25th and Arkansas), the second at Hilltop Community Center near Harry and Oliver, and the third in Atwater Community Center just west of the Wichita State University campus.

VUB chose the downtown location because it's known that a lot of our homeless veterans use this resource frequently, and they wanted another way of interacting with them and letting them know we're here in the community and we're able to help them with their needs.
