Each year, typically during the month of February, the TRIO programs at Wichita State gather for a recognition ceremony, perform community service, or collaborate in some way to highlight the important impact of TRIO programs. This year, the TRIO Talent Search-South staff and select students volunteered at the Kansas Food Bank. The staff also continued previous year's efforts to donate books to local Little Free Libraries to promote literacy in the neighborhoods.

The Kansas Food Bank has programs that provide healthy foods, including fresh produce, to families and seniors in need. This includes the underemployed, unemployed, low or fixed income residents. Their mobile hygiene pantries also provide prepacked bags of laundry detergent, toilet paper, deodorant, shampoo, and body wash. The TSS team helped to assemble bags of apples for people's need for nutritious food.

Local Little Free Libraries operate on the basis of taking a book and sharing a book. The purpose is to establish equitable 24/7 book access in each community and inspire readers through diverse literary options and community partnerships. Diversity, equity, and inclusion are essential elements to the success of this community effort.

National TRIO/GEAR UP Day Celebration at Wichita State University's Woolsey Hall 2/16.



In honor of National TRIO/GEAR UP Day, WSU partnered with TRIO/GEAR UP programs housed on its campus (nine TRIO and two GEAR UP) to host a celebration for first-generation, limited income students seeking higher education. The event kicked off with messages of support from Associate Vice President Deltha Q. Colvin and Shirly Lefever, Ph.D., first-generation alumna and executive vice president and provost for Academic Affairs. Then, representatives from the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid shared campus resources available to incoming Shockers. Next, the keynote speaker Hoan Do was introduced. Do is an award-winning inspirational speaker, city finalist NBC's hit show American Ninja Warrior, and author of Creating Momentum in Your Life. Do provided life-changing insights on overcoming negative thoughts and emotions to create a more positive mindset. He also shared a three-step concept called GPS based on Goals, Purpose, and Strategies to impact progress and propel first-gen students towards their goals for a better quality of life. According to Do, "Life is a team sport. Your team consists of mentors who pour into you; they coach you. Teammates/friends support and encourage you, cheering you on and mentees are the ones whose lives you pour into." WSU Counseling and Preventative Services Mental Health Counselor Chuckwunenye Nweke closed out the event with breathing techniques, a discussion on the importance of good mental health, and an interactive exercise that showed participants how powerful positive reinforcement and persuasion can boost confidence and improve mental health.







Free Money!! KKGU Scholarship

TRIO has teamed up with the Kansas Kids at GEAR UP (KKGU) to help provide students with scholarship opportunities and funding. Students who are obtaining a college degree are eligible to apply regardless of whether they are pursuing a two-year associate degree or a four-year bachelor's degree. There is an online application process which takes less than five minutes to complete. Once the application is processed, students will be notified by email of supporting documents needed such as college schedule, tuition fees, and housing costs. Please reach out to a program advisor for more information on how to apply.

Program Objectives for 2022-2023

For the TSS grant to be funded by the Department of Education, the program must meet program objectives stated within the grant proposal. For the 2022-2023 grant year, all program objectives exceeded the minimum requirements! Prior experience points were earned which will increase the chances to become refunded in the future.

- \Rightarrow <u>100%</u> of non-senior participants served each project year will complete the current academic year and continue in school for the next academic year, at the next grade level.
- $\Rightarrow 90\%$ of seniors served during the project year will graduate during the project year with a regular secondary school diploma within the standard number of years.
- \Rightarrow 32% of seniors served during the project year will complete a rigorous secondary school program and will graduate during project year with a regular secondary school diploma within the standard number of years.
- $\Rightarrow \frac{56\%}{100} \text{ of participants, who graduated with a regular secondary school diploma, during the project year, will enroll in an institution of higher education by the fall term immediately following high school graduation or will have received notification, by the fall term immediately following high school, from an institution of higher education, of acceptance but deferred enrollment until the next academic term (e.g. spring term).$
