

In-Person/Virtual Campus Visits



In response to COVID-19, many colleges and universities are moving towards virtual rather than live campus visits. Students will have to rely more on the power of technology for college exploration.

Before the quarantine, Talent Search participants were able to attend ten live campus visits: Baker University, Butler Community College, Cowley College, Emporia State University, Kansas State University, Oklahoma State University, Pittsburg State University, University of Kansas, Wichita State University, and WSU Tech.

A total of 155 students attended the live campus visits and were offered virtual campus tours for the remaining institutions: K-State Polytechnic University and the University of Tulsa. Campus tours are a vital part of college decision-making, which is why students need to take advantage of the virtual campus tours.

College Raptor explains the pros and cons of the virtual tour. Pros included accessibility, cash savings, and time preserved. Cons were listed as impersonal with limited information and technical difficulties.
