High School Course Selection

For eighth graders, it will soon be time to select courses for high school. They will need to choose classes that prepare them for the next level, which is college. Students need to keep in mind, one way to get into college is to meet the qualified admissions requirements. The qualified admissions for Emporia State, Pittsburg State, Wichita State, and Fort Hays State universities require students to have an ACT score of at least 21, an SAT score of 1060, or a cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) of 2.25 or higher. However, some universities have additional requirements. For example, Kansas State University requires a GPA of 3.25 or higher, while the University of Kansas requires students who do not meet the GPA requirements to have an ACT score of 24, SAT of 1160, and cumulative GPA of 3.0.

Another way to get into one of the six state universities is to complete the Kansas Scholars Curriculum. Students are required to take the following courses: Four units of English; four units of math to include algebra, geometry, algebra II and an advanced math course (such as analytic geometry, trigonometry or calculus); four units of science to include biology, chemistry, and physics; three units in social science; and four units of a foreign language (two years of the same language).

The universities want all students to take the right courses in high school and requires them to have a good GPA. If help is needed, seek aid from a Talent Search counselor or the high school counselor. Best of luck!

Program Objectives Five-Year Trend

Every year, the TRIO Talent Search program submits the Annual Performance Report to the Department of Education that includes the program's measurable objectives and goals: Secondary School Persistence; Secondary School Graduation, Secondary School Graduation with Rigorous Program of Study, Postsecondary Education Enrollment, and Postsecondary Attainment.

Program Objectives 2020-2021	Goal	Achieved
Secondary School Persistence	95%	100%
Secondary School Graduation	80%	96%
Secondary School Graduation with rigorous program of study	25%	19%
Postsecondary Education Enrollment	65%	42%

To examine on a five-year trend, data collection on program objectives from year 2016-2021 was conducted. The five-year trend appears to demonstrate that secondary school persistence and secondary school graduation have no significant changes from 2016-2021. The rigorous program of study was similarly consistent but gradually decreases after year 2018. The postsecondary education enrollment has significantly decreased during the 2019-2020 and the subsequent year. The postsecondary attainment data was not measured until 2017-2018 as there is a zero value on the chart for the respective year and objective. There were no significant changes from 2016-2021. Based on the trend shown below, the COVID-19 pandemic likely affected the students' decision on enrolling in postsecondary education. National data has shown a significant drop in postsecondary enrollment over the past two years, as reported by the National Student Clearinghouse (2021).
