Congratulations to the graduating seniors! It was a long road, but worth it! Now it is time to make decisions that will enhance adult life, elevate the finances, secure health, and create a more positive outlook for the future.

Start by investing in learning what career appeals most and take the steps necessary to achieve it. Work does not feel like work when it is something that is truly enjoyed. Check in with a Talent Search advisor or school counselor for guidance with the career search. Look online for career inventory tests. Explore the Talent Search website in the links and resources section. There are links to the Occupational Outlook Handbook, College Scorecard, CashCourse, Federal Student Aid, and The Stock Market Game.

Another piece of advice, keep the finances in order. Do not overextend the pocketbook with loans and credit card bills. Budget, save, and manage money wisely. Seek out scholarships to pay for college. Avoid high interest rates on credit cards and loans. Only borrow what is needed and what is able to be paid back in a timely manner.

Exercise self-care. This includes mind, body, and spirit. Becoming an adult comes with a lot of decisionmaking, so the mind needs to remain strong. Take advice from knowledgeable people, such as a mentor, who shares the vision. Get plenty of rest, exercise the mind and body, eat healthy, establish a support system (friends and family), and never stop learning. Strive to constantly be better today than yesterday. How to Write a Personal Essay for Scholarships

Many scholarships require students to write a short statement or essay describing who they are as a person and a student. This essay might include information about the student's strengths, hobbies, academic and career goals, and what motivates them to do their best. All students who apply for a scholarship provide the same information, such as their GPA and volunteer work, so the personal essay is what can set the individual apart from other high-achieving students. Additionally, the personal essay can be used to explain situations that may have negatively impacted the student, such as in the case of earning lower grades in classes taken online during the COVID-19 pandemic if the student was responsible for the care of younger siblings or did not have stable internet access at home.

Since the personal essay is such an important part of a scholarship application, it might sound overwhelming to write. However, if a student is applying for several scholarships at once, a trick is to write one general essay and edit it for the specific requirements of each scholarship. For example, if a scholarship is only open to first-generation students, it might be more impactful to write about the challenges of being the first person in the family to go to college rather than just listing the student's volunteer services.

Also, the student should double check that they used correct spelling, capitalization, and punctuation in their essay. The student should be mindful of word-limits and have covered all required topics. Finally, the high school's college and career coordinator (CCC) or TRIO Talent Search advisor are available to proof-read personal essays to make sure the requirements of the scholarship are all addressed.



Test-Taking Strategies for The ACT

On February 28, 2023, the State of Kansas is providing a free ACT test to all 11th grade students in the USD 259 district. Students who are interested in the National ACT test can still take the test, which occurs once a month in September, October, December, February, April, June, and July. Below are five strategies from Education Corner (<u>https://www.educationcorner.com/acttest-taking-strategies.html</u>) to prepare for the ACT test.

Five Test -Taking Strategies

- 1. Answer the easy questions first: Students should answer questions that they know the correct answer to first. After answering easier questions, then go back and answer the most difficult questions if there is enough time.
- 2. Always review work before the section ends: If the student finishes all the test questions before the time ends, they need to be sure to check their work.
- 3. **DO NOT** leave any problems unanswered: Guess if necessary (ACT does not take off points). Answer every question within the time allowed for each section.
- 4. Be aware of the time remaining: Avoid spending too much time on one question. Go on to the next questions and come back if there is time.
- 5. Become familiar with the test: Review the information in the test booklet and take the practice test well before the test day.

On February 24, 1986, a congressional resolution (H. Con. Res. 278) declared that Saturday, February 28, 1986, should be designated as "National TRIO Day" to commemorate the annual achievements of the Federal TRIO programs in communities across the country. Since then, the TRIO community has reserved the fourth Saturday in February as National TRIO Day (NTD). This day is an opportunity to focus the nation's "attention on the needs of disadvantaged young people and adults aspiring to improve their lives if they are to become contributing citizens of the country, and to the talent which will be wasted if that investment is not made" (Source: https://coenet.org/national-trio-day-2/).

For the Talent Search Program at Wichita State University, National TRIO Day has become an annual tradition that allows students and program staff to come together and share their accomplishments, perform acts of community service as a way to give back to their local communities, and raise awareness of the importance of educational opportunity for low-income, first-generation students.

For the second year in a row in honor of NTD and to combat the growing literacy crisis, Talent Search has chosen to support the Little Free Library whose mission is "to have a Little Free Library in every community and a book for every reader." As volunteers share a book, they can take one for free. These book-sharing boxes provide 24/7 access to literature, inspiring readers, and building the underserved, underprivileged community (Source: https://littlefreelibrary.org/).

As an added measure, Professional Educational Advisor and Mentoring-Career Coordinator Suresh Menon is working with the school guidance counselor at West High School to reconstruct the blessing box that was vandalized by students and erect a Little Free Library along-side it. Menon hopes that by collaborating with the school administration and students, a new blessing box and Little Free Library will create a sense of pride and accomplishment for the students who help to create it. His intention is to promote literacy and encourage a sense of ownership in the finished product that will lead to a respect of the property and its valuable place in the community.
