After students complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), the colleges selected on their application will receive their information in a Student Aid Report (SAR). The SAR will help each college determine how much financial aid they can offer. The college will then create an awards package detailing the scholarships, grants, work study and federal loans available to them. Each college may offer a different financial aid package, so it is good to compare offers. For federal loans, students can decide how much they would like to accept. It is highly recommended that students only borrow what they NEED to cover educational costs since they will pay back more than they borrowed after interest accrues. Students who need help understanding their financial aid award letter can reach out to their TRIO Talent Search advisor.

Here are some useful terms to know when deciding what aid to accept:

Cost of Attendance (COA) - how much each school year will cost, usually including tuition and fees, books, dorms and meal plans, school supplies, transportation, and other costs (such as a laptop). **Expected Family Contribution (EFC)** - how much the family is expected to pay towards the student's education based on the tax information entered on the FAFSA.

COA – EFC = Net Cost – This is the amount students will pay towards their educational expenses.
 Scholarships – FREE money that students do not have to pay back

Grants – FREE money that does not need to be paid back UNLESS the degree is not completed Loans – Money borrowed and HAVE TO PAY BACK with interest

Program Objective Results for 2021-2022

In grant year 2021-2022, the program served 1,132 students, 826 (73%) of them were low-income and potential first-generation college students. The TRIO Talent Search program measured student progress for secondary school persistence, secondary school graduation, secondary school graduation with rigorous program of study, postsecondary education enrollment, and postsecondary attainment. An annual performance report to the U.S. Department of Education will be submitted in the coming weeks. To determine secondary school persistence, data was collected from student transcripts or from school verification. Graduation data was verified by the commencement program, while transcripts were analyzed to identify student completion of rigorous programs of study. The students' postsecondary educational status was verified by the National Student Clearinghouse. The analysis of the program objectives revealed that the program achieved the substantial progress requirements of the U.S. Department of Education. The table below illustrates the results for each program objective.

Eighth graders, it is time to start thinking about going to high school with an eye on college. There are certain requirements to get into Wichita State, University of Kansas, K-State, Fort Hays, Emporia State, and Pittsburg State. When selecting classes, be sure to take the right courses to increase the odds of being admitted to college. The classes should include four units of math, three units of social studies, three units of science, and one year of a foreign language such as Spanish. Keeping grades up to maintain a GPA of at least a 2.50 or above is important too. Questions about high school can be directed to a TRIO Talent Search advisor or the school counselor.
