Supporting Educational Outcomes in the Shocker Neighborhood

In partnership with WSU Men's Basketball, United Way of the Plains raised funds through Coaching for Literacy.



Students in grades K-3 at 14 schools in the Shocker neighborhood received new reading materials to take home and combat summer learning loss.

A total of 6,100 books were delivered, with 3,050 children receiving two books and resources for parents to assist students with improving their reading skills.

IMPACT THAT ADDS UP...

- + 592 second and third grade students strengthened their reading skills through Read to Succeed
- + **337** at-risk children received support services through the Early Childhood Block Grant, managed locally by United Way, to ensure they would enter school ready to learn and reduce the need for future specialized education.
- + **118,815** books were distributed to school age children to ignite their love of reading and learning
- + 5,287 individuals used SingleCare, a prescription discount card offered by United Way
- + **159** working families accessed affordable dental care with the help of the Delta Dental Community Benefit Plan, administered by United Way
- + 632 individuals were referred to safe, affordable banking services to avoid predatory lending services through Bank On ICT
- + 49,633 free rides were given to Veterans on Wichita City buses through the Vets Ride Free program
- + 14 homeless pet owners were able to board their furry friend for free while they found stable housing
- + 287 free grocery deliveries were made to households in food deserts through Ride United ICT
- + **107,100** times individuals experiencing homelessness were served by an Impact ICT coalition partner
- + **162,053** times people in south central Kansas were helped by United Way funded programs.
