STUDENT INVOLVEMENT STAFF

The staff members of Student Involvement act as resources to Wichita State University. The professional staff provide guidance and leadership to ten functional areas: Cadman Art Gallery, Student Involvement Events, Campus Traditions, Civic Engagement, Fraternity and Sorority Life, Leadership, Recognized Student Organizations, Service-Learning, Student Activities Council and Student Government Association. The staff is dedicated to creating a safe and educational environment for students to learn and grow. The student employees of Student Involvement provide much support to the daily activities of the department.

In March of 2017, we were asked to begin advising the Student Government Association. Based on this additional responsibility, as new positon was requested and granted. This created an opportunity for us to reevaluate the structure of our department. We had many discussions as staff and, with the approval our Vice President, made some changes. Beginning in the new fiscal year, we created three areas within the department, Civic Leadership, Programming and Student Organizations. An Associate/Assistant Director who reports to the Director oversees each of these areas.

Civic Leadership: In January of 2018, Chelsea Redger-Marquardt was promoted to Associate Director. This position oversees Civic Leadership, which includes Civic Engagement, Service-Learning, Community Service Board and Leadership.

Programming: We consolidated the programming areas of the department into one area; this includes the Student Activities Council, Cadman Art Gallery, SI Events, Campus Traditions and SI Ambassadors. An internal search was conducted, and Tia Hill was selected as the Assistant Director over Programming. Sara Clifton continued to work with Traditions and took on SI Ambassadors and SI Events as well as the Cadman Art Gallery and a new staff member, Randi Beggs was hired to advise the Student Activities Council.

Student Organizations: All student organizations, including Fraternities and Sororities, fall under this area, along with co-advising of the Student Government Association. The Assistant Director position was reformatted, an external search was conducted, and Gabriel Fonseca was selected as the Assistant Director, he began in January of 2018. Based on the restructure, another Coordinator of Fraternity and Sorority Life was hired: Rani Somers.

At the end of the year, we were sad to see all of our graduate level staff leave, most due to graduation.

AREA REPORTS

Student Involvement

This year has been another one of development and change. We took over advising the Student Government Association, brought back Family Weekend and started a new graduation celebration coined The Toast. We implemented a new volunteer database, Volunteer ICT, in conjunction with United Way of the Plains. We hired four new staff members who brought in additional insights and skill sets. We conducted the next installment of our campus wide survey and have been reviewing the data from this survey to determine what changes to our operations need to be made. We continued to collaborate with a variety of departments on programs and better serve students. A continued push by the university was that of retention, as a department we have been working on additional ways we can assist in this campus wide initiative.

Beyond Student Involvement, we continued to see many changes on campus. We have been exploring how we can collaborate with some of the new companies on Innovation Campus and utilize new spaces for programming and services.

SI Leader Retreat

Over the year we held two SI Leaders' Retreats. The retreats brought together the executive boards of the Interfraternity Council, Multicultural Greek Council, Panhellenic Council, National Society for Leadership and Success, Community Service Board, Student Activities Council, Student Government Association and the SI Ambassadors. The goal of these retreats were to build collaborations and provide a venue where these students could get to know one another and form connections.

SI Ambassadors

The 2017-2018 ambassador team included Andrea Murillo, Clayton Baughn, Jamillah Sleiman (Fall 2017), Kelsey Wulfkuhle (Fall 2017), Rachael Embrey, Richy Thach, Kaylee Shadid, Terence Troung, Holly Nguyen, and Mindy Huynh. In Spring 2018, we added Brandon Jackson, Savannah Goodpasture and Vivian Troung to the team. During the fall and spring semester, the ambassadors held campus visits and information tables. During the Fall 2017 semester, the ambassadors held a Student Involvement Open House and hosted a Friendsgiving event for all SI Leaders. The team was advised by Sara Clifton.

Marketing

Our continued goal of marketing Student Involvement is to increase recognition of the office as well as all our programs and initiatives. This year we continued to connect with campus partners to increase the knowledge of SI programs and services. In Fall 2017, 4,000 calendars were distributed, including an increase to 1,400 in the residence halls. In Spring 2018, 3,500 calendars were distributed. We continued to produce the Welcomefest brochure and coordinating marketing, adding a downloadable version to our website.

The NEWSIE, Student Involvement newsletter, continued to be sent out on a weekly basis and highlighted various activities hosted by the department throughout the week. Additionally, SI programs are featured prominently in the RSC Happenings distributions.

In August 2015, Student Involvement hired Thomas Le as our marketing assistant and he graduated in December 2017. We then hired Terence Truong to take over SI Marketing in December 2017. Both Thomas and Terence have had increased resulting in a robust applied learning opportunity in areas of social media management, graphic design, project management, and video production. As of May 29, 2018, the office had the following engagement on these platforms:

Equipment Loan

Student Involvement has a loan policy in place for equipment lent to departments and student groups or organizations. Those who checkout the equipment must complete the loan agreement form at least six (6) business days in advance of their event and must follow specific guidelines relating to the equipment's use on campus. Cadman Art Gallery

The gallery had some highs this year, which we are very excited about. This year we saw a record number of entries for the 36th Exposure Photography Competition at 80 pieces submitted. Of those pieces, 27 were selected for exhibition, making this year's competition very competitive. The Looking Glass, the outer exhibition space of the Cadman Art Gallery, featured student, community and faculty artists. While maintaining traditional exhibits such as Student of the Year and Student Life Photos we added another show we hope to continue in years to come. In collaboration with Counseling and Testing we hosted the Healing Arts Showcase where students used art to who any trauma or mental illness they may be dealing with. This year we also had artist, Haley Ensz, sell 65% of her artwork that she showed in the gallery as well as obtain three requests for personal pieces due to her show.

In an effort to get more students interested in interacting with the Cadman Art Gallery the staff implemented a critique system for the shows. Those who came through the gallery had the opportunity to pick up a half sheet that had art critique instructions on it and critique one piece of art, those were then submitted to the artist anonymously at the end of the show. The best critique would win a t-shirt. The critique system appeared popular in the fall averaging 7 critiques a show but fizzled out in the spring.

Over the course of the year, the Cadman Art Gallery had a graduate assistant employed. Sai was responsible for event planning, program planning, installations, gallery competitions, and other various duties. Sai worked diligently to build relationships with faculty and staff in the art department to get feedback and buy in for the Cadman. In building these relationships, we saw an increase in applications in our competitions this year.

The gallery underwent some changes at the end of Spring 2016. With the change in the gallery counter system we are able to accurately obtain numbers of visitors for each show that takes place within the main space gallery. However, we acknowledge that the counters cannot account for the same person who walks past the sensor multiple times.

Student Involvement hosted approximately 1,300 students at the 5th Annual Back 2 School Bash this year. We had 15 different sponsors at the event that contributed prizes, catering, event space and monetary funds adding over \$6,000 for entertainment. Over 35 Wichita State staff and faculty members came out to volunteer at the event and welcome students back on campus.

Family Weekend

Family weekend made a comeback this year after being absent last year. We had 74 families attend and a total of 172 people. This was up from 31 families and a total of 118 people from 2015. Student Involvement collaborated with Shocker Sports Grill and Lanes for an opening reception where families could then attend a Shocker Volleyball game, participate in SAC's Paint Night or explore on their own. Saturday morning started with a family/parent association meeting and a new event called Wu's Waffle Feed. Moving forward we strive to partner with other entities on campus to reflect a more robust Family Weekend schedule.

Shocktoberfest

Shocktoberfest entered its 27th year this year. We kicked off Campus Recreation's annual Pumpkin Run and the Student Activities Council's Trunk or Treat. The Traditions Committee had lots of success with Wu's Birthday Bash by moving it to the afternoon and inviting the WSU Students of the Year. The Community Service Board sponsored Tuesday's event, Hunger Games sponsoring the Shocker Support Locker. Student Activities Council sponsored Wednesday's event, 3v3 Basketball. On Thursday, the Traditions Committee introduced a new event called, Dine with the Deans. Students had the opportunity to come and eat breakfast with the Dean of their College and other students within their College. In the inaugural year, we had over 100 students attend with every dean in attendance. Major changes occurred with Songfest this year as we limited each group to only 30 participants and only allowing the first 300 students to attend for free. By making these changes, we made the competition more accessible to all organizations as well as safer for participants and student volunteers. However, this change resulted in not selling out the Orpheum by about 200 people.

Highlights

CSB entered into a third year of partnerships with the Lord's Diner and the Kansas Food Bank by having regular service days at these sites. This was the first year that CSB also collaborated with The Boys and Girls Club of South Central Kansas as part of a series program. Wu's Big Event had record high registration (over 250) which demonstrates a positive future for this initiative. More than 656 WSU students, staff, faculty, and community members connected with the Wichita community through events facilitated by CSB, which is a 38.1% increase in engagements from FY18.

Membership Meetings were held weekly on Thursday afternoons and featured speakers from area community partners and service opportunities. Members also participated in service projects with the Kansas Humane Society, the Ronald McDonald House, Kansas Heart Hospital, and Wichita Public Schools during membership meeting time.



Through a partnership with the WSU Tennis Team, CSB volunteers created 171 dog toys and donated more than 100 tennis balls to the Kansas Humane Society.

In addition to service events, CSB also engaged more than 576 students in on-campus events that increased awareness of social issues and efforts to address them.

Service hours COMPLETED 2,384

Although FY18 service hours were only 70 percent of the previous year's capacity, there was an increase in quality and follow-through of registration by CSB volunteers. Mentoring Monday, which was a new series program in fall 2018, had a lower volunteer capacity (6) than the event it replaced, Tutoring Thursday (12). Additionally, in this fiscal year the capacity for Wednesdays at the Diner and Senior Saturdays series programs was reduced to meet the needs of partner organizations. With the implementation of volunteerICT, the average registration to participation rate among those who registered for CSB events increased by 19.4 percent.



Wu's Big Event saw an increase in participation for fall 2017 with 263 attendees, which resulted in offering five service sites for the spring offering. Issues with registered volunteers "no-showing" day of the event continues to be an issue with a 20% average margin of registrants who register and do not attend without giving notice. We average 165 volunteers at each event, completing over 1,230 hours of service combined.

A partnership between Academic Affairs and Student Affairs exists with the continued work of the Faculty Fellows Dr. Rhonda Lewis and Associate Director, Student Involvement Chelsea Redger-Marquardt continued. The team continued work in the area of faculty development and outreach including hosting workshops, putting together example materials and resources and updating the

Service-Learning website with the help of Strategic Communications. Additionally, the newly created Service-Learning Scholars completed their first term.

VolunteerICT


In summer of 2017 Civic Engagement at WSU purchased a license for a Campus Connect portal of Galaxy Digital's Get Connected software. It was made available to the public on August 18, 2017 and branded as VolunteerICT. This website was paired with the United Way of the Plains' Volunteer Center to allow community partners to share information with Greater Wichita and WSU users simultaneously, while also providing a platform to capture info about how the WSU community volunteers. This website allows users to find volunteer opportunities from more than 130 community partners and record their service hours in a volunteer resume.




By the end of the spring 2018 semester, this website had engaged over 1,300 users who had logged more than 6,600 volunteer hours during the 2017-18 academic year.

Alternative Spring Break

Alternative Spring Break exposed WSU students to complex social and cultural issues through community visits, experiential learning, direct service, group discussion and reflection activities. This was the first year that two concurrent Alternative Spring Break trips took place from this office. These groups traveled to Washington D.C. and Catalina, CA on Sunday, March 18 through Friday, March 23, 2017. The focus of the Catalina trip was Minimizing Human Impact on the Environment and the Washington D.C. trip focused on Hunger and Homelessness in the Urban Environment.

The course was structured to allow for a common curriculum of social justice and ethical volunteerism with breakout groups for education related to the individual trip focus. Throughout the course students participated in a variety of projects, readings and reflective activities. Highlights included hosting a Hunger Banquet, designing blogs, and collaborating on group fundraisers. Posters created by this group also won the following awards at the Service-Learning Showcase:

Each trip participant also selected a photo for the *Alternative Spring Break: Photo Reflections* in the Cadman Art Gallery that ran from April 9 to 20, 2018. Students were also present to represent their images at the reception on April 17.

The Washington D.C. group worked with Youth Service Opportunities Project (YSOP), which is a partner organization who coordinated opportunities for students to work with a variety of food banks, shelters, meal preparation centers and outreach centers.



YSOP is committed to helping young people become part

of the solution to societal problems by showing them how even their smallest actions can make a difference in the lives of others. YSOP is a nationally recognized leader in providing high-quality volunteer service experiences. YSOP has been a pioneer in the field of service-learning, leading thousands of young people and adults in programs to encourage community participation and engaged citizenship through direct service to homeless and hungry people. This group's lodgings were in the YSOP headquarters in the Church of the Epiphany.

The Catalina group worked with the Catalina Conservancy, which is the organization responsible for 89 percent of the land on Santa Catalina Island. The mission of the Catalina Conservancy is to be a responsible steward of our lands through a balance of conservation, education and recreation.

The Conservancy is a leader in conservation programs that protect and restore endangered species and threatened habitats. Students on this trip worked with road and trail maintenance, endemic species research, and ecological education. This group stayed in the Laura Stein Volunteer Camp for the duration of their service.



Students participated in a variety of reflective activities including a blog (www.wichita.edu/altbreak). The blog was a dynamic part of the course and allowed students to reflect on the issues and service work throughout the experience. It then served as a portion of the students' final presentation/ digital story project.

Fraternity and Sorority Life

Year in Review

Fraternity and Sorority Life has completed another successful year with record numbers in academic performance, member retention, service and philanthropy dollars raised. This year brings the last strategic planning cycle to an end with 85% of goals achieved. During FY18 Fraternity and Sorority Life recognized 22 member organizations as part of the Greek community at Wichita State University. This included welcoming back to campus the chapters of Kappa Alpha Psi and Zeta Phi Beta and continuing to work with Sigma Gamma Rho on recruitment efforts to re-establish the Chi Chapter. Additionally, the final three colonies of the community (FarmHouse, Kappa Delta Chi, and Sigma Psi Zeta) became chapters this past year. Notable Changes


Fraternity and Sorority Life saw a variety of operational changes in 2017-2018. An additional coordinator of Fraternity and Sorority Life was hired starting in August 2017. In July 2017, the Assistant Director left the university and the office was restructured to adjust to new responsibilities the department was asked to take on. Instead of an Assistant Director of Fraternity and Sorority Life, an Assistant Director of Student Involvement was hired in January that would oversee Student

Government, RSO's and the Coordinators of Fraternity and Sorority Life. One of the Coordinators of Fraternity and Sorority Life left the university in December 2017. Divisions of responsibilities were divided out between the current Coordinator of Fraternity and Sorority Life and the Assistant Director of Student Involvement.

FSL made the decision to eliminate the New Member Greek Council and turn it into a New Member Greek Leadership program called LAUNCH. LAUNCH will begin in Fall 2018. The three individual councils (IFC, MGC, PC) have all flourished in the academic year and have created sustainable changes in council structure and performance.

Interfraternity Council Events

- <u>Walk-a-Mile:</u> They continued their partnership with the Student Activities Council on this event. This event was held on August 29 to raise awareness for sexual assault and sexual violence. The main speaker for the event was from Wichita Area Sexual Assault Center (WASAC) who gave information about sexual assault statistics and information on college campuses. The event ended with a one-mile walk around Perimeter Road on campus.
- <u>Neighborhood Cleanup</u>: Hosted in September, members from the IFC community came together to clean up the Fairmount Neighborhood. Attendance was low, with around 15 participants.
- <u>Boys and Girls Club Field Day:</u> Hosted in April, the Boys and Girls Club Field Day invited over 45 Boys and Girls Club students to the Heskett Center to play basketball, volleyball, soccer and board games. Over 30 IFC men were present to interact with the kids. This led to a wonderful partnership with the Boys and Girls Club, who would like to continue hosting this event on campus.

Multicultural Greek Council Events

- <u>MGC Informational:</u> Held on August 28 in the RSC 233 and January 22 in the RSC 142. The Informational saw a steady participation from prospective members, with the Fall event being more heavily attended. Prospective members were able to hear from each chapter and chapters were set up in founding order with their own publicity table. For Fall 2019, we will be moving the event to the ballroom, as we have outgrown a majority of spaces in the RSC with the amount of chapters in the council.
- <u>Sweet Celebration</u>: Held on August 23 and January 18 in partnership with the Office of Diversity and Inclusion (ODI). In August, the event was held on the RSC East Patio and there were games and a popcorn bar. In January, the event was held inside the RSC in the Bluestem Lounge and included a cookie-decorating bar. Moving forward, ODI and MGC have decided to eliminate this partnership due to low attendance from multicultural student org.
- <u>Yard Show:</u> Held on August 31, the Yard Show took place on the RSC North Patio. All chapters within the Multicultural Greek Council participated. Music was turned in before the event and tech was run by staff and MGC Exec members. Each chapter had 5 minutes to do a step and/or a stroll and share information about themselves.

- <u>Scholarship Celebration:</u> Held on February 12 in the Beggs Ballroom. Each Panhellenic chapter had the opportunity to give out individual chapter awards. - <u>Postgrad & PC</u>: Held on April 8 in the RSC. 12 Panhellenic seniors from various chapters were present to hear presentations on financial stability and student loan management, and transitioning into life after college with an emphasis on self-care. We gave away a variety of prizes, including a WSU diploma frame, donated from the University Bookstore.
- <u>Sister Mixer:</u> Held on October 19 and April 29. Both events took place outdoors on Omega Court and all Panhellenic sorority members were invited. The October event was "Fall" themed where we had pizza, decorated pumpkins and had a pumpkin pie eating contest (waivers were signed). The April event was 90's theme and included a costume contest, 90's themed candy and toys/activities.

Community Events

• <u>Meet and Greek:</u> Held on August 22 and January 30 (had to be rescheduled from January 16 due to a snow day). Was held in Shocker Sports Grill & Lanes and we offered free bowling, billiards and popcorn. We auctioned off three prizes including a wireless printer, a Shocker pride basket and a school preparation basket for both events. At the fall event, we offered a scholarship to a student.

- <u>President and Advisor Training</u>: Held on August 26 and January 20. The Fall training included going over new policies for FSL, as well as changes to the conduct process, a review of the semester calendar and the new concealed carry policy for the university. In the afternoon we had a training for the New Member Greek Council. In the spring training, we discussed campus safety, the Care Team, conduct procedures and event registration. In the afternoon, advisors left and we did a training with the chapter presidents which included team builders, a discussion on current events, and a session on self-care.
- <u>New Member Greek Academy & Greeks Getting Twisted:</u> Held on September 24 and February 18. The Fall event was held in Hubbard Hall and we played a Greek Life Jeopardy game, had a financial presentation from Meritrust, a time management presentation from Order of Omega, a panel with council presidents and so much more. We ended with our Greeks Getting Twisted event on Omega Court where we cooked burgers and hot dogs. Our spring event was held in the Beggs Ballroom in the RSC. We took a different approach and covered a variety of topics. We did a history of Greek Life, facilitated icebreakers, had a council president's panel, had a presentation of values based organizations and put our values into action with the "Who Killed Jane Doe?" activity.
- <u>Greek Retreat:</u> Held October 13-15 at Camp Hiawatha in Park City, Kansas. 36 Greek students of varying ages participated in Greek Retreat over fall break at Camp Hiawatha. The curriculum was based on the Kansas Leadership Center's teaching on leadership and adaptive challenges. Participants explored adaptive challenges through the lens of Fraternity and Sorority Life by attending sessions that focused on the four leadership competencies: diagnose situation, manage self, energize others and intervene skillfully. The conversation was tied around the idea of Greek unity and how to build that over time. Additionally, the students participated in a high ropes and low ropes course and completed community service by painting cabins at Camp Hiawatha. The students developed their leadership skills, but most importantly grew a tight-knit bond of Greek unity that remained in place the rest of the academic year.
- <u>HIStory:</u> Was supposed to be held March 2-4. Due to low application numbers, the event was cancelled.
- <u>Kallistei:</u> Held March 9-10. This is a two-day retreat held at Camp Hiawatha focusing on the areas of wellness in women. 18 women participated in the retreat this year. The retreat curriculum was revamped this year based on feedback from previous year's participants. The retreat helped women focus on becoming more balanced leaders and individuals by focusing on different areas of wellness. Through a survey conducted to create the curriculum the women reported that they would like to address their emotional, intellectual and social wellness in relation to their leadership roles on campus. Along with these three major areas, women focused on their financial, physical, occupational, and spiritual wellness through small breakout sessions. Many of these topics were tied into empowering women to be strong leaders within their chapter, the Fraternity and Sorority Life community, and the Wichita State University community; while also focusing on their overall self-confidence to be effective as a leader.

- <u>Annual Greek Awards:</u> Held on February 26 with interviews taking place on January 27, January 29 and January 30. Held in the Metroplex, the entire community, along with chapter advisors and university partners, were invited to attend the event. A reception was held before for award nominees and award nominators. The event started at 7:00 p.m. and was our shortest Greek Awards ceremony to date, with a 45-minute ceremony.
- <u>FSL Workshops</u> (workshops will be discontinued after the Spring 2018 semester due to low attendance):
 - o September 25: Where is the Line?, Hidden harms of hazing
 - October 30: The Power of Your Brand, Marketing techniques and how to build your personal brand.
 - November 27: Does everyone have a seat at the table?, Ageism in chapters, engaging all members, regardless of year accepted into the chapter.
 - February 5: Standing Up, Stepping In and Speaking Out, Risk management, risk level of events.
 - o March 12: Moving Forward Together, Effective communication, conflict resolution.
 - o April 2: Padding the Chapter Pockets, Fundraising and financial responsibility.
- <u>Monthly Meetings:</u>
 - <u>Greek Relations Team Meeting:</u> Made up of the Greek Relations chairs for all councils, the team meets every other week to plan events such as council mixers, New Member Greek Academy and more.
 - <u>Public Relations Team Meeting:</u> Made up of the Public Relations chairs for all councils, the team meets every other week to coordinate marketing efforts for social media and for campus. The team did not meet in Spring 2018, as the office was short staffed.
 - <u>Chapter President Meetings (1 per month)</u>: Typically held the last Thursday of the month (excluding January, May, June, July, August and December). Each chapter is represented, and if the chapter president is not able to attend then a chapter officer can come in their place. Guest speakers are invited to attend at the beginning of the meeting and chapters are given the opportunity to announce upcoming events and bring forward community issues at the end of the meeting after all agenda items are discussed.

Rhatigan Legacy Award

After the conclusion of the 2015 awards cycle, the Rhatigan Standards for Fraternal Excellence was combined with the Outstanding Fraternity and Sorority Award to create the Rhatigan Legacy Award. The Rhatigan Legacy Award was scored based on three equally weighed sections and judged by three sets of judges. The sections include a statistics section that focuses on retention, philanthropy, service, programming, academics, and goals; an essay section that focuses on the chapter's legacy, improvements, and development; and a presentation section where chapters will be given a prompt each year to tie to their chapter. The first section was scored by Fraternity and Sorority Life staff, the second section was scored by Fraternity and Sorority Life Advisors from other institutions and the third section was judged by Greek alumni working at WSU that are not affiliated with any chapter on campus. The fraternity and sorority with the highest score won the Rhatigan Legacy Award, and then any chapter receiving at least 80% of the points received the Gold Level of the Rhatigan Standards of Fraternal Excellence, and any chapter receiving at least 75% of the points received the Silver Level of the Rhatigan Standards of Fraternal Excellence.

Leadership

Having introduced all three tiered leadership programs, Student Involvement continued to create and expand the amount of leadership programs offered. The growth in participation confirmed the students' interest and commitment to formal leadership opportunities at WSU. This included offering programs that students could earn academic credit for by officially registering and completing coursework. Those students who earned credit for completing the program could apply those credits towards the Undergraduate Leadership Certificate. In the 2017-2018 academic year, the following nine programs were offered.

Emerging Leaders Program

Emerging Leaders is a unique opportunity for first year students at WSU to get on the fast track to student leadership, campus and community involvement. Students who participate in the Emerging Leaders Program receive an insider's perspective on Student Involvement at WSU. Throughout the program, students had an opportunity to develop their leadership abilities through workshops, activities and reflection in order to prepare them for future leadership experience at WSU and beyond. Students were paired with upperclassmen mentors.

We had 10 students complete the program and nine mentors who helped guide them. Five students enrolled and received one academic credit each by completing course requirements. The program began in January and ended in April. There were a variety of leadership topics covered as well as exposure to different styles of leadership including their own and how it's applied in their day to day. Students completed a pre and post assessment that can be found in the assessment section of this report.

Engaging Leaders Program

The Engaging Leaders Program offers students the unique opportunity to explore, discuss and analyze various professional fields directed by executive officials from different companies, corporations and industries throughout the Wichita area. The program introduces participants to those leadership skills that rising leaders should possess and consider when choosing a career path. The program provides for visits to various city facilities, exposure to different philosophies and styles of leadership and gives participants a chance to assemble facts, evaluate options and become more comfortable with the transition from the classroom to the boardroom. Two students who enrolled received one academic credit each by completing course requirements. The program ran for eight weeks from February through April and received partial sponsorship from Northwestern Mutual. Ten students completed the program visiting six different leaders/sites. Those sites included Christina House/COACH, Ben Simon/Freddy's Frozen Custard & Steakburgers Headquarters, Alex Swainsbury/Northwestern Mutual, Robert Layton/Wichita City Manager, and Thane Chastain/Kansas Leadership Center.

Evolving Leaders Program

The Evolving Leaders Program is for returning students to WSU who are looking to expand upon their leadership skills and abilities. The new curriculum featured five different leadership inventories/ assessments including StrengthsQuest, True Colors, Myers Briggs and Leadership Style Assessment, and a newly introduce assessment called the Professional DynaMetric Programs - PDP ProScan. The program was administered over an eight week time period in the Fall Semester and hosted on Fridays based on past participant feedback. The highest number of Evolving Leaders applied and completed the program. 33 students applied and 27 students completed the experience.

Leadership Book Club

The Leadership Book Club began in the fall of 2015 with the goal of 10 participants. Since its eginning, it has been a program that faculty, staff and students look forward to and get excited about. The title selection for the fall semester was Leading Imperfectly by James Robilotta and the spring title was Greater Than Yourself by Steve Farber. Each week, those in attendance would discuss the chapters assigned and share their thoughts on the leadership lessons shared in the book. With the buzz over book club gaining ground again, we will host a summer session over the title Creating Magic by Lee Cockerell. Plans and ideas for increasing and implementing new titles and reaching more participants are in the works for the 2018-2019 academic year.

WSU Student of the Year

The WSU Student of the Year Scholarship, formerly known as the Man and Woman of the Year Scholarship, is awarded to two outstanding students who have shown exemplary leadership, involvement and service to both the WSU and Wichita communities. Candidates had to meet the following requirements: must have at least a 3.0 cumulative G.P.A., must be currently enrolled in at least six credit hours at WSU, and must have completed at least 60 hours with at least 30 hours from WSU. We received 98 applicants, 59 of them completed the initial screening to move forward. Each completed application included responses to essay questions, resume and a letter of recommendation. Select applicants interviewed with a panel of faculty and staff whom determined the top eight finalists. Finalists gave a 10-minute presentation on their "one word." The selected word demonstrates how they would live out the rest of the academic year as a leader and impact they hope to have on campus and in the community. This concept is based on the book: *One Word that will Change your Life.* The finalists were honored at a banquet as well as at Songfest during Shocktoberfest.

The Summer Leadership Institute (SLI)

The Summer Leadership Institute (SLI) is a five-day experience that allows participants to evolve and expand upon their leadership skills and abilities. SLI took place at Camp Wood in Elmdale, KS. We received 90 applicants (an increase of 27 applicants from last year, and 38 from the previous year) and selected 45 students to attend in addition to the five student leaders who attended and helped with the planning of the week. SLI is open to any student looking to grow as a leader and they ranged from freshmen through graduate students. Each student was assigned a leadership squad who they met with throughout the institute and had the opportunity to discuss and reflect upon the leadership lessons taught. To help guide students throughout the week, each squad was assigned two leaders, one staff member and one student leader who had attended SLI in a previous year. The vision statement for SLI was "Developing ethical leaders through self-discovery and action!" There were four learning objectives.

- 1. Understand what it means to be an ethical leader.
- 2. Self-actualization through reflection and assessment.
- 3. Enhancing effective commination skills through team dynamics.
- 4. Commitment to becoming an ethical leader through self-discovery and action.

The LeaderShape® InstituteTM

This year, Dr. Hall introduced the LeaderShape® Institute[™] to our department. We were able to host the 2018 LeaderShape Institute on campus for the first time in six years. LeaderShape is a 6-day experience that challenges participants to lead with integrity. This nationally recognized organization facilitates participants through a series of dynamic, challenging, and exciting sessions designed to increase, develop, and launch the leadership capacity of students. This experience will not only benefit them individually, but professionally and the communities/organizations they go on to lead and serve in the future. Participants cultivate leadership skills, reflect, and discuss leadership lessons within a small cohort or cluster of students. This year, 75 students applied and 57 completed the institute.

LEAD Conference

Student Involvement set the goal to host a drive-in leadership conference after researching peer and aspirational institutions and seeing that there was no such conference in the region. 2016 marked the inaugural year of the LEAD Conference at WSU. The LEAD Conference is a regional leadership drive-in open to any student from any college or university who would like to network with other student leaders as well as expand upon their leadership skills and abilities. This year we hosted keynote speaker Darryl Bellamy Jr. We sought out proposals for breakouts and were able to bring in six breakout presenters from various stages in their WSU careers (graduate students – tenured faculty) as well as a graduate student from another institution and a WSU Alumni. This year, we had 55 people register to attend LEAD. Six of these registrants attended from a different university.

The National Society for Leadership and Success (NSLS)

This year NSLS focused on rebuilding their presence on campus to provide more opportunities for their members. This year, the transition in leadership took place within the executive board. Numerous members had to step away during their term due to various circumstances. These positions became vacant for a while causing more work to stretch out among the remaining members. After the fall semester, we continued to notice a lack of engagement within our executive board as well as our membership in general. The decision was made to discontinue hosting a chapter of NSLS on our campus. The spring semester focused on getting as many members inducted as possible before the chapter was dissolved. 74 new members were inducted into the society.

Recognized Student Organizations

Registration and Renewal

WSU students have created approximately 235 organizations that range from graphic arts to intramural sports. With this diverse collection of student organizations, students are able to explore their interests and passions while contributing to a vibrant campus climate and close-knit student community. Student organizations provide far-reaching efforts to create intersections of identity, perspectives and in helping student adjust to campus.

At the beginning of FY18, we worked closely with the SGA Organization Outreach Committee to ensure that student groups renewed their organization on time. Part of that job was also cleaning up our OrgSync portal. We went through and deleted organizations that had not renewed in 2+ years and disabled organizations that had not renewed in 1+ years. The Student Government Association Organization Outreach Committee did great work contacting all provisional organizations throughout each semester to ensure that they had the resources they needed to renew and update their organizations.

Student Involvement Fair

Every fall, we host the Student Involvement Fair. This fair is the best way to learn about cocurricular and extracurricular activities at Wichita State. Held during Welcomefest each fall, members of more than 100 student organizations will be on hand to share with students a little bit about what they do and how to get involved. This fall, 79 student groups participated in the Student Involvement fair.

Nuts and Bolts Conference

Every fall, Student Involvement plans a training seminar for student organizations to be updated on university policy and procedure. The Nuts & Bolts Conference is designed to introduce the resources available through Student Involvement and WSU, connect organizations to SGA and update organizations on the university policies and procedures that affect student organizations. This event is required for organization renewal each year and **two (2) members** of the organization must attend. This fall, 110 student organizations attended and participated.

<u>Springfest</u>

Springfest is a kick-off for the Spring semester for both student organizations and university departments. Located in the Heskett Center Gym, this event acts as a way for WSU students to check out the many different organizations we have on campus, as well as discover the amazing resources this campus offers. Along with informational tables, Springfest includes music, inflatables, food, prizes, and contests for all students to participate. This spring, 65 groups, departments and programs participated in Springfest.

Types of Organizations

- 1. Recognized Student Organization: An organization that has completed the annual renewal process, in which at least eighty (80) percent of total members are currently enrolled University students.
- 1. University/Departmental/Community Organization: An organization in which at least fifty (50) percent of total members are currently enrolled University students.
- 2. *Provisional Organization*: An organization in its first year of existence or in which less than fifty (50) percent of total members are University students. *Groups which do not adhere to university policy, may be placed on provisional status.

Classification of Organizations

- Academic & Professional (A/P): Organizations related to an academic discipline/college or professional field available at Wichita State University.
- **Cultural/International (C/I):** Organizations promoting or enhancing a specific culture(s) or related activities on campus. The objectives are aimed to explore and celebrate their own cultural heritage and provide programs and services.
- **Community Service (CS):** Organizations providing volunteer services or assistance to the university and local community through altruistic or philanthropy events.
- **Fraternity/Sorority (F/S):** Organizations affiliated with the Interfraternity Council, Multicultural Greek Council or Women's Panhellenic Association.
- **Governing/Representative Councils (G/R):** Organizations which coordinate and/or govern a specific population or member Organizations. Organizations must be approved by Student Involvement.
- **Graduate Interest (GI):** Organizations solely focused on the advancement and development of graduate students.
- Honorary (H): Organizations formed to recognize or honor excellence in a specific field and which have selective membership i.e. requirements for membership.
- Other (O): Organizations which do not fit in one of the other categories listed.
- **Political (P):** Organizations affiliated with or promoting a particular party, individual or issue in local, state, national or international politics.
- **Recreation Clubs (RC):** Recreational Clubs are sports-related interest organizations that meet all Recognized Student Organization (RSO) policies and focus around self-exploration for it members. Recreational Clubs are deemed high-risk organizations and must have every member sign a waiver absolving Wichita State University, its staff and designees from any liability due to member negligence.
- **Sports Clubs (S):** Organizations established for a competitive recreational purpose (Organizations wishing to obtain Sports Club status must contact the Coordinator of Intramural Sports and Competition in Campus Recreation). These organizations are not eligible for RSO funding through Student Government Association other than what is allocated to the Sports Club program. The organizations will also be governed by the Sports Club Manual.

- **Religious (R):** Organizations affiliated with or promoting a religion, set of religious beliefs or lack thereof.
- **Residence Hall (RH):** Organizations whose members reside in university student housing facilities or their associates.
- Special Interest (SI): Organizations promoting or related to specific, defined interests.

Event Registration

RSOs at WSU plan events throughout the year that add to student life and campus culture. This year, organizations utilized OrgSync to publicize and promote 1,125 events. Of the 1,125 events, 174 were required to be registered with Student Involvement.

Any group planning to host an event which meets the below mentioned parameters must complete an RSO event registration form in its entirety, ensuring that all officials are in agreement on the expectations and execution of plans. This form, and the entire event planning process, must be completed in its entirety at least ten (10) business days prior to an event and submitted via OrgSync to Student Involvement. All University locations must be reserved tentatively prior to the submission of this form.

The following are variables that help define an event registration:

- Over one hundred (100) people will be attending
- Money will be exchanged
- The event is open and/or marketed to the general public
- Alcohol will be served
- Food will be served
- The event requires the RSO to enter into a contract with another entity
- A controversial/political topic may be discussed
- The event is outdoors and on-campus
- Event is publicized (more than three of the following items are used: Facebook, poster, handbill, texting message, website, formal invitation, Twitter, organizational calendar, information table)

Mission & Vision Committee

A team consisting of the SAC President, chairpersons, general members and the Graduate Assistant for Student Activities, completed this evaluation by distributing a survey to gather member insight. The data from this survey was used to recreate the mission, vision and values of the Student Activities Council. They are as follows:

Organization Goals

- 1. By the end of December 2017, we will retain 80% of new members
 - a. Fall 2017 marked the first semester that SAC Members were coded in the University Banner system. This was the metric used to determine member retention from Fall 2017 to Fall 2018. Based on this information, the percentage of SAC members retained from Fall 2017 to Spring 2018 was 52%.
- 2. Establish marketing committee to attend 10 organizations/classes each semester.
 - a. Marketing committee was formed in Fall of 2017 and with the help of the officer team reached out to 20 student organization with no response from the groups.
- 3. By the end of Spring, incorporate learning outcomes in our programs and assessment.
 - a. This goal is ongoing as the department looks at creating a leadership development curriculum for all SI Leaders.
- 4. By the end of Spring, marketing tools will be assessed and evaluated. Recommendation will be made for future Executive Board.
 - a. Recommendations included a decrease in print marketing such as posters and buttons. Mass postering will be limited to after-hours events and programs requiring registrations.
- 5. By the end of Fall, we will create a new signature program that is newsworthy for Spring semester.
 - a. In the spring semester SAC hosted Coffeehouse Music Series which was awarded New Program of the Year at Shocker Leadership Awards
 - b. Hosted internationally touring detectives who inspired the Netflix Original Series, NARCOS

On Going Initatives

Shocker Support Locker: In the summer of 2017 it was decided to find a better location for the Food Locker. The Locker was located in the SGA office, which had limited hours. After much disucssion with Facilities Planning and other departments on campus, a space in Grace Wilkie Hall was designated as the future location of the Locker. The decision was also made to expand the Locker to offer hyigene products and professional clothing. Given this, the name of the space was

changed to the Shocker Support Locker. In July 2017 the Locker moved to it's new space. The Locker spaces in the SGA Office and in Fairmount Hall were closed down.

Over the course of the year new partnerships were formed, which supported the Locker. One was with Starbucks. In the summer of 2017, in conjunction with the Community Service Board, the food recovered from the on campus Starbucks was being gleaned and taken to the Locker. Additionally in the summer of 2017, WSU saw a new food service provider on campus, Chartwells. As part of this new contract, Chartwells would donate \$10,000 toward the Locker. Other partnerships and/or donations included Save-A-Lot, College of Education, Rhatigan Student Center, Physical Plant, University faculty and staff and many anonymous donors from the surrounding community. Another vital parternship over the year was with the Liberal Arts and Sciences Advising Center. They graciously agreed to open and close the Locker Monday-Friday 8 a.m-5 p.m, so extended hours could be offered.

The new space proved to be a hit with students and staff. Over the course of the year it is estimated that over 1,000 people utalized the space, with 2,000 lbs of product donated. In partnership with the Career Development Center, a professional clothing drive was executed. There were many faculty, staff, alumni and community members who donated clothing for students. Over the course of two days, 49 students took advantage of this new resource and were outfitted with professional clothing for jobs, internships, interivews, etc.

Campus Safety Walk: The third annual campus Safety Walk was held on November 2, 2017. There were 13 organizations who came to the fair before the walk. Over 30 students attended and helped walk around campus and identify potential safety issues.

Legal Services: The 60th Session worked with Kansas Legal Services to offer three days where students could sign up to meet with an attorney. One of these days was designated just for answering questions about immigration issues. Over 50 students took advantage of this service.

Collegiate Readership Program: At the beginning of the session the Collegiate Readership program was evaluated. It was discovered that there were long term issues with the papers being delivered to campus or delivered late. Over the course of the fall semster the delivery of papers was tracked. It was confimed that the company who supplied the papers were not adhereing to the contract details but were still charging SGA for the papers. A letter was sent to the company to give them 30 days to fix the issue. After 30 days the situation was reevaluated and it was found the situation had not improved. During this time, SGA administered a campus wide survey. One of the componets of the survey was asking if students knew about the Collegiate Readership Program and if they did, did they utalize it. Over 60% of respondents did not know about the program and of those who did over 50% never picked up a paper. Based on the survey data, but more importantly the lack of delivered papers, the decision was made to stop the Readership Program.

60th Session Initivities

Engage with Paige: monthly video of the SGA President Paige Hungate answering questions submitted via the website

Talk/Coffee with a Cop: An open forum where WSU Police were on hand to answer questions

Diversity Townhall: An open forum where the SGA cabinet answered questions and addressed issues of divertsity on campus

Lunch and Learn: An opporunity for students to engage with women leaders

It's On Us: Held in conjunction with Walk A Mile, this event sought to raise awareness about sexual assault and domestic violence

Cut H8: An initiative that helped to promote a more inclusive and safe environment at Wichita State

Here's the Scoop: A passive programming event, where different topics were address via an infographic. The information was sent out the first Thursday of each month. Topics included parking, student fees, guns on campus, innovation campus funding, program fees and election changes

Dreamers Scholarship: In conjuncation with Sigma Lamnda Beta International Fraternity, SGA began to sponsor scholarships for DACA students. \$2,500 was set aside in the SGA budget with an additional \$1,000 donated from Sigma Lamda Beta

Campus Survey: In November 2017 SGA disseminated a survey to a sample of 4,500 students. This survey covered the topics of the plus/minus system, fall break, computer services on campus, campus safety and the collegiate readership program

- Developed the Cut H8 program, an initiative created to develop a safe place for the WSU community to report incidents of bias they witness or experience, alongside the Office of the Vice President of Student Affairs
- Gave professional clothing attire to 48 Shockers who visited the Shocker Support Locker and Career Development Center partnership event
- Gave resources to over 1,000 students utilizing the Shocker Support Locker
- Handled over 200 cases through the Student Advocate's office to assist with students' needs
- Hosted a safety walk that allowed for safety issues on campus to be identified and resolved
- Implemented a training and educational program which brought student senators together on a monthly basis
- Improved relationships with the Kansas Board of Regents and other Student Body Presidents across the state, which allowed for collaboration on many efforts
- Increased student fees by 1%, the smallest increase to occur in over 15 years
- Increased student representation on the Supreme Court
- Increased the amount of money allocated to students through individual and organizational funding by \$10,000
- Increased the financial aid given through Student Government to international students by over \$10,000
- Made updates to the SGA election system which included changing to an individualized election system where senators will run separately from the Presidential and Vice-Presidential candidates
- Partnered with the University by putting forward \$45,000 to purchase security cameras that will go on all blue emergency light poles
- Passed 143 senate bills and 27 resolutions to better students' lives
- Received over 2,000 pounds of donations to the Shocker Support Locker
- Recognized 20 new student organizations
- Recommended to the Faculty Senate a change to a week-long Thanksgiving Break from the current 2-day Fall Break and 3-day Thanksgiving Break
- Served over 50 people through the legal services program
- Updated all pronouns within the Legislative Journal to be gender neutral
- Worked to get many parking wins for students including allowing students to continue to park on the second and third floor of the parking garage in the spring semester and developing a parking quiz that gives students who receive a ticket the opportunity to be forgiven of their fine
- Worked with Student Health, Counseling Services, Campus Recreation, and the YMCA to develop plans for the new Wellness Center and YMCA that is slated to come to campus in January of 2020







Over the past 12 months, how have you connected with Student Involvement?





IFC New Member Survey Analysis

Demographics

For the fall 2018 New Member survey, there were a total of 38 respondents: Delta Upsilon (10), FarmHouse (9), Lambda Chi Alpha (1), Sigma Phi Epsilon (5), Beta Theta Pi (8), Sigma Alpha Epsilon (5), and Phi Delta Theta (0). 92% of the participants were sophomores or freshmen in college. The three most prominent majors selected were Liberal Arts and Sciences, Engineering and Business. 68% of respondents were from Wichita or Kansas, with the rest being from out of state.

Chapter Summaries

Beta Theta Pi

The top three reasons recruits joined Beta Theta Pi were their current members, values, reputation on campus and the financial costs. Beta Theta Pi also did really well in contacting Potential New Members (PNM's) through phone calls and events. The top three reasons recruits did not join Beta Theta Pi were the chapter facility, participation on campus and party reputation.

Delta Upsilon

The top three reasons recruits joined Delta Upsilon were their current members, values and financial costs. All of these reasons got the same score. Delta Upsilon also relied heavily on phone calls and events for recruitment. The top three reasons recruits did not join Delta Upsilon were chapter facility, reputation on campus and chapter participation.

FarmHouse

The top three reasons recruits joined FarmHouse were their values, philanthropy and academic standing. There was no real contact outreach from FarmHouse seeing as only six respondents said they were contacted by FarmHouse before signing another house. Two FarmHouse new members were only contacted once before signing. The top three reasons recruits did not join FarmHouse were their chapter facility, financial costs and reputation of hazing.

Lambda Chi Alpha

The top three reasons recruits joined Lambda Chi Alpha were their current members, values and financial cost. Most of Lambda Chi Alpha's recruiting tactics seemed to be through word of mouth and cold calls. They did a good job of keeping their number of contacts in the 2-4 area; not under/over contacting the recruit. The top three reasons recruits did not join Lambda Chi Alpha are their alumni support, chapter facility and reputation on campus.

Phi Delta Theta

The top three reasons recruits joined Phi Delta Theta were academic standing, chapter facility and current members. Phi Delta Theta reaches most of their PNM's through phone calls and current member referrals. The top three reasons people did not join Phi Delta Theta were their financial costs, current members and relationship with WSU Fraternities and Sororities.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon

The top three reasons recruits joined Sigma Alpha Epsilon were their current members, values and philanthropy. Sigma Alpha Epsilon balanced between cold calls, referrals and mailers for recruitment. The top three reasons recruits did not join Sigma Alpha Epsilon were alumni support, financial costs and current members.

Sigma Phi Epsilon

The top three reasons recruits joined Sigma Phi Epsilon were their current members, values and chapter facility. Just like Phi Delta Theta, Sigma Phi Epsilon reaches the most PNM's through phone calls and current member referrals. The top three reasons recruits did not join Sigma Phi Epsilon are financial costs, current members and relationship with WSU Fraternities and Sororities.

General Remarks

A returning theme from previous years is how hard it is for Wichita State IFC fraternities to survive and grow without a chapter facility of any kind. It is not impossible by any means, but having some sort of house or chapter specific facility is definitely a plus for WSU IFC fraternities. However, three out of the four biggest chapters with houses had issues with members not joining because of financial costs. This will always be an issue because having a facility requires much more revenue, which could be minimized through better communication between PNM's and recruiters. We also see an increase in the lack of engagement of members over the summer resulting in a stronger fall recruitment.

Ways to Improve Recruitment

One of the best ways we can improve the financial cost issue is to have each chapter create a sheet of every possible expense (chapter wise) that a PNM could incur over the next year of membership and explain it in detail to all of the recruits. It would also help if IFC created a very general one that showed a comparison to university and off campus housing. This would keep a lot of PNM's from feeling overwhelmed with the financial requirements and minimize financial surprises. This initiative should be the council's responsibility to complete.

Conclusion

Overall, the results were nothing out of the ordinary. Many of the obstacles shown are par for the course and will always be issues that the Greek community has to combat. Many recruitment improvements can come from systematic things, both at IFC and Chapter levels. Much of this can come from chapters trading ideas and abilities, but with recruitment being such a competitive area everyone wants to keep their competitive edge. Many chapters excel in places where others lack the expertise. Even though collaboration will bring the competition closer, the community as a whole will expand.

Panhellenic Recruitment Assessment

Outline of Recruitment

The Wichita State University Panhellenic Council hosted its Formal Recruitment program from September 8-11, 2017. This program follows the guidelines of the National Panhellenic Conference and provides a platform for organizations to recruit potential new members based on mutual values. 

How far do you live from the main Wichita State campus?



APPENDIX II: POLICIES & PROCEDURES

STUDENT INVOLVEMENT POLICIES & PROCEDURES

Student Involvement Policies and Procedures are general guidelines and instructions set forth. They may be changed, modified, suspended, or canceled, in whole or part, at any time according to the needs of the office. The Student Involvement Office Manager or designee is responsible for oversight of office policies.

Policy 1: Bomb Threat or Suspicious Object Response

A bomb threat or suspicious object response may be warranted for the following:

- Receiving a threatening phone call
- Receiving a suspicious letter or parcel
- Discovering a suspicious object somewhere on the premises
- A suspicious item can be anything which is out of place and cannot be accounted for or any item suspected of being an explosive device
- You may be the one who makes the discovery or you may be the one to whom it is reported

Bomb threats are delivered in a variety of ways. The majority of threats are called in to the target. Occasionally these calls are through a third party. Sometimes a threat is communicated in writing or by a recording. Two logical explanations for reporting a bomb threat are:

- 1. The caller has definite knowledge or believes that an explosive or incendiary bomb has been or will be placed and he/she wants to minimize personal injury or property damage. The caller may be the person who placed the device or someone who has become aware of such information;
- 2. The caller wants to create an atmosphere of anxiety and panic which will, in turn, result in a disruption of the normal activities at the facility where the device is purportedly placed. Whatever the reason for the report, there will certainly be a reaction to it. Through proper planning, the wide variety of potentially uncontrollable reactions can be greatly reduced.

If you receive a bomb threat by telephone:

- Remain calm
- Listen carefully be polite and show interest
- Try to keep the caller talking so you can gather as much information as possible about the device, the validity of the threat, or the identity of the caller
- Use the "Explosive Device Data Record" sheet as a guide to question caller and gather as much relevant information as possible. Form is located on the Activities Share Drive:/!Student Involvement/Policies
- If a threat has been received by another individual, get as much information as possible
- Upon completion of the call, immediately notify the University Police Department at 911 (from a campus phone) or 978-3450

In the event you discover a suspicious object:

- Keep anyone from handling it or going near it
- Do not use portable radio or cellular equipment within 100 yards of a suspicious item
- Notify the University Police Department <u>IMMEDIATELY</u>
- Remain calm
- Guide all those in the vicinity to a safe location at least 100 yards away

Policy 2: Computer Usage

Student Involvement computers are to be used primarily for student group related work. Students may use the computers for personal use, but if another student, office assistant or staff member needs to use the computer for Student Involvement related work, this will take precedence.

Student Involvement computers are not to be treated as personal computers. Do not download programs onto Student Involvement computers without permission. Do not save files on the desktop or create folders under My Documents. Documents related to Student Involvement areas should be saved under the appropriate folder on the appropriate network drive. The Activities Share drive (T:) is to be used for documents, information, Excel sheets, pictures, etc. pertaining to Student Involvement areas.

When printing from a Student Involvement computer, students must use the appropriate print code/group name. If printing items that are unrelated to Student Involvement, let the front desk know and they will provide assistance. Black and white copies, for personal use, are \$.05 per page and color copies are \$.15 per page.

Laptops: Laptop usage follows the same guidelines as above in addition to:

- 1. <u>Laptops must be reserved and checked out with a Student Involvement staff member or student</u> <u>assistant (Refer to SI Policy 5: Equipment Use)</u>
- 2. Laptops may not be reserved or kept overnight without prior authorization

Policy 3: Display Cases

The Student Involvement display cases, located on the first floor of the Rhatigan Student Center (RSC), are a service provided by Student Involvement for student groups, organizations and departments of Wichita State University (WSU) to promote their activities and/or recruit membership for their areas. Reservation of these cases is handled in Student Involvement, RSC 216, according to the following guidelines:

Reservations

- 1. The display cases can be used by any registered WSU organization or department at no cost.
- 2. Reservations are made on a first-come, first-served basis.
- 3. Reservations of either case are limited to a one week period of time, beginning and ending on a Friday at 2 p.m.
- 4. Due to a high demand for use of the cases, each group can only reserve one case during a semester. However, discretion of use and length can be determined by the Student Involvement Office Manager.
- 5. To reserve a display case, the name of the group, a contact name, telephone number and dates needed must be provided.
- 6. Cancellations should be made at least one week in advance by calling 316-978-3022 or emailing getinvolved@wichita.edu.
- 7. The display cases are to be used exclusively by WSU organizations and departments. Exceptions require approval by the Student Involvement Office Manager.
- 8. If you reserve a display case and do not call/email to cancel in a timely manner or do not use the display case at your reserved time, you will forfeit display case privileges for your entire organization for the remainder of the semester.

Set-up/tear down

1. All displays must be put up during regular office hours, which are 8 a.m.-7 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and Friday 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

- 2. All displays must be removed by 2 p.m. on Friday (at the end of the reserved week). If a display is not taken down by this time, Student Involvement reserves the right to remove the display for the next group. Student Involvement cannot assume responsibility for damage or theft while taking down or storing the display items.
- 3. Keys to the display cases may be checked out by leaving a WSU Shocker Card or valid driver's license with Student Involvement. Keys must be returned immediately after any exhibit is put up or taken down. *Keys cannot be checked out overnight*.

Guidelines

- 1. The cases do not come with accessories. Groups must provide their own display materials and accessories.
- 2. Nails, screws, or any material causing permanent marring of the display cases are not to be used. Peel-off stickers are not to be applied to any part of the case. No materials should be placed on the outside of the cases.
- 3. Internal dimensions of the cases are...
 - a. 48.70" high x 107.95" wide x 18.55" deep in the lounge.
 - b. 48.65" high x 108" wide x 18.55" deep across from bookstore.

Display Materials Policies

- 1. The display cases cannot be used to promote, advertise or otherwise advocate an illegal activity or violation of any WSU policy.
- 2. All materials in the case must be written in and/or have a translated copy displayed in the English language.
- 3. Any group using the display case must identify the display as being sponsored by their organization/department and include a telephone number, email and website for further information.
- 4. If a group violates one or more of these policies, Student Involvement will notify the group to rectify the situation immediately. In the event a member of the sponsoring group cannot be reached, Student Involvement reserves the right to take down the display and will notify the group of the action taken. Student Involvement reserves the right to deny future use of the display cases to any group who has previously violated policies.

Damages/Liability

- 1. Wichita State University, the Rhatigan Student Center and Student Involvement are not liable for damages to items in the display cases.
- 2. Any damages to the display cases done by a group using the cases will be charged to the organization or department.

Policy 4: Dress Code

The personal appearance of every staff member is an important component of maintaining a student centered learning environment. In order to achieve the total educational process an appropriate dress code which promotes a positive image of the university must be presented at all times. Staff are expected to dress business casual Monday-Thursday and may wear casual dress on Fridays, unless their schedule dictates otherwise. Student staff are not expected to dress business casual, but must also follow the standards set in the table below. While at events, student councils governed by Student Involvement are also expected to maintain appropriate dress, which will be dictated by the staff member that advises the group.

Accommodations: In the event that the above policy causes religious concerns or concerns based upon any other legally protected class, an employee should contact their supervisor to discuss an appropriate accommodation. If a student or staff member has any questions on the policy, they should speak with their direct supervisor.

Policy 5: Equipment Use

Student Involvement has equipment available for checkout to WSU campus organizations, clubs and departments on a first come, first served basis. Equipment is for use mainly on the Wichita State main campus.* Reservations must be made <u>at least six business days in advance of the event</u> by completing the Equipment Use Form. * Equipment requests are considered on a timely basis and must be signed before getting approval. Once a decision is made, Student Involvement will contact the group by phone or email.

Precedence for equipment use is given as follows:

Tier 1: Student Involvement staff and student groups directly advised by Student Involvement
Tier 2: Recognized Student Organizations
Tier 3: Campus Departments

Tier 1 groups can utilize any equipment available in Student Involvement. Tiers 2 & 3 may only use equipment listed on the approved equipment loan list.

Advanced reservations will be taken no more than one semester in advance. Any special requests will be considered on a case by case basis according to the availability of the equipment. Equipment used after normal office hours should be returned to the Student Involvement office by contacting an RSC Building Manager at (316) 978-3028. Overnight check-out of SOME equipment is allowed, but the student organization advisor or a full-time departmental staff member must check out the equipment. Damage to the equipment during use due to negligence will be the responsibility of the reserving party, who will be billed for the cost of repair or replacement, and will result in forfeiture of equipment use for the remainder of the semester.

Equipment not returned on time will be charged a fee of \$5.00 per hour for the first three hours. After three hours, a charge of \$40.00 will incur. If the equipment is not returned within 24 hours of the original return time, the responsible party will be charged the cost of the equipment.

If the responsible party fails to pay any incurred fees or fines within 30 days, the debt will be transferred to the individual checking out the equipment.

Equipment not returned on time, not picked up as requested or returned damaged will result in forfeiture of equipment use for the remainder of the semester.

The following equipment is available for checkout; this does not include all items. For a complete list, please contact Student Involvement:

- For use only on RSC property: large sound system, spotlight
- For use only on Wichita State main campus: small sound system, microphone, mic equipment, electrical cord, power strip, laptop, projector, two-way radios, projection screen, sporting equipment

Student Involvement reserves the right to approve or reject any request.

*Some equipment can be loaned for off-campus use or with a shortened timeline at the discretion of the Office Manager and with approval from organization advisors or Department heads.

Policy 6: Fire Procedure

In the event of a fire emergency, all building occupants should evacuate the building by using the stairway, **<u>NEVER AN ELEVATOR</u>**, and follow the emergency exit signs to the stairs. Occupants must evacuate **into the wind at least 200 yards** for fire emergencies and hazardous materials release emergencies. SI staff and students should note that there are two exits from RSC 216, the fire exit should only be used if deemed safe and exits to the south of the RSC, lot 7.

The Rhatigan Student Center has Emergency Building Coordinators who have been trained to handle such emergencies. Emergency Building Coordinators will be identified by a yellow vest. These coordinators are responsible to ensure that all building occupants move to an appropriate fire exit and that no occupants use an elevator. A search of the RSC/CAC Theater will be made to assist visitors and persons with disabilities to an area of safety. If it is not possible to assist persons with disabilities to an area of rescue, the coordinator will request the assistance of the fire department on an evacuation plan.

NOTE: The University has stair tracks equipment to assist persons with disabilities to go up or down stairs. This equipment is stored in Devlin Hall and Wiedemann Hall. **The use of this equipment will be coordinated with the fire department.**

Student Involvement

If you are in the Student Involvement office or at a Student Involvement sponsored event within the Rhatigan Student Center when a fire alarm sounds, calmly proceed to the nearest exit and leave the building. Do not concern yourself with cleaning up the event or office, securing items, or locking doors; just proceed to the exit. The meeting location for Student Involvement is the **south side of the RSC parking lot**. Please meet up at this location so we can assess the situation.

If caught in a building filled with smoke, individuals should drop on hands and knees and crawl to the nearest exit. Test all closed doors before opening them by feeling the back of the door. If it is hot, do not open it. Turn and go to the second route of exit. If the door is not hot, open slowly but be prepared to close it again if there are flames.

If you are blocked in a room, attempt to cover the bottom of the door with clothing or non-flammable materials in order to keep the smoke out. If possible, signal for help by calling or going to a window (window should remain closed unless instructed differently by emergency personnel).

Policy 7: Hazardous Materials

Chemical Spill or Hazardous Material Release

If you are in the direct area of a significant chemical spill or hazardous material release, call the University Police Department immediately. Lead yourself and others away from the site of the hazard to a safe location. If evacuation is necessary or an alert from the university has been issued, please calmly exit the building and move at least 100 yards into the wind. Do not leave the area until you have been cleared to do so by the proper authorities. If toxic hazardous material comes in contact with skin, immediately flush the affected area with water.

Explosion Response

In the event of an explosion, keep away from windows, mirrors, overhead fixtures bookcases and electrical equipment. If an evacuation is required, lead yourself and others away from the explosion. Do not move

seriously injured persons unless they are in obvious immediate danger (of fire, building collapse, etc.). Upon exiting the building, open doors carefully and move at least 100 yards from the exit.

Policy 8: Inclement Weather

If the University closes due to inclement weather, full-time unclassified and University Support employees should refer to University Policy 20.03.

In the event that all University operations have been shut down, the following procedures will apply:

Student Involvement Related Events

- All University sponsored events must be cancelled or postponed. Staff members should contact any contracted or hired professionals associated with the events or programs scheduled.
- Best efforts should be made to notify the public of any event cancellations or postponements. This should be done by:
 - o Website Update
 - o Social Media Updates
 - o Email (where applicable)
 - o Standard phone message

Student Sponsored Events

- All programs and events taking place on campus must be cancelled or postponed. Due to the University closing, students will no longer have access to venues and services. Group members should contact any contracted or hired professionals associated with the events or programs scheduled.
- Off-campus programs must be approved by the RSO advisor to take place. Best efforts should be made to notify the public of event status.

Policy 9: Medical Emergency

In the event of a medical emergency, the procedure will be:

- 1. The person who becomes aware of a medical emergency must first contact **Campus Police (316-978-3450)**. Campus Police must initially be notified so they can dispatch trained personnel to the venue immediately, and so they can provide immediate assistance to off campus emergency personnel in directing them to the correct building location.
- 2. If the incident take place in the RSC please notify the RSC Director's Office or Event Services immediately after calling the Campus Police.\
- 3. If the event is happening at an off campus location, 911 should be called.

Student Involvement Supplement

There should be a first aid kit at all events. First aid kits are located in the office mailroom.

There is a blood borne pathogen kit located in the mailroom. This is only to be used by trained professionals.

- **Minor Injuries:** First aid kits are used to supply individuals with products for handling minor injuries such as small cuts, scrapes and bruises. Never give out medicine.
- **Major Injuries:** If the person is lucid, ask them if they want help first. If they want help or are unresponsive, call Campus Police immediately by dialing 316-978-3450. They will notify the appropriate authorities. Call Event Services (316-978-3475) or RSC Building Managers (316-978-3028) if the event is taking place in the RSC. Keep the area around the injured person clear. Do not make contact with any bodily fluids. Do not leave the injured person alone.
- The staff member on site should inform their supervisor and Director, Student Involvement of the situation as soon as possible and then document the incident within a business day under the

incident report on the shared drive. The Director, Student Involvement will contact any additional appropriate individuals.

In the event of a severe medical emergency, do not administer first aid. If you administer first aid, you may be held liable.

Policy 10: Office Access

Staff Access

All full-time Student Involvement staff and graduate student(s) will be issued a master office key. The office key provides access to all Student Involvement offices, storage closets, workroom and Cadman Art Gallery. Full-time Student Involvement staff will also have access to the Rhatigan Student Center beyond regular operating hours. Access may be gained through use of the Shocker Card and an access code provided by RSC Administration.

Student Employee and Graduate Assistant Access

Student Assistants employed to work the front desk of Student Involvement and Graduate Assistants employed within Student Involvement will be issued an office key to be used only in accordance with their scheduled work hours on a case by case basis. This key will provide them access to offices, storage closets, workroom and Cadman Art Gallery.

Other students employed by Student Involvement will be issued keys to access Student Involvement if deemed necessary by their immediate supervisor.

Student Volunteers

Students who hold a position on one of the executive councils or who serve as an SI Ambassador will have access to the Student Involvement office after hours and during RSC operating hours. If no full-time staff are in the office, these students can gain admittance to the office by contacting the RSC Building Managers. Students in the office after regular office hours are responsible for the security of the space and for any other students they allow into the office. Any other student may be in the Student Involvement office anytime during the regularly scheduled office hours.

Policy 11: Office Supplies

<u>Staff Usage</u>

Office supplies are available for staff use on a regular basis. If a staff member's office is unequipped with certain items, items should be ordered by the Office Manager. Supplies that are requested for events or projects should also be requested by the Office Manager, but should be made available for all staff use if any items are leftover. Supplies specifically purchased for reoccurring programs should be appropriately stored and labeled with the contents of the container. Office supplies should not be used for personal use.

<u>Student Use</u>

A general resource room is equipped with office supply items/project materials and is available for student use. Items should be used for project-related tasks and should not be removed from the office. Office supplies will be refreshed on a semesterly basis. Requests can be made to the office staff for items not available in the community supply area.

Cost Specific Items:

• Helium: Campus organizations, clubs and WSU departments may use helium, but will have to provide their own balloons, string and a person to blow up balloons. The first 25 balloons per semester will be free, after which each standard size balloon filled will be \$.25.

• **Buttons:** Recognized Student Organizations may use either button machine and button parts. The first 100 buttons per semester will be free, after which each button will be \$.25. Individual students, other student groups, and campus departments may use the button machine and button parts, and pay \$.25 per button.

Policy 12: Opening and Closing Procedures

Student Involvement

When opening the Student Involvement office, the following procedures should be followed:

- 1. Turn on the front desk computer.
- 2. Unlock front desk cabinets.
- 3. Unlock copier room door.
- 4. Unlock mail room door.
- 5. Turn on lounge computers and television.
- 6. Take front desk phone off "Send All Calls" & check messages.
- 7. Check GetInvolved e-mail and Calendars (including staff).
- 8. If the front door is unlocked and/or open when you arrive, notify the Office Manager immediately.

When closing the Student Involvement office, the following procedures should be followed:

- 1. Make sure that the front desk, office and copy areas are neat and well-kept.
- 2. Turn phone to "Send All Calls."
- 3. Shut down computer.
- 4. Lock front desk cabinets.
- 5. Shut the copier room door.
- 6. Turn off the lounge computers and television.
- 7. Make sure light and fan are turned off at the front desk.
- 8. If someone is in the office, let them know you're leaving and are locking the door. SAC, CSB, SI Ambassadors, NSLS and Greek Council exec members can be left in the office. Other students should be asked to leave unless they are working with the exec members.
- 9. Lock the front door.

Cadman Art Gallery

When opening the Cadman Art Gallery the following procedures should be followed:

- 1. Do a walk-through of 'The Looking Glass' and check all art work and labels to make sure none or damaged or falling apart.
- 2. Complete a check of inventory supplies and return any items to their specific location.
- 3. Open main entry all the way
- 4. Make sure gallery is clean and tidy.
- 5. Check lighting and fix any broken lights or inconsistent lights.
- 6. Check all art work and labels in the main gallery to make sure none are damaged or falling down.
- 7. Make sure comment book is set up properly and has a working writing utensil.

When closing the Cadman Art Gallery the following procedures should be followed:

- 1. Make sure gallery clean and tidy.
- 2. Make sure attendant desk and counter top organized.
- 3. Check all art work and labels to make sure none are damaged or falling down.
- 4. Display "CLOSED" sign.
- 5. Close and lock glass door.

Policy 13: Posting

Student Involvement will accept materials from WSU departments, student groups and Recognized Student Organizations.

- Acceptable forms of publicity and promotion include:
 - Event-specific publicity
 - o Department or organization calendars
 - o Recruitment posters
 - o Student related hand-outs, such as health and well-being information
- Length of display time
 - o 2-3 weeks in advance of event/deadline
- Approval process for student group materials
 - Publicity and promotion related to events to be posted, must contain the following:
 - Event Title
 - Event Date
 - Event Time
 - Event Location
 - Contact information
 - Sponsoring Organization
 - Attendance cost (if applicable)
 - Rain location (if applicable)
 - Entry deadline (if applicable)
 - o Submitted materials will be approved only by full-time Student Involvement staff
 - o Student Involvement staff reserve the right to not display submitted materials
- Promotional items and non-poster publicity must contain or display the following:
 - o Sponsoring organization
 - Contact information
- Designated posting areas for Student Involvement
 - Marketing Materials should be submitted electronically to Media Services.

Policy 14: Leave

For all types of leave, Student Involvement staff members should refer to University Polices. For unclassified staff, refer to WSU Policies and Procedures Manual, Section 6.08 and for University Support staff, refer to WSU Policies and Procedures Manual, Section 7.08.

Student Involvement

- Requests of any type of leave must be in writing in advance using the WSU Leave and Overtime Request Form. Employees must receive approval from their supervisor before leave can be taken.
- Employees should request all leave types as early as possible from their supervisor, but no more than three months prior to the date requested for leave. If special circumstances warrant (e.g., travel plans, medical procedures), employees can request vacation/sick leave from their supervisor sooner than three months out. When in doubt on the appropriateness of the request, the employee should make the request to their supervisor.
- When a Student Involvement staff member is sick, they should contact the staff team via email to let the office know they will not be in and put up your out of office notification. For full-time staff, when they return from sick leave, they should fill out a WSU Leave and Overtime Request Form and turn in to their direct supervisor.

Policy 15: Student/Staff Relations

While in a work situation, full-time staff members should maintain professional conduct in the representation of Student Involvement and Wichita State University. Staff should avoid inviting solitary students to private areas such as their homes and from consuming and/or providing alcohol or illegal/illicit drugs while working or supervising students in any capacity.

At events sponsored by Wichita State student organizations or groups, Student Involvement staff shall not partake in alcoholic beverages. It is recommended that staff members attending events with alcohol do so with another WSU staff person.

Policy 16: Tornado Warning

If there is a tornado warning, anyone in the Student Involvement office must either exit the office and go to the Shocker Sports Grill and Lanes or exit the building. It is an individual's choice to not seek shelter, but if they are not going to follow procedure, they must leave the Rhatigan Student Center.

If there is a tornado warning at an event or after hours, seek the closest, open tornado shelter. If the event is in the CAC Theater, individuals must seek shelter under the stage, in the Shocker Sports Grill and Lanes or exit the Theater.

Policy 17: Visitation

Student Workers

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- Visitation/Communication
 - Family and friends should not visit work unless allowed by a supervisor.
 - If by chance a family member or friend does visit, keep the visit brief.
 - No personal communication should be used on office equipment without the permission of the supervisor. Communication includes:
 - Phone calls
 - Online chatting
 - Email
 - Faxes
 - Facebook/Social Media
 - Work/Homework
 - Personal work/homework while working is not permitted unless allowed by a supervisor. This includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - o Studying and/or homework
 - Work related to an outside job, student organization, or volunteer group.
- Personal Property
 - Use of any device unrelated to your job should be approved by your supervisor.
 - o Personal belongings should be kept secure.
 - Cell phone use is not permitted unless allowed by a supervisor.
 - o Headphones are not permitted with any device without the approval of your supervisor.

Policy 18: Weapons

(Takes Effect July 1, 2017)

Purpose: It is the policy of the Kansas Board of Regents (hereinafter referred to as Board), to the extent permitted by law, to allow concealed carry of handguns and prohibit possession of other weapons and open carry of firearms on the University campus. This sets forth Wichita State University

(hereinafter referred to as University) policy with regard to the presence of weapons on University property.

Preamble: In view of the enactment of the Kansas Personal and Family Protection Act, subsequent amendments and Board policy, the Board has directed each state University to develop and follow policies and procedures for the safe possession and storage of lawfully possessed handguns and determine whether and to what extent otherwise lawfully possessed concealed handguns will be prohibited in any university buildings or areas of buildings.

Policy Statement:

- A. Beginning July 1, 2017, any individual who is 21 years of age or older and who is lawfully eligible to carry a concealed handgun in Kansas shall not be precluded from doing so on the Wichita State University campus except in buildings and public areas of buildings for which adequate security measures are provided, as restricted in this policy or Kansas Board of Regent's policy, and except as otherwise prohibited by law.
- B. There are no University buildings that have been designated as gun-free with permanent adequate security measures. The University may designate a specific location as temporarily gun-free, with appropriate signage, and use temporary adequate security measures after submission and approval by the Governance Committee of the Board. Appropriate notice will be given whenever this temporary designation is made.
- C. Each individual who lawfully possesses a handgun on campus shall be wholly and solely responsible for carrying, storing and using that handgun in a safe manner and in accordance with the law, Board policy and University policy. Nothing in this policy shall be interpreted to require individuals who lawfully possess a handgun to use it in defense of others.
- D. Possession of weapons, other than concealed handguns, anywhere on any campus location shall be prohibited. This includes the open carry of any weapon, including a handgun or handguns. Every entrance to each building and facility at any campus location shall be conspicuously posted with appropriate signs indicating that openly carrying a weapon into that building or facility is prohibited. Additional signs may be posted as appropriate.

Definitions:

- 1. Weapons, firearms, explosives and other hazardous objects or substances covered by this policy shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
 - a. Any object or device which will, is designed to, or may be readily converted to expel bullet, shot or shell by the action of an explosive or other propellant;
 - b. any handgun, pistol, revolver, rifle, shotgun or other firearm of any nature, including those that are concealed or openly carried;
 - c. any BB gun, pellet gun, air/C'02 gun, blow gun, or any device, such as a Taser, which is designed to discharge electric darts or other similar projectiles; however, personal self-defense stun guns that do not fit with the preceding definition shall not be deemed to be a weapon for the purposes of this policy;

- d. any explosive, incendiary or poison gas (A) bomb, (B) mine, (C) grenade, (D) rocket having a propellant charge of more than four ounces, or (E) missile having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than ¹/₄ ounce;
- e. any incendiary or explosive material, liquid, solid or mixture equipped with a fuse, wick or other detonating device;
- f. any tear gas bomb or smoke bomb; however, personal self-defense items containing mace or pepper spray shall not be deemed to be a weapon for the purposes of this policy;
- g. any knife, commonly referred to as a switch-blade, which has a blade that opens automatically by hand pressure applied to a button, spring or other device in the handle of gravity or by an outward, downward or centrifugal thrust or movement;
- h. any straight-blade knife of four inches or more such as a dagger, dirk, dangerous knife or stiletto; except that an ordinary pocket knife or culinary knife designed for and used solely in the preparation or service of food shall not be construed to be a weapon for the purposes of this policy;
- i. any martial arts weapon such as nunchucks or throwing stars;
- j. any longbow, crossbow and arrows or other projectile that could cause serious harm to any person; or
- k. any other dangerous or deadly weapon or instrument of like character.
- 2. The term "handgun" means:
 - a. A pistol or revolver which is designed to be fired by the use of a single hand and which is designed to fire or capable of firing fixed cartridge ammunition; or
 - b. any other weapon which will or is designed to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive and which is designed to be fired by the use of a single hand.
- 3. The term "firearm" includes any handgun, rifle, shotgun, and any other weapon which will or is designed to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive.
- 4. The phrase "adequate security measures" means the use of electronic equipment and armed personnel at public entrances to detect and restrict the carrying of any weapons into the University building, or any public area thereof, including, but not limited to, metal detectors, metal detector wands or any other equipment used for similar purposes to ensure that weapons are not permitted to be carried into such building or public area by members of the public. Adequate security measures for storing and securing lawfully carried weapons, including, but not limited to, the use of gun lockers or other similar storage options may be provided at public entrances.
- 5. "Public area" means any portion of a University building that is open to and accessible by the public or which is otherwise designated as a public area by the board.
- 6. "Concealed" means completely hidden from view and does not reveal the weapon in any way, shape, or form.
- 7. "Approved storage device" should (a) be of a sufficient size to fully enclose the handgun while secured in an approved holster, (b) constructed of sturdy materials that are nonflammable, (c) have a combination, digital or other secure locking device that can only be unlocked by the individual using the storage device but devices secured exclusively with a key lock are prohibited, and (d) constructed specifically for the storage of a handgun and/or ammunition.

Procedures:

- 8. Individuals lawfully possessing a handgun, pursuant to this policy, should keep it completely concealed on or about their person at all times, maintain it within their immediate control and custody and not brandish or intentionally display the handgun except when lawfully using the handgun in self-defense or when to transfer to safe storage. This allows individuals to carry a handgun if it can be carried securely in a briefcase, backpack, purse, handbag or other similar personal carrier designed and intended for the carrying of an individual's personal items so long it is within the exclusive and uninterrupted control of the individual. This includes wearing the carrier with one or more straps consistent with the carrier's design, carrying or holding the carrier, or placing the carrier next to, or within the immediate reach of, the individual at all times.
- 9. Any employee, who is legally qualified, shall not be prohibited from carrying any concealed handgun while performing work for the University, including while in a means of conveyance, except in a campus building that has adequate security measures at all public access entrances to ensure that no weapons are permitted to be carried into such building and the building is conspicuously posted.
- 10. Weapons other than concealed handguns, as defined and allowed above, are not permitted on University property unless in the possession of a law enforcement officer, armored car security personnel, or private security pre-approved by the Chief of the University Police Department.
- 11. For the purposes of this policy, the term weapons would not include items or materials used in or necessary for the conduct of Board-approved academic programs or University-approved activities or practices. However, the University's Chief of Police should be notified about any such items or materials in advance of their use or presence on campus and mandate specific requirements for the possession, use and storage of such items or materials, including notification of other necessary University personnel.
- 12. Handguns carried by individuals, whether on their person or in a carrier, must be secured in a holster that completely covers the trigger and the entire trigger guard area and that secures an external hammer in an un-cocked position through the use of a strap or by other means. Handguns with an external safety must be carried with the safety in the "on" position. The holster must have sufficient tension or grip on the handgun to retain it in the holster even when subjected to unexpected jostling. Semiautomatic handguns must be carried without a chambered round of ammunition. Revolvers must be carried with the hammer resting on an empty cylinder.
- 13. The concealed carry of a handgun by 1) an individual who is legally qualified to have a handgun and who has been screened in accordance with K.S.A. 75-7c20(d), 2) an employee who is legally qualified to have a handgun, and 3) those individuals identified in paragraph 10, above, is allowed while the individual is located in non-public areas within University buildings that have restricted access entrances that require a key, key card, code, or similar device to ensure only authorized individuals are allowed into those areas. The concealed carry of a handgun by any other individual in such non-public area is prohibited. Non-public areas with University buildings must be specifically approved by the President of the University, or the President's designee, after consultation with the University Chief of Police and the University General Counsel. Each restricted access entrance where concealed carry is prohibited as provided in this paragraph shall be conspicuously posted with appropriate signs indicating that carrying a concealed handgun into that non-public area is prohibited. The signage should be in accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the Kansas Attorney General as described in K.S.A. 75-7c10.

- 14. The University Police Department should be notified of a suspected violation of this policy by telephone, electronic mail, in person or in writing. Within a reasonable period of time after receiving such notification, the University Police Department shall investigate the matter and report its factual findings to Human Resources if any employee is involved or the Office of Student Conduct and Community Standards (hereinafter referred to as Student Conduct) if a student is involved. If it is a visitor, the University Police Department shall have the authority to handle the situation as deemed appropriate. Upon receipt of the factual findings, Human Resources or Student Conduct may conduct an independent investigation to determine if a policy violation has 5 occurred. Any employee or student of the university who violates one or more provisions of this policy shall be subject to discipline in accordance with applicable university codes of conduct. Any individual who violates one or more provisions of this policy may be issued a lawful directive to leave campus with the weapon immediately. Any individual who violates the directive shall be considered to be in trespass and may be cited accordingly. Any individual who violates state or federal law may be detained, arrested or otherwise subjected to lawful processes appropriate to the circumstances.
- 15. Nothing in this policy is intended to replace municipal, state or federal law regarding weapons, firearms, explosives and other hazardous objects or substances or to be inconsistent with the authority afforded a lawfully commissioned peace officer.
- 16. This policy is intended to apply and cover any building or grounds owned by the university or the Board and any building or grounds leased by the university or the Board for university use and located within the State of Kansas. Buildings and land owned by or both owned by and leased to third parties that otherwise might be located on ground owned by the University are not included. This policy may not be applicable on all locations leased by the University if the University is not the sole tenant of the leased property. Leased locations leased and controlled by an entity that may lawfully exclude or permit firearms at their premises (concealed or otherwise) may choose at their sole discretion to exclude or permit concealed firearms from their premises, notwithstanding a lease with the University so long as the University is not the sole tenant on the leased property.
- 17. All University students and employees will be notified concerning this policy prior to the effective date of the policy. This notification will include learning when this policy applies, the availability of any known local or regional firearm safety instruction, how a handgun is carried and stored pursuant to this policy, how to report a suspected violation of this policy, who investigates reports, the potential consequences upon confirmation the policy has been violated and other topics relevant to this policy.

Implementation: This policy shall be included in the WSU Policies and Procedures Manual and shared with appropriate constituencies of the University.

Student Involvement

If a weapon is spotted on campus, contact the WSU Police immediately and then let a WSU Staff member know immediately. Do not approach the individual suspected of having a weapon. If you find

a weapon on campus, do not touch it. Call WSU Police if the weapon is found outside the RSC and CAC Theater.

Shooter Procedure

If there is a shooter on campus and you are in a classroom or office, close and lock or bar the door and turn off all the lights. Turn all phones on silent and call for help. Stay out of view and wait for help. Make sure to spread out across the room and not remain in a clump. If emergency digital signs are in view, follow stated procedures.

If there is a shooter on campus and you are outside and can run away, do so in a zig-zag pattern and seek shelter.

If you are on campus and are aware of the shooter's location, you should evacuate if you are not near the shooter and will not be putting yourself in harm's way. Unless asked, do not approach the police to assist in handling the shooter.

Policy 19: Travel

Any time Student Involvement staff must travel for state-related business or sponsors a trip outside the Wichita metropolitan area, the following procedures must be followed:

- For staff members, a Request for Out-of-State Travel form with estimated costs must be filled out and turned in to the Office Manager at least three weeks in advance. It is to be noted additional approval is need in FY17 from the Provost and additional paperwork is needed for the reduced stipend. An itinerary or schedule of events should be emailed to the Office Manager. After this information is entered into the Travel and Expense Management System, the system will generate a Travel Authorization with a TA number assigned. The Travel Authorization will be automatically forwarded to the traveler for review and electronic submission to the Budget Officer the TA number will be used to make reservations with Sunflower Travel and provided to the Vice President for Student Affairs office for conference registration fees.
- If attending a conference and a department fund is to be billed, the Student Engagement Registration Card Request Form must be filled out by the staff member and provided to the Vice President for Student Affairs office, along with a copy of the itinerary/agenda/schedule of events. A copy of the documents should be made for the Office Manager. If a staff member charges the cost to a personal credit card, they will not be reimbursed until after the conference.
- Within five days of returning from a trip, a Travel Voucher-General Expense form must be filled out and turned in with all receipts to the Office Manager. Receipts smaller than 8.5 x 11 should be taped down to a sheet of paper, and all receipts should be in "portrait" layout (versus landscape). The information provided will be entered into the Travel and Expense Management System for any necessary reimbursement to the staff member. After the information is entered, the system will generate a Travel Reimbursement, which will be automatically forwarded to the traveler for review and electronic submission to the Budget Officer.
- For students traveling, the Participant Agreement and Emergency Contact and Medical Form must be filled out for each participant. A WSU University-Sanctioned Student Travel Registration Form should be completed at least one week prior to the date of departure and provided to the Vice President for Student Affairs office and the Student Involvement Office Manager. The online registration information can be submitted with an updated list provided later of checked in participants. A copy of each Student Involvement Emergency Contact form needs to be turned into Office Manager at least one business day before departure. It is recommended to have one staff member for each 20 participants.
- If transportation is provided by an outside company, a copy of the company's Certificate of Liability Insurance must be obtained and Wichita State University needs to be listed as the Certificate Holder.

Policy 20: Sidewalk Chalking Guidelines

Recognized student organizations and campus departments are permitted to chalk on University sidewalks in order to publicize a University event they are sponsoring, a component of the event to promote student participation or to market the sponsoring group or organization. For chalking on campus, the following guidelines have been established:

- 1. Student organizations and campus departments <u>MUST</u> obtain approval from Student Involvement prior to chalking.
- 2. Only water-soluble dry stick sidewalk chalk may be used. Aerosol spray chalk is not permitted. If the University has to clean any permanent materials used, the group responsible will be billed for the cost of removal.
- 3. Chalk advertisements may be no larger than 4 feet by 4 feet, and each organization /department is allowed a maximum of six (6) chalking squares on campus at a time.
- 4. Chalking is only allowed on the main campus (including the Hughes Metropolitan Complex).
- 5. Chalking is permitted on horizontal, paved/concrete, uncovered campus sidewalks. Chalking is not permitted on covered sidewalks, stairways, curbs, or stair risers, on brick surfaces, parking lots, buildings, windows, benches, planters, trash containers, signs, pillars, light poles, trees, any other vertical surfaces, or anything other than the paved/concrete, uncovered sidewalks mentioned above.
- 6. Chalking must be at least twenty (20) feet from the entrance of a building.
- 7. All chalk advertising <u>MUST</u> clearly identify the sponsoring organization's name.
- 8. Chalking may not be used for commercial purposes by non-university groups, including advertising or other promotion.
- 9. Chalking must adhere to WSU Policy 11.10 and the Student Code of Conduct. Chalking cannot contain any obscene, derogatory or defamatory words or images, threaten physical harm or include messages that otherwise are not entitled to the protection of free expression.
- 10. All other chalking is subject to immediate removal and the individuals or groups responsible may be charged the cost of cleanup.
- 11. Overwriting, erasing, defacing, altering or removing the chalking of another organization is prohibited except by University personnel.
- 12. The University may remove, without notice, any chalked messages that do not comply with University policies and regulations.
- 13. Student organizations which violate these chalking guidelines will be referred to Student Conduct and Community Standards.

Policy 21: Yard Sign Guidelines

Recognized student organizations and campus departments are permitted to post yard signs on the property of the University in order to publicize an event they are sponsoring, a component of the event to promote student participation or to market the sponsoring group or organization. "Yard Sign" refers to a temporary sign placed in the ground in an outdoor space. For posting yard signs, the following guidelines have been established:

- 1. Recognized student organizations and campus departments <u>MUST</u> obtain approval from Student Involvement prior to posting yard signs.
- 2. Sign panels may be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches, must be placed in metal "H" stands, and may contain content on both sides.
- 3. All wording on signs must be written in and/or have a translation in the English language.
- 4. All yard signs <u>MUST</u> clearly identify the sponsoring organization's name.

- 5. Signs may not be placed within five feet of trees, flower beds, fire hydrants or impede the flow of traffic.
- 6. All signs must be placed at least five (5) feet apart and at least three (3) feet from the edge of sidewalks.
- 7. Yard signs are only allowed on the main campus (including the Hughes Metropolitan Complex).
- 8. Up to ten (10) signs are permitted per event, per organization.
- 9. Reservations to use signs must be made one month in advance of anticipated placement. Signs may be left in place for a two (2) week period and must be removed by the end of the reservation date.
- 10. If weather conditions destroy or damage a sign, the sponsoring organization must remove it.
- 11. Yard signs may not be used for commercial purposes by non-university groups, including advertising or other promotion.
- 12. Signs must adhere to WSU Policy 11.10 and the Student Code of Conduct. Signs may not contain any obscene, derogatory or defamatory words or images, threaten physical harm or include messages that otherwise are not entitled to the protection of free expression.
- 13. The University may remove, without notice, any signs that do not comply with University policies and regulations.
- 14. Signs placed in compliance with these guidelines cannot be removed or relocated without prior permission from the sponsoring organization unless done so by University personnel.
- 15. Student organizations which violate these yard sign guidelines will be referred to Student Conduct and Community Standards.
- 16. Wichita State University and Student Involvement are not responsible for lost and/or stolen yard signs. Lost or stolen yard sides can be reported to WSU PD.

Policy 22: Compensatory Time Accrual Guidelines

PURPOSE

These guidelines will serve both classified and unclassified Student Involvement staff regarding procedures they should follow for timekeeping and leave-related matters.

TIMEKEEPING

All employees, regardless of exempt (salaried) or non-exempt (hourly) status, are expected to complete and submit actual timesheets (Exception Reporting or WSU In-Out Positive Time Reporting) to their supervisor for approval and signature, then to the designated timekeeping data entry staff member by the prescribed biweekly deadline. An Exception Reporting form should be signed and submitted even when leave is not used during that pay period. It is expected that employees will be truthful and forthcoming concerning time worked on their timesheet. It is the responsibility of the employee to ensure that time reporting is accurate and that leave time is used appropriately. All Exception Reporting forms submitted with leave should include in the Comments section the following statement: "Timekeeper has my permission to adjust my time."

STUDENT INVOLEMENT GUIDELINES FOR EXEMPT (SALARIED) EMPLOYEES

Exempt (salaried) employees cannot use fewer than four hours of any type of leave at any given time. Exempt employees should receive approval from their supervisor for all leave requests.

STUDENT INVOLVEMENT GUIDELINES FOR NON-EXEMPT (HOURLY) EMPLOYEES

For unclassified staff, Section 6.06 of the WSU Procedures and Policies Manual applies. For university support staff, Section 7.09 of the WSU Policies and Procedures Manual applies. In summary, hourly (full-time nonexempt university support staff and nonexempt unclassified) staff are expected to work 40 hours per week and adhere to these practices. Regular work hours are 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday-Friday.

- Employees are expected to record their time worked honestly and accurately. Employees must track their time in 15 minute intervals. Please refer to the WSU Positive In-Out Time Reporting sheet for guidelines on recording time in and time out.
- Any time worked beyond 40 hours per week should be accounted for on the employee's timesheet as compensatory time.
- Extra time beyond 40 hours per week (e.g., compensatory time) is credited at 1.5 hours for each extra hour worked.
- For an employee to earn compensatory time, the employee must <u>physically work</u> at least 40 hours in that week. In other words, any sick, vacation or other non-working hours incurred in the same week will not count towards working 40 hours for a given week.
- If an employee physically works less than 40 hours in a week, hours will be accrued on a straight time basis.
- For each eight hour day worked, employees can take a 30 minute to 1.5 hour lunch. Exceptions to the length of lunch can be made when lunch time is used for Extra time hours (E-hours). Lunches should be taken between 11a.m.-2 p.m. Employees should work with their supervisor to schedule this time accordingly so that the office can be adequately covered by personnel during normal business hours.
- For university support staff, a maximum of 120 hours of accrued compensatory time can be carried forward for a period not to exceed twelve months (see Section 7.09 of WSU Policies and Procedures Manual). For unclassified staff, a maximum of 120 hours of accrued compensatory time can be carried forward for a period not to exceed twelve months (see Section 6.08 of WSU Policies and Procedures Manual).
- Any hours worked beyond 40 hours per week must be approved in advance in writing by their supervisor. In other words, employees cannot simply plan to work more than 40 hours to earn compensatory time at their own discretion, without any prior authorization from their supervisor.
- Their supervisor reserves the right to adjust work schedules and possibly enforce mandated leave in order to ensure utilization of compensatory time.
- Running errands, responding to text messages, social media and email outside of established work hours is not acceptable. Exceptions are in emergency situations. If an emergency situation occurs, their supervisor should be notified.
- Employees are expected to report in to the office at the start of their work day. An exception to this is if the employee is out of town on work sponsored travel.
- Staff should keep in mind the following:
 - E-hours are to be utilized to meet the needs of the employee's position, the department and the constituents they serve.
 - E-hours should be utilized during the same week they are earned, when possible. For example, if employee X works an E-hour on Monday, they should work with their supervisor to find a time in their schedule in the same week to work one hour fewer. Adjustments are to

be made in the following order: day of, days preceding E-hour day and days after E-hour day, but within the same work week.

- When adjustments to the regular work schedule are needed, employees should keep in mind what schedule best meets the needs of the students, staff, department and other entities they are serving.
- Travel which occurs during regular work hours is considered compensable work time. An exception is traveling to and from an airport terminal or train station, which is not considered hours worked. Time spent waiting at a terminal until arrival at the destination is considered hours worked. Travel while a passenger in a vehicle is not considered work time, but if driving the vehicle, it is considered work time.
- Travel outside the Wichita metro area for work must be approved in writing by their supervisor at least a month in advance. An itinerary of the conference/retreat/etc. must be submitted and reviewed with their supervisor at least two weeks in advance of the trip.
- Conducting official business over a meal-time is considered to be work time. Meals for social occasions and during retreats/conferences/traveling/etc. are not considered work time unless the meal has a featured speaker.
- During retreats and conferences, time spent in educational programs is considered work time. Time spent in social endeavors and non-educational components are not considered to be work time.
- Conducting business or volunteering outside the scope of the employee's job responsibilities or responsibilities of the department is not considered work time. Exceptions can be made with the approval of their supervisor.
- The nature of unclassified positions is that some of the required work cannot be done during a typical 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. workday. What is critical to note is that full-time employees are expected to work 40 hours per week, be on time for work and work the schedule they have outlined in their proposed work schedule.
- These guidelines are in no way meant to be exhaustive and may be modified or added to at any time.

Policy 23: Educational Release

WSU Policy 3.13 / Benefits Applicable to Eligible University Employees

Section: Leave Types

Part d. Education Release Time

The release of an employee to attend University classes during regular work hours is subject to the requirements of the employee's department. Release time may be granted to regular and probationary employees (full-time or part-time) to take one course per semester. Makeup time is not required for academic classes related to job duties or as preparation for promotion within the University. Release time for classes unrelated to the employee's job or performance must be unpaid, made up or charged to vacation leave with supervisor's approval.

To see the entire leave definition please visit University's Policies and Procedures page.

Student Involvement Policy

Before registering for any courses during regular work hours*, the employee should have a conversation with their supervisor to discuss the goals of the course/degree program, relation to the employee's goals, personal development and connection to their position. Any class taken during regular work hours needs to be

approved in advance by the employee's supervisor. If there are multiple course offerings, preference should be given to courses which fall outside the employee's regular work hours.

Staff members may be granted flex time up to five hours a week (no more than four hours for one day per week) to attend a course related to their job responsibilities or degree completion. These hours cannot be accumulated over time. The regular work hours missed by attending class must be made up and the employee should work with their supervisor to develop a plan to make up these hours. Any time above five hours a week or four hours in one day, the employee will have to take vacation or unpaid leave. If for some reason the class is cancelled in advance the staff member should report to work and will not have to make up that time for class. If an employee is taking a class not related to their job responsibilities or degree completion, they will have to take vacation or unpaid leave. Employees must report in written format to their supervisor whether they passed or failed each course. If an employee does not receive a passing grade the employee should have a conversation with their supervisor about maintaining educational release status in future semesters.

When taking a class during the regular work day, the job responsibilities of the employee outweigh class obligations. If an employee is required to be at or attend to an aspect of their job, which conflicts with class time, the employee should comply with the needs of the department. If a major class obligation conflicts with a required or vital work obligation the employee should have a conversation with their supervisor. The employee should be cognizant that class work/projects should not be done during regular work hours.

Educational release is not guaranteed and the employee's supervisor and/or the director can choose not to grant educational release time for the employee.

* Regular work hours are what is defined in the employee's position description.
