STRATEGIC PLAN

In the summer of 2018, we finalized our next strategic plan. After it was completed, we split into three sub-groups to continue developing these goals and to work on the strategies. Each subcommittee met on a regular basis to accomplish their goal and then reported back to the remainder of the staff. We also began aligning our strategic plan to the Student Affairs plan that is in development.

Department Goal 1: Create an over-arching and cohesive retention plan

Strategy 1.1: Professional development session on the University Retention and SEM Plans and Progress (*completed by fall of 2018, ongoing*) - *Had two meetings with David Wright and two meetings with Alicia Newell.*

Strategy 1.2: Write a Student Involvement retention plan that aligns with Wichita State's Strategic Plan and Strategic Enrollment Plan (*created by summer of 2019, reviewed annually*) - *First draft is written, will fine tune over the summer of 2019.*

Strategy 1.3: Create and utilize existing assessment practices that track comprehensive impact on retention (*completed by fall 2019, ongoing*) - *Will begin reworking assessment, as needed, in Fall 2019.*

Department Goal 2: Expand StrengthsQuest based programs into Student Involvement areas and other entities across campus

Strategy 2.1: Ensure that all SI Leaders take Strengths Finder (*completed spring 2019, ongoing*) - *Will continue offering this to SI Leaders within Student Involvement.*

Strategy 2.2: Continue to expand StrengthsQuest based programs to various colleges and departments (*completed spring 2021*) - *Currently working with Professional Edge in Business, Engineering groups, and Student Success Leaders within Academic Areas. Will continue to build academic relationships through 2019-2020.*

Strategy 2.3: Develop an implementation and training program for facilitators and students after initial assessment (*Year 1 pilot with SI Leaders, Years 2 & 3 expand to campus*) - *Coordinator of Leadership Development has received 2 of 2 trainings. Certification completed in March 2019 (training 1) and Train the Trainer completed in June 2019 (training 2). Plans to develop will take place over Summer 2019 to prepare for pilot.*

Strategy 2.4: Obtaining supplemental funding through grants, sponsors, donors (*ongoing*) - *Approved Leadership Assessment Fee to assist with cost and funding. Seeking opportunities for partnerships, sponsors, and donors. In progress.*

Department Goal 3: Create a career readiness curriculum for student leaders within Student Involvement

Strategy 3.1: Evaluate current practices of learning and development for student leaders in different SI functional areas, combine resources, and pare down competencies to develop a universal curriculum (*by Spring Break 2019*) - *A survey was completed by all staff members to rank the NACA*

competencies and NACE career competencies most frequently taught as a result of their functional area as well as those which staff believed to be most important to overall student development and career readiness. As a result, eight themes were developed to be the basis of modules in the career readiness curriculum: 1. Critical Thinking & Problem Solving / 2. Teamwork & Collaboration / 3. Oral, Digital, & Written Communication / 4. Leadership Development / 5. Professionalism & Work Ethic / 6. Global & Intercultural Fluency / 7. Career Management / 8. Healthy & Satisfying Lifestyles.

- Adjusting to the Gen Z mentality and needs

- The resignation of the SGA President
- The migration to a new university website
- The University and Student Affairs changing strategic goals
- Inconsistent academic calendar (spring break, commencement, etc.)

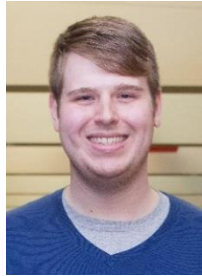

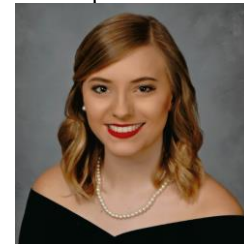

SI Ambassadors

The 2018-2019 the ambassador team included Michael J. Bearth, Savannah Goodpasture, Madison Davis and Austin Bennet. In Spring of 2019, Isaac Tan was added to the roster.

Each semester, the SI Ambassadors held an Open House that offered a firsthand look at opportunities to get involved on campus, get connect with leadership experiences and learn about the resources SI has to offer.

Over the year, the ambassadors advocated for Wichita State and Student Involvement at over 30 special events including Admissions sponsored recruitment days and new student orientations. The SI Ambassadors also began a recognition program celebrating the milestones of campus organizations which included attending the Improv Clubs first event, celebrating Chi Sigma Tau's first quesadilla fundraiser and congratulating Sigma Psi Zeta on their 5 years anniversary at Wichita State.

SI Marketing

Our continued goal of marketing Student Involvement is to increase recognition of the office as well as all our programs and initiatives. This year we continued to connect with campus partners to increase the knowledge of SI programs and services. In Fall 2018, 4,500 calendars were distributed, including an increase of 500 calendars due to the continued increase of on campus housing. In Spring 2019, 4,000 calendars were distributed. We continued to produce the Welcomefest brochure and coordinating marketing, adding a downloadable version to our website.

The NEWSIE, Student Involvement newsletter, continued to be sent out on a weekly basis and highlighted various activities hosted by the department throughout the week. Additionally, SI programs are featured prominently in the RSC Happenings distributions.

In August 2018, Student Involvement hired Kiara Erhman as our marketing assistant. Terence Truong continued in the department focusing on our new website with the change in the university website. Numerous hours and audits went into the SI website throughout this year. Both Kiara and Terence have had increased involvement resulting in a robust, applied learning opportunity in areas of social media management, graphic design, project management, and video production.

Cadman Art Gallery

The Mission of the Wilson K. Cadman Art Gallery (The Cadman) is to promote understanding of visual art to the community while providing the students of Wichita State University a place to display their creative efforts and give them professional experience in organizing, curating and marketing an exhibition of their work.

The Cadman Art Gallery is located on the 1st floor of the Rhatigan Student Center and is open throughout the week to all who choose to enter. The Cadman Art Gallery is a partnership between Student Involvement and the Rhatigan Student Center. The RSC has provided the space to Student Involvement in which they in return manage, keep work installed, provide a creative outlet for artists, and those wanting to view works of art. The Cadman is supervised by a full-time staff member of Student Involvement, is managed by a graduate assistant for the gallery, and maintenance and upkeep is provided by the staff of the RSC.

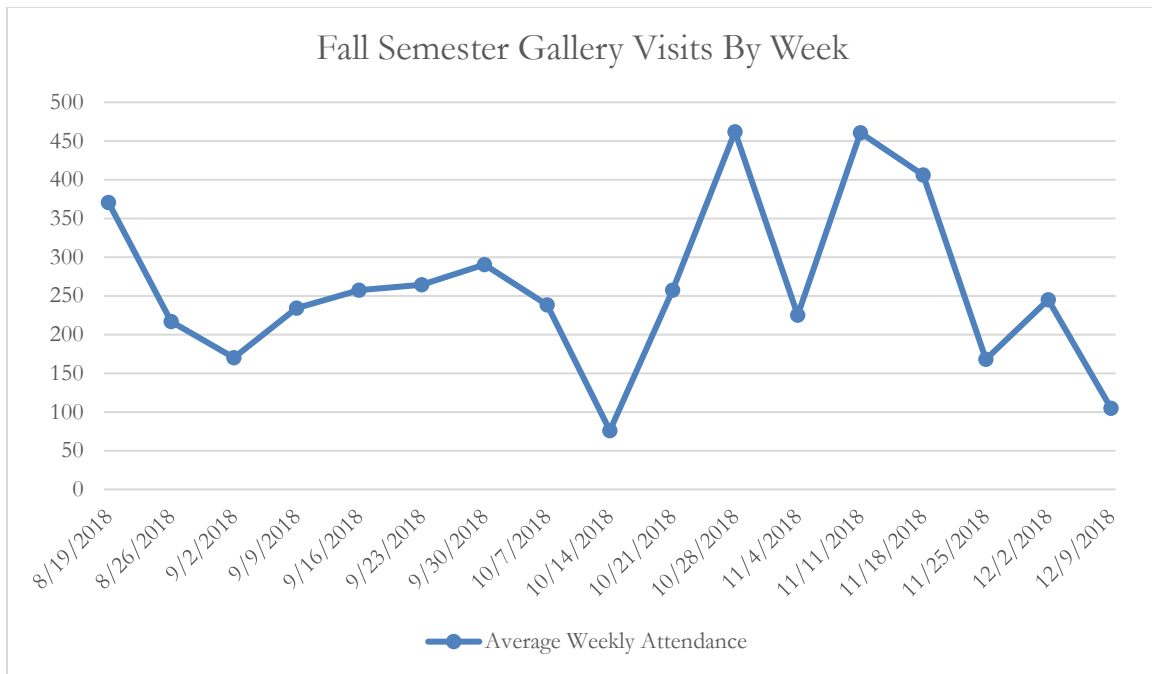
Gallery Attendance

Attendance to the gallery is driven by viewer interest in subject matter, marketing surrounding the exhibit and the artist's impact of promotion. The number of visitors to the space is tracked through installed door counters that sense the number of times an individual enters and exits.

Attendance, Fall Semester

The highest visited exhibit in the fall semester, not sponsored by the gallery, was the Clothesline Project by Sigma Psi Zeta Sorority Inc. The exhibit featured a collection of t-shirts with powerful statements and images intended to bring attention to the issues of violence against women, men and children. The exhibit was on display from October 28 – November 9 and had had over 680 visitors. The lowest point of attendance of the semester can be seen in the week of 10/14 which represents fall break, two days during the semester in which the gallery was not open.

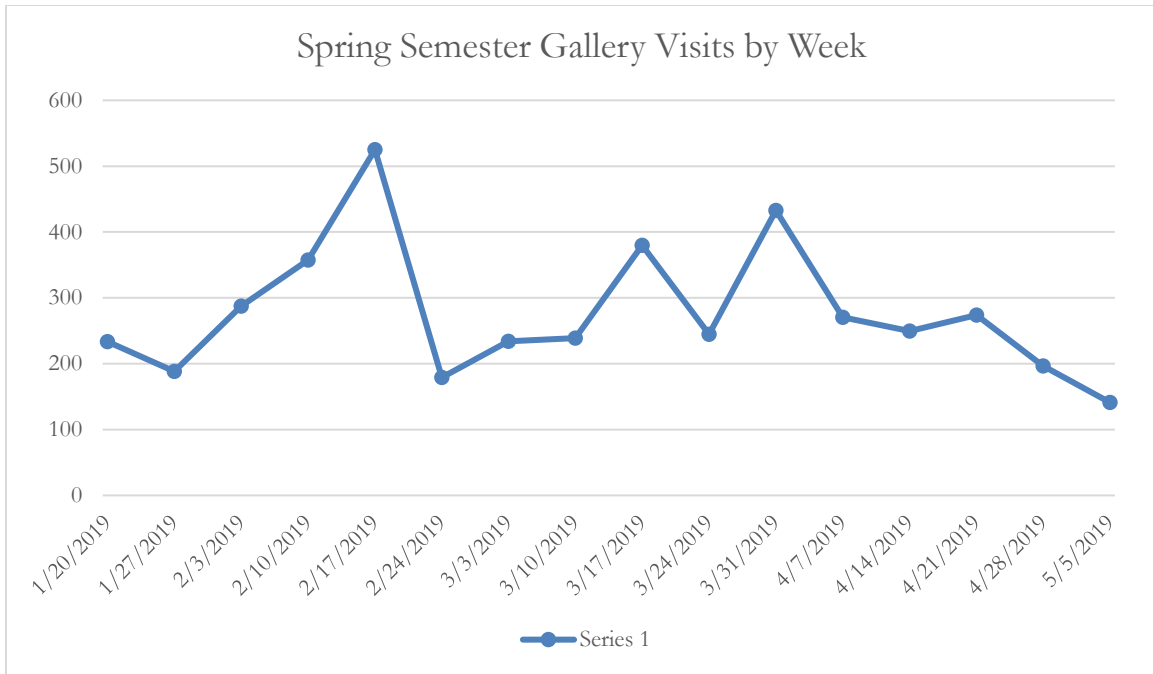




Attendance, Spring Semester

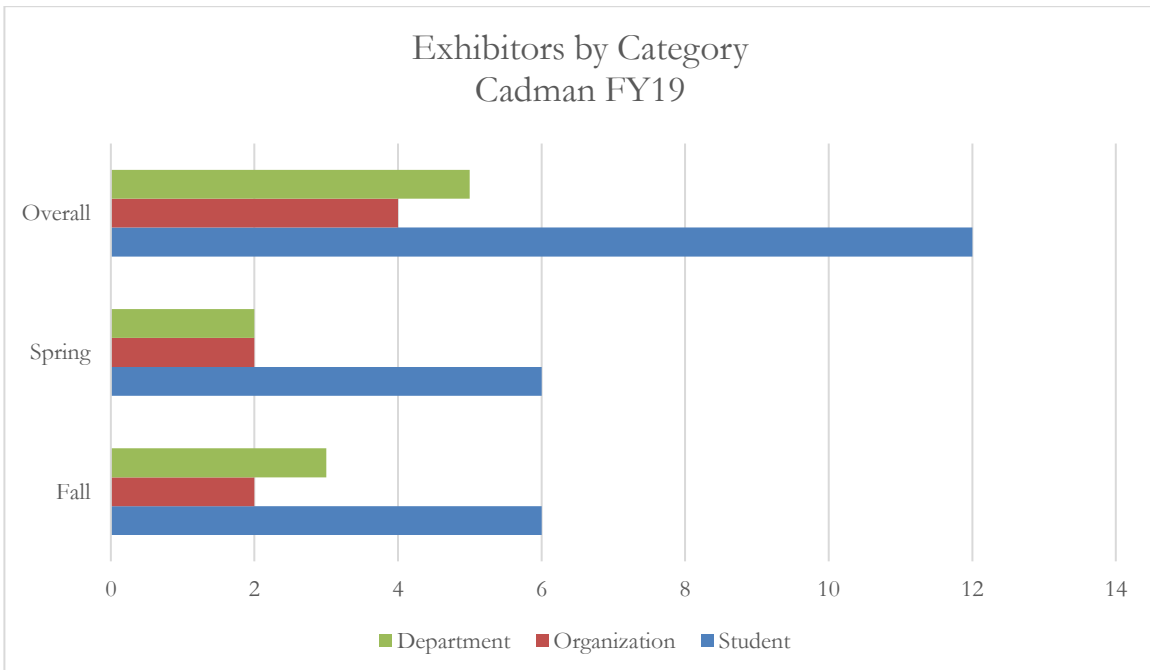

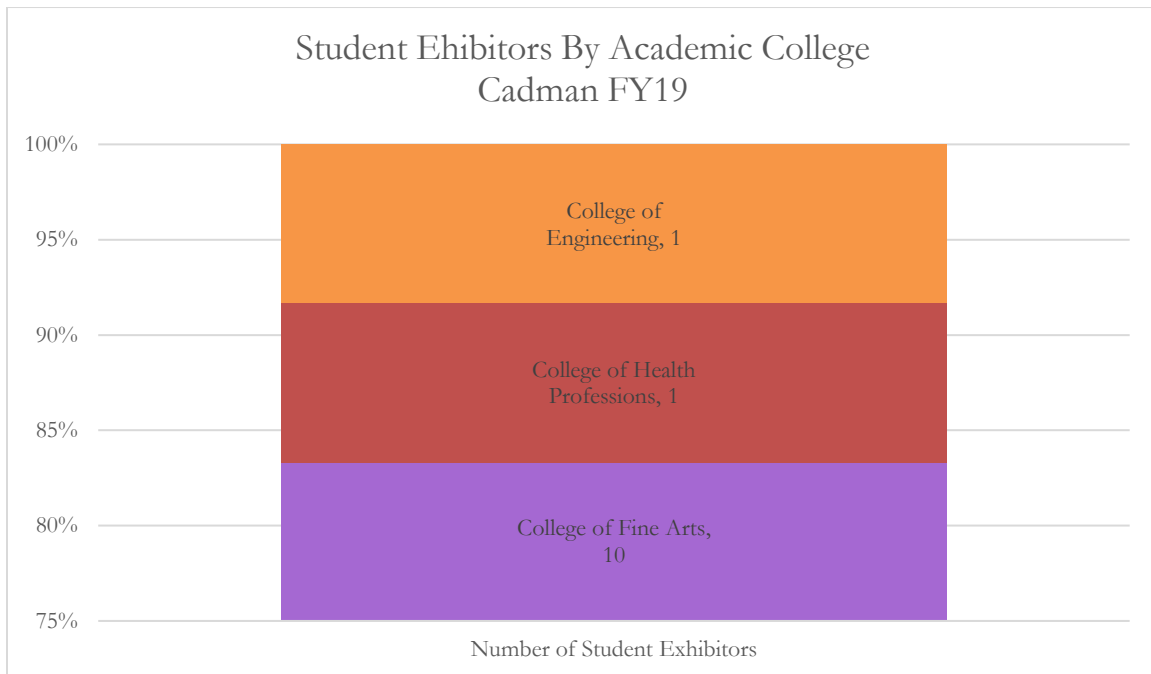




Exhibitors 2018 – 2019

The Cadman Art Gallery is made up of two key exhibit spaces, the main gallery and exterior display known as the Looking Glass. Exhibitors wishing to display their works in the Cadman Art Gallery must apply, interview with a selection committee and present their exhibition proposal. Upon selection, each artist is given a minimum of two weeks to exhibit in the space offered to them. 26 applications from students, student organizations and departments were received over a period of two semesters and resulted in the selection of 21 exhibitors for FY19.





Competitions

Two annual competitions are held each semester and include the Elements Multi-Media Art Competition (Fall) and the Exposure Photography Competition (Spring). Each competition accepts applicants from all academic colleges and gives hobbyists, young artists, and individuals with small portfolios a great way to exhibit their art in a juried exhibit. Judges from the Wichita community are selected based on their medium and help to narrow down submission for exhibit, select winners and offer feedback to artists.

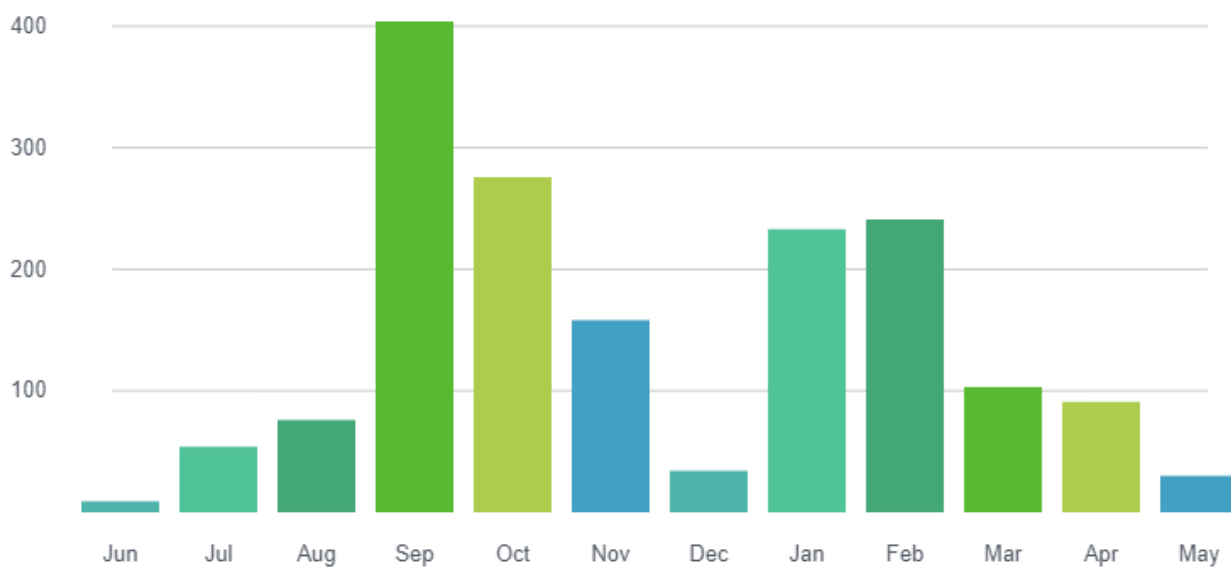

By the end of the spring 2019 semester, this website had engaged over 2,566 users who had logged a total of 8,130 volunteer hours during the 2018-19 academic year.

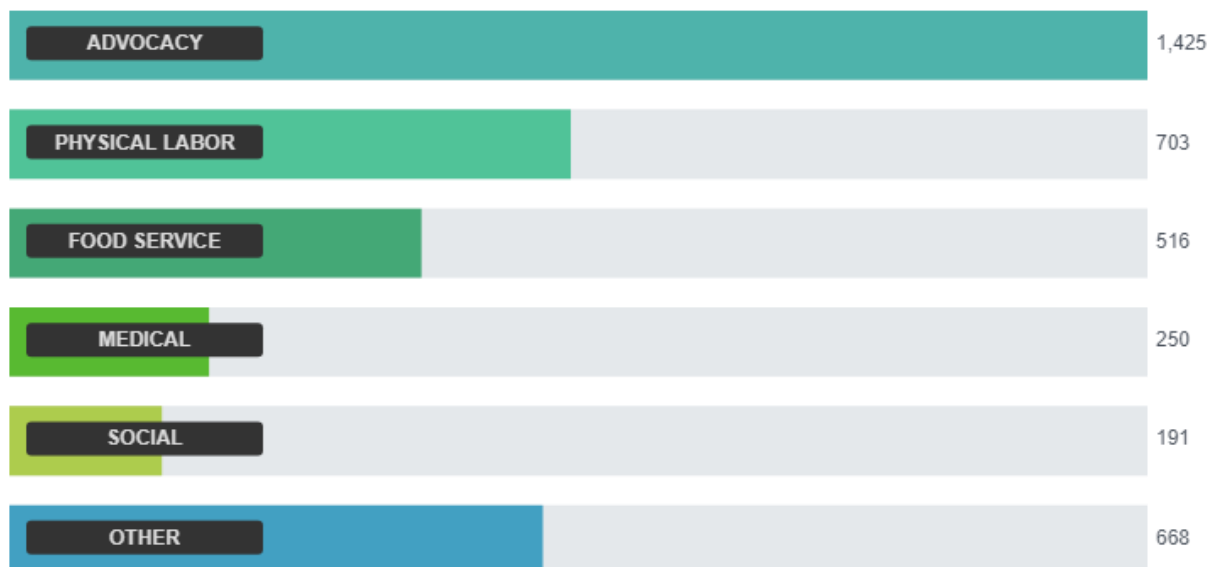
Hours by College

Alternative Spring Break

Alternative Spring Break exposed WSU students to complex social and cultural issues through community visits, experiential learning, direct service, group discussion and reflection activities. The group traveled to Washington D.C. Sunday, March 10 through Friday, March 15, 2019. The focus of the Washington D.C. trip focused on Hunger and Homelessness in the Urban Environment.

The course was structured to allow for a common curriculum of social justice and ethical volunteerism with breakout groups for education related to the individual trip focus. Throughout the course students participated in a variety of projects, readings and reflective activities. Highlights included hosting a Hunger Banquet, designing blogs, and collaborating on group fundraisers.

Each trip participant also selected a photo for the *Alternative Spring Break: Photo Reflections* in the Cadman Art Gallery that ran from April 29 to May 10, 2019. Students were also present to represent their images at the reception on April 30.

The Washington D.C. group worked with Youth Service Opportunities Project (YSOP), which is a partner organization who coordinated opportunities for students to work with a variety of food banks, shelters, meal preparation centers and outreach centers.



YSOP is committed to helping young people become part of the solution to societal problems by showing them how even their smallest actions can make a difference in the lives of others. YSOP is a nationally recognized leader in providing high-quality volunteer service experiences. YSOP has been a pioneer in the field of service-learning, leading thousands of young people and adults in programs to encourage community participation and engaged citizenship through direct service to homeless and hungry people. This group's lodgings were in the YSOP headquarters in the Church of the Epiphany.

Students participated in a variety of reflective activities including a blog (www.wichita.edu/altbreak). The blog was a dynamic part of the course and allowed students to reflect on the issues and service work throughout the experience. It then served as a portion of the students' final presentation/digital story project.

Fraternity and Sorority Life completed another successful year with a variety of new experiences.

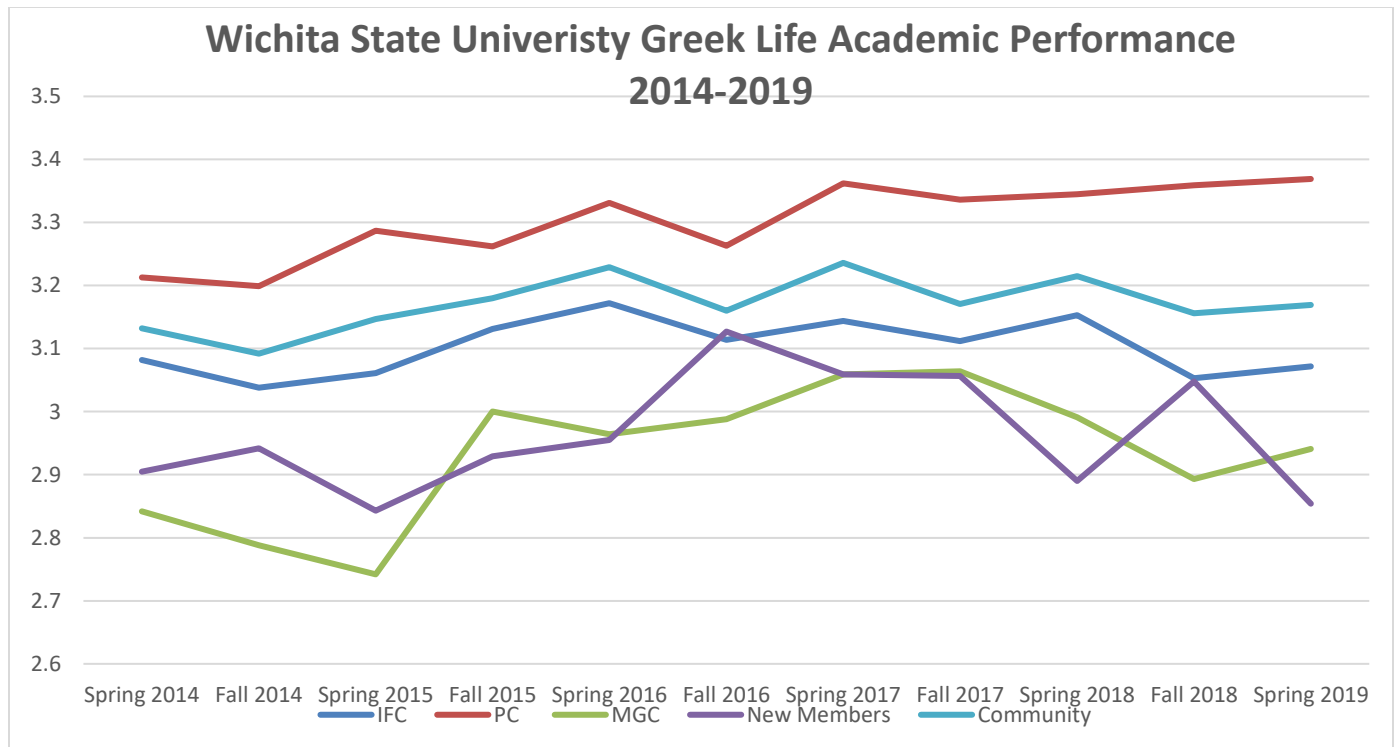
Notable Changes and Highlights

 - The Multicultural Greek Council celebrated ten years in January 2019.
 - The Shock the Yard Step Show celebrated ten years in April 2019.
 - The Multicultural Greek Council Quad was unveiled on April 26, 2019 after seven years of planning.
 - Fraternity and Sorority Life released a 3-year Benchmark plan to create a National Pan-Hellenic Council and (standalone) Multicultural Greek Council by Fall 2021.
- Panhellenic Council
 - Panhellenic Recruitment was moved from September to before school begins in August.
 - Panhellenic Recruitment featured affiliated Recruitment Counselors in August 2018.
 - Panhellenic Council Executive Board was restructured from ten positions to eight positions.

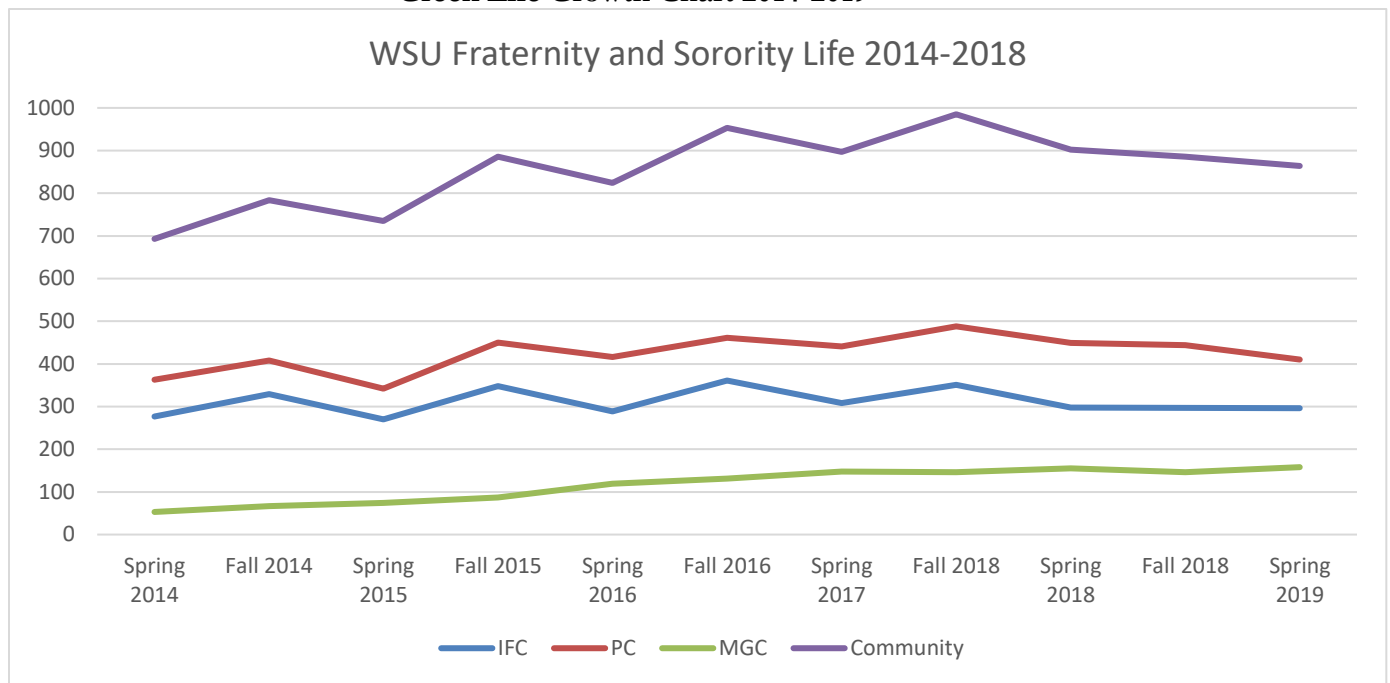

Interfraternity Council Events

- Walk-a-Mile: IFC continued their partnership with the Student Activities Council on this event. This event was held on August 28 to raise awareness for sexual assault and sexual violence. The main speaker for the event was from Wichita Area Sexual Assault Center (WASAC) who gave information about sexual assault statistics and information on college campuses. The event ended with a one-mile walk around Perimeter Road on campus.
- Neighborhood Cleanup: Hosted in October, members from the IFC community came together to clean up the Fairmount Neighborhood. Attendance was low, with around 15 participants.
- Fraternity Done Right Week: Hosted September 4-7, events during the week helped to encourage members to be more aware of their surroundings. Events included QPR Training (Question, Persuade, Refer) which helps to encourage students to learn about suicide prevention and how to help brothers in need. This week also hosted a Title IX training for members.
- Scholarship Dinner: For their first scholarship recognition dinner, IFC created awards for their chapters to be recognized for their outstanding achievement. The event took place at the Metroplex and a formal dinner was served. The following awards were handed out:
 - Most Improved GPA: Lambda Chi Alpha
 - Highest Fall GPA: Farmhouse

- Highest Spring GPA: Phi Delta Theta
- Highest Overall GPA: Farmhouse

Multicultural Greek Council Events

- MGC Informational: Held on August 27, 2018 for the Fall semester and on January 28, 2019 for the Spring semester. Noticing an increase in attendance and an increase in chapter participation, the event was moved into half of the RSC Beggs Ballroom. The Informational saw a steady participation from prospective members, with the Fall event being more heavily attended. Prospective members were able to hear from each chapter and chapters were set up in founding order with their own publicity table. The council eliminated serving food for the spring event due to budget considerations.
- Yard Show: Held on August 31, the Yard Show took place on the RSC North Patio. All chapters within the Multicultural Greek Council participated. Music was turned in before the event and tech was run by staff and MGC Exec members. Each chapter had 5 minutes to do a step and/or a stroll and share information about themselves. Multiple chapters were unable to participate due to members being in class.
- Hump Day: Hump Day went from happening once a semester to once a year. Hump Day was held at the beginning of April as a time for the MGC community to come together. Due to rain, the event was moved indoors to the RSC Atrium where we had food, music, strolling and games.
- MGC Sweethearts Fundraiser: Held in February as a fundraiser for the council. Each chapter can select a candidate to represent them as their “sweetheart.” The council tabled and collected donations and whoever raised the most amount of money (fraternity winner and sorority winner) was crowned the MGC Sweetheart. The fundraiser raised over \$1,700 for the council.
- Hygiene Drive: Held during the month of March, hygiene products were collected to benefit the Shocker Support Locker. This event was not very successful, so we are considering eliminating this from our regular events.
- 10th Annual Shock the Yard Step Show: Held at Koch Arena on April 27. The event sold over 800 tickets and hosted five teams. Division I teams: Delta Mu chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. (first place), the Delta Upsilon chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. (second place) and the Epsilon Alpha chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. Division II teams: Theta Nu Sigma (first place), Sigma Theta chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. from Missouri State University (second place). This year, a social media personality was hired to emcee the event and was a hit with the crowd. Nick Banks “Mr. Bankshot” did a great job hosting and keeping the crowd engaged. It helped boost attendance and keeping the audience engaged. Prior to the event starting, we hosted a 10th Anniversary Celebration where campus partners, chapter presidents and chapter advisors were invited to celebrate the success of the event and the council over the past 10 years

Panhellenic Council Events

- **Formal Recruitment:** Held August 11-15, 2018. This was the first time in many years that recruitment was held prior to classes starting. With a partnership with University Housing, women who signed up for recruitment were given the opportunity to move into housing early at no extra charge. We saw lower numbers, but that was expected with the date transition.

- **Pearls & PC:** Held on September 28 in the RSC. All Panhellenic new members were invited to attend. We spent time playing games and getting to know each other. Food was served and we had prizes for games.
- **Circle of Sisterhood Week:** Starting on October 8 and ending on October 12, this was the first official large series of events for the council philanthropy, Circle of Sisterhood. Monday featured a tabling event to raise funds for a donation to the philanthropy. Tuesday featured a luncheon with the Wichita Alumnae Panhellenic Association and a movie showing at Tri Delta (*Girl Rising*). Wednesday featured a fundraiser at IHOP to raise more funds and Thursday featured a social media campaign surrounding women's empowerment and education. We were supposed to have a speaker come in, but our speaker had a medical emergency, so she was rescheduled for February 2019.
- **Scholarship Celebration:** Held on February 4 in the Beggs Ballroom. Each Panhellenic chapter had the opportunity to give out individual chapter awards. There were changes to the event this year. Rather than inviting the entire Panhellenic Community, the council decided to put it in the hands of the chapters. Whoever received a chapter award was invited to the event. Our total attendance was around 275 people. We also gave away Panhellenic Awards:

- Highest New Member GPA: Gamma Phi Beta
- Highest Active Member GPA: Delta Gamma
- Highest Overall Member GPA: Delta Gamma
- Most Improved: Delta Delta Delta
- Better Friends, Better Sisters, Better Women: This workshop was rescheduled to February 26 from October. Our speaker was Tina VanSteenbergen from the company For College For Life. Tina came and did a workshop with chapter/council leaders and then did a keynote session for Panhellenic members in the CAC Theater. She focused on how to build and maintain relationships with other women.
- Postgrad & PC: Held on April 28 in the RSC. 14 Panhellenic seniors from various chapters were present to hear presentations on financial stability and student loan management and transitioning into life after college with an emphasis on self-care. We gave away a variety of prizes, including a WSU diploma frame, donated from the University Bookstore.
- Sister Mixer: Various sister mixers were held throughout the year, including attending a WSU Men's Baseball game and attending a craft night at Board & Brush (located in downtown Wichita).

Community Events

- Meet and Greek: This event was eliminated due to low attendance and budget allocations.
- President and Advisor Training: Held on August 25 and January 26. The Fall training featured a full schedule that included updating the community on our Fraternity and Sorority Life growth plan, new advising structure, PCI Compliance, ShockerSync 101 and ended with teambuilders and planning session for the upcoming semester with chapter presidents and council presidents. The January event was originally scheduled for January 19 but had to be rescheduled due to large amounts of snow the night before. The January training included the new FSL Vision and statistics, and presentations from the Office of Institutional Equity and Compliance, Student Conduct and Community Standards and the CARE Team.
- New Member Greek Academy: Held on September 23 and February 24, both in the Beggs Ballroom. We took a different approach than past years and covered a variety of topics. We did a history of Greek Life, facilitated icebreakers, had a council president's panel, had a presentation of values-based organizations and put our values into action with the "Who Killed Jane Doe?" activity. After the September event, we hosted a cookout at Sigma Phi Epsilon. No activity was held after the February event.
- Greek Retreat: Held October 12-14 at Camp Hiawatha in Park City, Kansas. 36 Greek students of varying ages participated in Greek Retreat over fall break at Camp Hiawatha. The curriculum was based on the Kansas Leadership Center's teaching on leadership and adaptive challenges. Participants explored adaptive challenges through the lens of Fraternity and Sorority Life by attending sessions that focused on the four leadership competencies: diagnose situation, manage self, energize others and intervene skillfully. The conversation was tied around the idea of Greek unity and how to build that over time. Additionally, the students participated in a high ropes and low ropes course. The students developed their

leadership skills, but most importantly grew a tight-knit bond of Greek unity that remained in place the rest of the academic year.

- HIStory: Hosted March 1-3, 2019 at Camp Hiawatha, the retreat brought 15 men together to learn about a variety of topics surrounding men's health. Topics included healthy relationships, healthy eating and physical wellness, feminism and supporting women, toxic masculinity and challenges affecting fraternity men in today's society. Participants also did the ropes course and zipline at Camp Hiawatha.
- Kallistei: Not held in 2019.
- Annual Greek Awards: Interviews for Greek Awards were held on February 1-4 in Student Involvement. Greek Awards was hosted on March 4 at 6 p.m. at the Metroplex. This year Fraternity and Sorority Life eliminated the before-show snacks to save money. More awards were added this year to provide more students and chapters the opportunity to be recognized.
- Monthly Meetings:
 - Greek Relations Team Meeting: Made up of the Greek Relations chairs for all councils, the team meets every other week to plan events such as council mixers, New Member Greek Academy and more.
 - Public Relations Team Meeting: The team did not meet during Fall 2018. The team did meet in Spring 2019 but ultimately it was determined that the team was not effective enough and the team was eliminated.
 - Chapter President Meetings (1 per month): Typically held the last Thursday of the month (excluding January, May, June, July, August and December). Each chapter is represented, and if the chapter president is not able to attend then a chapter officer can come in their place. Guest speakers are invited to attend at the beginning of the meeting and chapters are given the opportunity to announce upcoming events and bring forward community issues at the end of the meeting after all agenda items are discussed.
 - Chapter Advisor Meetings: Held once a month (excluding January, May, July, August and December). Both on and off campus advisors are invited to attend meetings where trends are discussed, as well as trainings and community updates.
 - Council President Meetings: Made up of the three council presidents, meetings are held with FSL staff every other week to discuss community issues and community initiatives.

Rhatigan Legacy Award

After the conclusion of the 2015 awards cycle, the Rhatigan Standards for Fraternal Excellence was combined with the Outstanding Fraternity and Sorority Award to create the Rhatigan Legacy Award. The Rhatigan Legacy Award was scored based on three equally weighed sections and judged by three sets of judges. The sections include a statistics section that focuses on retention, philanthropy, service, programming, academics, and goals; an essay section that focuses on the chapter's legacy, improvements, and development; and a presentation section where chapters will be given a prompt each year to tie to their chapter. The first section was scored by Fraternity and Sorority Life staff, the second section was scored by Fraternity and Sorority Life Advisors from other institutions and the third section was judged by Greek alumni working at WSU that are not affiliated with any chapter on campus. The fraternity and sorority with the highest score won the Rhatigan Legacy Award, and then any chapter receiving at least 80% of the points received the Gold Level of the Rhatigan Standards of Fraternal Excellence, and any chapter receiving at least 75% of the points received the Silver Level of the Rhatigan Standards of Fraternal Excellence.

Leadership

The growth in participation in leadership programs confirmed the students' interest and commitment to formal leadership opportunities at WSU. This included offering programs that students could earn academic credit for by officially registering and completing coursework. Those students who earned credit for completing the program could apply those credits towards the Undergraduate Leadership Certificate. In the 2018-2019 academic year, the following nine programs were offered.

Emerging Leaders Program

Emerging Leaders is a unique opportunity for first year students at WSU to get on the fast track to student leadership, campus and community involvement. Students who participate in the Emerging Leaders Program receive an insider's perspective on Student Involvement at WSU. Throughout the program, students had an opportunity to develop their leadership abilities through workshops, activities and reflection in order to prepare them for future leadership experience at WSU and beyond. Students were paired with upperclassmen mentors.

We had 12 students complete the program and five mentors who helped guide them. Five students enrolled and received one academic credit each by completing course requirements. This year, we moved the program to the Fall semester to offset other programs and their dates/times. The goal was to reach students in their first semester and connect them with other opportunities. There were a variety of leadership topics covered as well as exposure to different styles of leadership including their own and how it's applied in their day to day life. Students completed a pre and post assessment that can be found in the assessment section of this report.

Engaging Leaders Program

The Engaging Leaders Program offers students the unique opportunity to explore, discuss and analyze various professional fields directed by executive officials from different companies, corporations and industries throughout the Wichita area. The program introduces participants to those leadership skills that rising leaders should possess and consider when choosing a career path. The program provides for visits to various city facilities, exposure to different philosophies, styles of leadership and gives participants a chance to assemble facts, evaluate options and become more comfortable with the transition from the classroom to the boardroom. This year, we moved the program to the Fall semester to offset other programs and their dates/times to compliment the schedule switch with Emerging Leaders.

Eleven (11) students completed the program visiting six different leaders/sites, two of those participants received academic credit. These sites included Ben Simon/Freddy's Frozen Custard & Steakhouses Headquarters, Robert Layton/Wichita City Manager, Jason Desai with Wesley Medical Center (a new site this year), Chad Gericke with Airbus, and Thane Chastain/Kansas Leadership Center.

Evolving Leaders Program

The Evolving Leaders Program is for returning students to WSU who are looking to expand upon their leadership skills and abilities. The new curriculum featured five different leadership inventories/ assessments including StrengthsQuest, True Colors, Myers Briggs and Leadership Style Assessment, and a newly introduce assessment called the Professional DynaMetric Programs - PDP ProScan. The program was administered over an eight-week time period in the Spring Semester, a recent change, and hosted on Fridays based on past participant feedback. We received 22 applications with 16 students completing the program, three for academic credit.

Leadership Book Club

The Leadership Book Club began in the fall of 2015 with the goal of 10 participants. Since its beginning, it has been a program that faculty, staff and students look forward to and get excited about. The club read "How Full is Your Bucket" by *Don Clifton* and *Tim Rath* during the Fall semester with 30 participants. Because of the buzz, we were able to offer two titles in the Spring. A repeat of "Leading Imperfectly" by James *Robilotta* was offered alongside "Strengths-Based Leadership" by Gallup. 30 participants signed up for "Strengths-Based Leadership" and 18 registered for the second offering of "Leading Imperfectly". Of the total 48 participants in the spring offering, 13 participants signed up for both book sessions.

A recent addition to this program was piloting an online option through Google Classroom for participants that couldn't attend the in-person sessions. This option resulted in a lot of feedback as

well as opportunities to offer again. Approximately 14 signed up to participate online. We are looking to pilot again to gain more information on its effectiveness with hopes to offer this option permanently.

WSU Student of the Year

The WSU Student of the Year Scholarship, formerly known as the Man and Woman of the Year Scholarship, is awarded to two outstanding students who have shown exemplary leadership, involvement and service to both the WSU and Wichita communities. Candidates had to meet the following requirements: must have at least a 3.0 cumulative G.P.A., must be currently enrolled in at least six credit hours at WSU, and must have completed at least 60 hours with at least 30 hours from WSU. We received 53 applicants, 40 of which were moved forward. Each completed application included responses to essay questions, resume and a letter of recommendation. Up to 20 selected applicants interviewed with a panel of faculty and staff whom determined the top eight finalists. This year, we ended up with 10 finalists due to tight scoring and interview performance. Finalists gave a 10-minute presentation on their strengths based on the Clifton StrengthsFinder to demonstrate how they would live out the rest of the academic year as a leader and impact they hope to have on campus and in the community. The finalists were honored at a banquet as well as at Songfest during Shocktoberfest.

The Summer Leadership Institute (SLI)

The Summer Leadership Institute (SLI) is a five-day experience that allows participants to evolve and expand upon their leadership skills and abilities. SLI took place at Camp Hiawatha in Valley Center, KS. We adjusted the venue to accommodate rising costs and to provide more activities for our participants. Additionally, we were able to have the location for the sole use of SLI which allowed the integrity of the program to thrive. In past locations, we were sharing locations with other groups. We received 71 applicants and selected 45 students to attend in addition to the five student leaders who attended and helped with the planning of the week. A new addition to this year was the role of an additional on-site coordinator to assist with logistical planning and week of execution. This now brings us to two on site coordinators to round out our staff. SLI is open to any student looking to grow as a leader and they ranged from freshmen through graduate students. Each student was assigned a leadership squad who they met with throughout the institute and had the opportunity to discuss and reflect upon the leadership lessons taught. To help guide students throughout the week, each squad was assigned two leaders, one staff member and one student leader who had attended SLI in a previous year.

The vision statement for SLI was “Developing ethical leaders through self-discovery and action!” There were four learning objectives.

1. Understand what it means to be an ethical leader.
2. Self-actualization through reflection and assessment.
3. Enhancing effective communication skills through team dynamics.
4. Commitment to becoming an ethical leader through self-discovery and action.

The LeaderShape® Institute™

This is our second year of re-offering the Institute by LeaderShape to the WSU campus!!! LeaderShape is a 6-day experience that challenges participants to lead with integrity. This nationally recognized organization facilitates participants through a series of dynamic, challenging, and exciting sessions designed to increase, develop, and launch the leadership capacity of students. This experience not only benefits them individually, but professionally and the communities/organizations they go on to lead and serve in the future. Participants cultivate leadership skills, reflect, and discuss leadership lessons within a small cohort or cluster of students. This year, 62 students applied and 50 completed the institute.

This year we added the role of two on-site coordinators to help with logistical planning and week of execution, both recent graduates of the 2018 Institute.

Catalyst™ by LeaderShape

Due to a package pricing option, we were able to provide a one-time offering of another LeaderShape program called Catalyst. Catalyst™ is great entry into the LeaderShape® community. It is a one-day program focused on helping to develop students’ own authentic path, connect them to groups and causes they care about, and commit them to a plan to be a catalyst for themselves and the groups they are part of. 30 students registered to attend and 15 completed. Upon reaching out to the other registrants, we have determined that the snow storm/weather forecast became the primary reason for the completion number. Since this was a one-time offering, we will not be offering Catalyst in the next academic year.

Resilience™ by LeaderShape

Included in our package pricing option with LeaderShape, we were able to host a one-time offering of Resilience to Student Affairs staff. LeaderShape’s® Resilience™ program is a 1-day eye-opener based on the research of Dr. Amit Sood that explores resilient leadership and how it builds strong, flexible relationships and communities. 55 Student Affairs professionals signed up and participated in the event sponsored in collaboration with the Student Affairs Development Committee headed by Delinda Royce.

WSU Graduate Student of the Year

This year, we introduced a scholarship competition for the WSU Graduate Student of the Year. Student Involvement has always awarded a scholarship to a Graduate Leader of the Year through

our Shocker Leadership Awards, however, this year; we wanted to increase the amount and formalize the process. Previously, the applicants would apply to be selected and were awarded the title of Graduate Leader of the Year and a \$500 scholarship. Through the WSU Graduate Student of the Year, we added a second round to the competition and increased the scholarship amounts to \$1,000 for the winner and \$500 for the remaining finalists.

In its first year, 46 graduate students applied. The top 10 moved onto the second round, which consisted of an interview and short presentation. From this round, six finalists were identified, honored with a Luncheon, and the winner announced.

Clifton Strengths

In addition to these nine programs, Student Involvement was able to pilot and implement a new program initiative surround Clifton StrengthsFinder. During the 2017-2018 academic year, Dr. Teri Hall, Vice President for Student Affairs, had requested research on becoming a Strengths-Based Institution. With the help of a Graduate Intern, we were able to research seven various institutions, most of which were in the Midwest. This allowed us to interview and see various ways of implementation on different sized campuses with multiple sources of funding and implementation strategies. Based on this research, we were able to pilot this past year a few modules to target audiences including Honors First Year Seminars, Student Involvement Executive Teams, Multicultural Student Mentoring Program, and other departmental organizations. To date, we have provided modules for twelve groups. Six of these groups were from different departments and academic areas outside of Student Involvement. Additionally, we gained the momentum to begin creating partnerships with other departments on campus including Housing and Residence Life, Professional Edge and Engineering Mentors.

Funding will be in continual progress as we determine partners and ways to fund this initiative. Currently, we have been approved to fund through a \$29.50 fee. Included in the fee is the following:

- Clifton Strengths Access Code for Top 5 Results
- Access to our WSU Shocker Portal including individual results and resources.
- Materials for up to 3 modules (listed below)

We are also able to offer a \$15 package that covers the cost of the assessment and materials for one module. This package is popular among recognized student organizations.

To date, we have used 300 strengths codes with 254 of those newly provided and completed, 15 started, but not completed, and 31 transferred in from current accounts. All these codes have been attached to the three modules below.

- Module 1: Naming Your Strengths - During this module, participants will go through all 34 themes and do an activity that allows students to understand their talents and how they utilize them as strengths. This module is heavily introductory to the language and concepts of Clifton Strengths.
- Module 2: Claiming Your Strengths - In this session, participants will go through the concepts of Barrier Labels (negative perceptions of talents) and the Balconies and Basements (when a talent is pushing us up the river and when a talent is creating an obstacle for us) concept surrounding their themes. This allows the participants to understand the full range of a talent and how it relates to them.
- Module 3: Aiming Your Strengths - This session uses a few activities for students to develop strength-based goals and action plans that they can make progress on. Students will also connect with additional resources and strengths champions to further progress on these and other goals.

The Coordinator of Leadership Development has been certified as a Strengths Coach and has received the proper credentials to train others through Gallup's certification courses. The goal is to train others to become Strength Champions and begin to provide strengths-based opportunities for all students at Wichita State. Based on these efforts, partnerships with the Live and Learn Communities within Housing and Residential Life, Professional Edge, Engineering, and more academic areas, we will look to reach our goal of over 500 students accessing and using their strengths in 2019-2020.

Recognized Student Organizations

Registration and Renewal

Wichita State University students have created approximately 300 recognized organizations that range from graphic arts to intramural sports. With this diverse collection of student organizations, students can explore their interests and passions while contributing to a vibrant campus climate and close-knit student community. Student organizations provide far-reaching efforts to create intersections of identity, perspectives and in helping students adjust to campus.

At the beginning of FY19, we successfully transitioned our student organization management software from OrgSync to ShockerSync. The migration took a period of three months to prepare with the Assistant Director (Student Governance and Organizations) working directly with the Engage staff to prepare for the migration. The ShockerSync migration completed on July 3, 2018 and went live on July 16, 2018.

On March 23, 2019, Student Involvement executed a three-year contract with Engage to renew our agreement, which went into effect May 1, 2019 and will expire on April 30, 2022.

Involvement Fair

Every fall, we host the Involvement Fair. This fair is the best way to learn about co-curricular and extracurricular activities at Wichita State. Held during Welcomefest each fall, members of more than 100 student organizations will be on hand to share with students a little bit about what they do and how to get involved. This fall, 80 student groups participated in the Involvement Fair with about 523 students in attendance.

Nuts and Bolts Conference

Every fall, Student Involvement plans a training seminar for student organizations on university policy and procedure. The Nuts & Bolts Conference serves as the largest student organization training introduce the resources available through Student Involvement and WSU, connect organizations to SGA and update organizations on the university policies and procedures that affect student organizations. This event is required for organization renewal each year and **two (2) members** of the organization must attend. This fall, 227 students representing 128 student organizations attended and participated.

Springfest

Springfest is a kick-off for the spring semester for both student organizations and university departments. Located in the Heskett Center Gym, this event acts as a way for WSU students to check out the many different organizations we have on campus, as well as discover the amazing resources this campus offers. Along with informational tables, Springfest includes music, inflatables, food, prizes, and contests for all students to participate. This spring, 80 groups, departments and programs participated in Springfest with over 372 students in attendance.

Types of Organizations

1. *Recognized Student Organization:* An organization that has completed the annual renewal process, in which at least eighty (80) percent of total members are currently enrolled University students.
1. *University/ Departmental/ Community Organization:* An organization in which at least fifty (50) percent of total members are currently enrolled University students.
2. *Provisional Organization:* An organization in its first year of existence or in which less than fifty (50) percent of total members are University students. *Groups which do not adhere to university policy, may be placed on provisional status.

Classification of Organizations

- **Academic & Professional (A/P):** Organizations related to an academic discipline/college or professional field available at Wichita State University.

- **Cultural/International (C/I):** Organizations promoting or enhancing a specific culture(s) or related activities on campus. The objectives are aimed to explore and celebrate their own cultural heritage and provide programs and services.
- **Community Service (CS):** Organizations providing volunteer services or assistance to the university and local community through altruistic or philanthropy events.
- **Fraternity/Sorority (F/S):** Organizations affiliated with the Interfraternity Council, Multicultural Greek Council or Women's Panhellenic Association.
- **Governing/Representative Councils (G/R):** Organizations which coordinate and/or govern a specific population or member Organizations. Organizations must be approved by Student Involvement.
- **Graduate Interest (GI):** Organizations solely focused on the advancement and development of graduate students.
- **Honorary (H):** Organizations formed to recognize or honor excellence in a specific field and which have selective membership i.e. requirements for membership.
- **Other (O):** Organizations which do not fit in one of the other categories listed.
- **Political (P):** Organizations affiliated with or promoting a particular party, individual or issue in local, state, national or international politics.
- **Recreation Clubs (RC):** Recreational Clubs are sports-related interest organizations that meet all Recognized Student Organization (RSO) policies and focus around self-exploration for its members. Recreational Clubs are deemed high-risk organizations and must have every member sign a waiver absolving Wichita State University, its staff and designees from any liability due to member negligence.
- **Sports Clubs (S):** Organizations established for a competitive recreational purpose (Organizations wishing to obtain Sports Club status must contact the Coordinator of Intramural Sports and Competition in Campus Recreation). These organizations are not eligible for RSO funding through Student Government Association other than what is allocated to the Sports Club program. The organizations will also be governed by the Sports Club Manual.
- **Religious (R):** Organizations affiliated with or promoting a religion, set of religious beliefs or lack thereof.
- **Residence Hall (RH):** Organizations whose members reside in university student housing facilities or their associates.
- **Special Interest (SI):** Organizations promoting or related to specific, defined interests.

Event Registration

RSOs at WSU plan events throughout the year that add to student life and campus culture. This year, organizations utilized ShockerSync to publicize and promote 1,456 events. Of the 1,456 events, 869 events were required to be registered with Student Involvement.

Any group planning to host an event which meets the below mentioned parameters must complete an RSO event registration form in its entirety, ensuring that all officials agree on the expectations

and execution of plans. This form, and the entire event planning process, must be completed in its entirety at least ten (10) business days prior to an event and submitted via OrgSync to Student Involvement. All University locations must be reserved tentatively prior to the submission of this form.

The following are variables that help define an event registration:

- Over one hundred (100) people will be attending
- Money will be exchanged
- The event is open and/or marketed to the general public
- Alcohol will be served
- Food will be served
- The event requires the RSO to enter into a contract with another entity
- A controversial/political topic may be discussed
- The event is outdoors and on-campus
- Event is publicized (more than three of the following items are used: Facebook, poster, handbill, texting message, website, formal invitation, Twitter, organizational calendar, information table)

RSO Workshops

Each year, we offer several trainings for RSO leaders and advisors to attend in order to develop their leadership and/or management skills further. This year, as in previous, we collaborated with campus partners to offer a wide array of sessions to our students.

Shocker Leadership Awards

The 7th Annual Shocker Leadership awards was hosted on May 8th. Over 115 guests were in attendance and 82 applications were submitted this year. This year we added new awards for student organizations (denoted with a *). The winners were:

Highlights

The Student Activities Council began the 2018-2019 academic year with an executive board consisting of two returning members in officer positions. The remaining leadership positions were all new additions to the executive board within SAC.

- 9,275 participants attended 60 SAC events this academic year
- 4 new positions were added to the Executive Board providing 11 total leadership opportunities
- 60% of members improved their cumulative GPA from Fall '18 to Spring '19 after participating in a structured career readiness/mentorship program
- 20 members that participated in the SAC career readiness/mentorship program (NACA/NACE) reported an average growth of +0.62 points in their career readiness skills on a 7-point scale. 76.25% of participants reported growth as a result of participation in the organization's program
- Record Attendance at Trunk or Treat (1,725) which was held at a new location: Charles Koch Area Throwing Field
- Hosted social media personality, Matt Bellasai, the 2016 People's Choice Award winner for Favorite Social Media Star
- Updated the organization's Constitution, By-Laws, and Policies to reflect and support the future trajectory and goals for the organization.

- Utilized a new location for Spring Family Carnival: Airbus Lawn and the Food Truck Plaza

Challenges

- Low GPAs of Executive Board members in the Spring 2018 and Fall 2018 semesters led to a large amount of turnover in the organization's leadership over the year
- High turnover in executive board members made it difficult to provide consistent and comprehensive training to all and diminished the mentorship experience of members
- The growing busy schedules and demands of college student life make it difficult for members and executive board members to consistently fulfill their commitments to the organization
- The growing costs of bringing in outside talent and providing new experiences for students through events without equal increases in our allocated budgets resulted in the production of a lower number of events than is typical for the organization
- The inability to raise the stipend amount provided to student leaders caused many interested candidates to take positions elsewhere
- Mental health concerns of our executive board members were at an all-time high this year

Major Changes

- Added a new professional staff member whose sole responsibility is to assist with the advising of the Student Activities Council, effectively providing staff with a more balanced workload and providing students new perspectives and opportunities for learning
- Implemented a career readiness curriculum into the mentorship experience that members receive which provided more structure learning opportunities for members to grow their skills

Commitment to the Future

- Placing a larger emphasis on academic success as a member of the organization and implementing activities and mentorship opportunities that facilitate this
- Securing consistent annual funding for a large-scale campus event (concert, highly regarded performer, etc.) every year
- Incorporate learning outcomes as a driving force for event planning
- Develop member incentive program for continued involvement in the organization
- Enhance career readiness/mentorship curriculum for continued annual use

Organization Goals

1. **By May 2019, increase the number of active members to 60 people meeting all membership requirements 80% of the time.**
 - a. Action Step: Execute at least 2 new marketing campaigns. *One campaign was executed at Involvement Fair and another was executed at SpringFest. An additional campaign was developed for execution over the summer at new student orientations.*
 - b. Action Step: Create a current Member Tracker in GMMs for members to see their progress. *Although this is kept electronically and members can access at any time, a tangible chart of member progress was not created.*
 - c. Action Step: Chairs will keep track of their mentees progress in meeting membership requirements and encourage them to do things to help them fulfill them every month. *Progress was made on this action step toward the end of the academic year as our training*

of Executive Board members became more consistent and members became more connected to their mentors.

- d. Actions Step: Chairs will engage members in the event planning process from start to finish. We will use GMM activities and office hours to do this. *Progress was made on this action step toward the end of the academic year as our training of Executive Board members became more consistent and members became more connected to their mentors.*
- e. Summary of Accomplishment:
 - i. At the end of the fall semester, we had 17 active general members meeting membership requirements 80% of the time. At the start of the Spring semester, we lost 11 of those members due to class and work conflicts and one additional member became a member of the executive board.
 - ii. Over the course of the Spring semester, the SAC Executive Board actively recruited new members at Springfest and quickly gained 13 new members. All those members were retained throughout the semester and we ended the Spring semester with 18 active members meeting membership requirements 90% of the time.
 - iii. The initial goal of 60 active members was based on the number of members that were in the organization in Fall 2017 but did not take into consideration the level of commitment of those members or the number of them that were meeting membership requirements. Upon review, it was found that in 2017-2018 approx. 20 members were meeting membership requirements 80% of the time. Therefore, we feel that we've enhanced our membership base, replacing quantity with quality, and are in a place to continue recruiting this same type of member (committed, academically successful, present, etc.) in the future.
 - iv. From this goal, we have learned that having 25-30 active members would be a more reasonable stretch goal for the organization and will pursue this goal by actively recruiting over the summer and during WelcomeFest.

2. By the end of Spring 2019, reduce the average cost per person at events to \$8.

- a. Action Step: Always bring marketing activities to GMM for 4-4:30 p.m. and 5:30-6 p.m. *Implementing this step helped to decrease the amount of unnecessary printing being done for events and allowed members to be more engaged with marketing strategies, in theory, getting more participants to come to events and overall reducing the cost per person.*
- b. Action Step: Utilize materials that we already have to execute events, marketing, etc. Be frugal with what we buy, don't open until we need it. Be conscious about how much you're printing. *An inventory of supplies and resources already available, owned, or purchased by the organization was conducted to find creative ways to use them, instead of purchasing new supplies. Unused supplies were able to be returned.*
- c. Action Step: Exec will have and follow a set marketing deadline calendar for fulfilling marketing guidelines and expectations. *Event preparation calendars were created in the Fall and Spring semesters by each chair to ensure that all events met a minimum standard for marketing. This standard, developed by the Vice President of Marketing and Marketing Assistant in the Fall semester, in theory, would get more participants to come to events reducing the cost per person overall.*
- d. Summary of Accomplishment:
 - i. At the end of the Fall 2018 semester, 6,202 participants attended 38 SAC sponsored events. The average cost per person for the Fall semester was \$7.10.

- ii. At the end of the Spring 2019 semester, 3,073 people attended 22 SAC sponsored events. The average cost per person for spring was \$9.27.
- iii. Overall, the goal to reduce the average cost per person at events was met. Combined, 9,275 people attend 60 events and the average cost per person was \$7.82.

3. By the end of Spring 2019, increase member learning and development through the membership curriculum by an average of 2 assessment points for 80% of active members.

- a. Action Step: Executive Board members will facilitate at least one lesson of the curriculum to general members. *Executive Board members facilitated some lessons of the curriculum towards the end of the academic year, but preparation for the most effective execution of this action step was not completed in a timely manner. Most of the curriculum was facilitated by the Vice President of Membership. In future execution, steps will be taken to ensure that Executive Board members are a more active part of curriculum facilitation.*
- b. Action Step: Executive Board members will work 1:1 with mentees using their assessments to help them each develop in the competencies in the ways that they need to. *Assessments were not completed/collected in a timely manner making evaluation of growth difficult to gauge until the end of the academic year. Mentors were not assigned until the Spring semester making 1:1 work difficult to achieve as well.*
- c. Summary of Accomplishment:
 - i. 20 individuals completed the career readiness/mentorship curriculum from start to finish. The curriculum focused on 8 major development modules based on NACA Competencies and NACE Career Competencies: These modules were:
 - 1. Event Planning & Management
 - 2. Clarified Values
 - 3. Social Responsibility & Civic Engagement
 - 4. Career Exploration/Readiness
 - 5. Teamwork & Collaboration
 - 6. Effective Communication
 - 7. Healthy Behaviors & Satisfying Lifestyles
 - 8. Multicultural Competency
 - ii. Assessments of skills within these development modules were assessed with the goal of measuring growth in these module areas over the course of the facilitated curriculum. The numbers listed below show the average growth reported on a 7-point Likert scale from the beginning of a students' experience with the curriculum to the end.

- iii. While growth did not reach 2 assessment points, 76.25% of participants experienced some growth in their career readiness skills as a result of participation in the organization. The average reported growth in these areas collectively, is +0.62.

4. At the end of each semester, 75% of members have a 2.5 GPA. At the end of each semester, the executive board average GPA will be 3.0.

- a. Action Step: Hold 1 study group each month that all exec can attend and invite members to attend as well. *Study groups were held one a month with more held informally throughout the year.*
- b. Action Step: Member and exec grades will be checked at semester for the purpose of reviewing academic progress. Members and exec will meet with officers or advisors if they fall below the GPA requirement. *GPA's were monitored for satisfactory academic progress and minimum GPA requirement.*
- c. Action Step: Incorporate recognition of member academic achievements (i.e. celebration jar - weekly, most improved and highest GPA awards at semester). *Raffle prizes were given to members that attended study nights as an extra incentive for attendance.*
- d. Summary of Accomplishment:
 - i. Members:
 1. At the end of the Fall semester, 82% of members met the minimum 2.5 GPA requirement. The average Fall 2018 Member GPA was 3.211 and the average Cumulative Member GPA at the end of the Fall 2018 semester was 3.339. 58% of the general membership improved their reported cumulative GPA prior to membership.
 2. At the end of the Spring semester, 88.8% of members met the minimum 2.5 GPA requirement. The average Spring 2019 Member GPA was 3.248 and the average Cumulative Member GPA at the end of the Spring 2019 semester was 3.270. 55.5% of the general membership improved their reported cumulative GPA from Fall 2018.
 - ii. Executive Board:
 1. At the end of the Fall semester, the Executive Board Fall 2018 average GPA was 2.924. The average Cumulative Executive Board GPA was 3.234 at the end of the Fall 2018 semester which is an average decrease of 0.127 GPA points from the reported cumulative average at the start of the term.
 2. At the end of the Spring semester, the Executive Board Spring 2019 average GPA was 3.130. The average Cumulative Executive Board GPA was 3.376 at the end of the Spring 2019 semester which is an average decrease of 0.100 GPA points from the reported cumulative average at the start of the Spring semester.

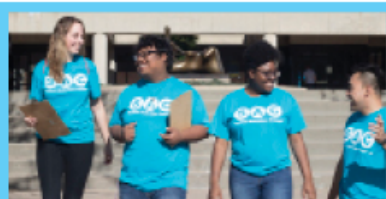

On Going Initiatives

Shocker Support Locker: The Locker saw a lot of changes this year. First, the Locker was awarded a VISTA position from the Center of Community Engagement, however, the hiring was delayed due to lack of qualified applicants. In the fall, the Senate approved a transfer of \$17,500 to help financially sustain the Shocker Support Locker. The funding allowed the hiring of a Graduate Assistant and student assistants to assist in the day-to-day operations of the Locker. The Locker collaborated with Dillions Corporate to award the Shocker Support Locker \$2,500. A few changes to policies implemented to Shocker Support Locker, now requiring that all students, faculty and staff must have their WSU ID in order to use space. Working with Food Rescue ICT, Starbucks Donations now includes the RSC Starbucks and Ground House. The Shocker Support Locker changed its mission to: *The Shocker Support Locker, through the ongoing generosity of the Wichita State community and community partners seeks to empower Shockers along their journey at Wichita State University with temporary supplemental assistance. The Locker aims to alleviate food insecurity on campus and contribute to the overall health and wellbeing of our students, faculty, and staff, by providing a variety of nutritional and functional resources to Shockers at no cost.* The Locker staff changes the requirements and hours of the Locker. Starting January 2, the Shocker Support Locker Hours will now be Monday-Friday 10am-6pm. Students, faculty and staff will be able to collect up to 25 items per week.

Campus Safety Walk: The third annual campus Safety Walk, sponsored by the Senate's Safety and Student Service Committee, was held on November 2, 2018. Over 30 students attended and helped walk around campus and identify potential safety issues.

Legal Services: The 61th Session worked with Kansas Legal Services to offer two days where students could sign up to meet with an attorney. Students did not sign up or show up for these sessions. Talks were had with the Kansas Legal Services and the Executive Cabinet to see how we revamp this service to best meet students needs.

Keeping Up with Kenon/Rockin' with Rowell: Monthly video of the SGA President answering questions submitted via the website.

Coffee with a Cop: An open forum where WSU Police were on hand to answer questions sponsored by the Senate's Safety and Student Services Committee.

Scholarships: The 61st Session awarded 25 scholarships totaling \$20,770.00. The scholarships include the International Student Scholarship awarded \$10,000.00, James J. Rhatigan Leadership Scholarship awarded \$4,520.00, SGA Endowed Scholarship awarded \$4,000.00 and the SGA Endowed Summer Scholarship awarded \$2,250.00. Individual Funding: During the 61st session, a total of 59 students were funded utilizing the Individual Funding allocations.

Orgnaizational Funding: During the 61st session, a total of 47 organizations students were funded utilizing the Organizational Funding allocations.

61th Session Intivities

Food for Fines: In the fall of 2018 the first Food for Fines was held. This event allowed students, faculty and staff to have certain parking fees expunged when they brought in a number of items for the Shocker Support Locker. This initiative was developed and carried out by the Student Advocate and held twice in the fall and twice in the spring semester.

Mental Heath Awareness: A goal of the 61st session was to raise awareness of mental health. In the fall of 2018, the Student Advocate sponsored an event with the Counseling and Testing Center to train individuals on how to see signs and talk to people who are suicidal. An aspect of the event was individuals who shared their stories of survival.

Student Fees: In the fall of 2018 a committee was formed, made up of students and budget officers, who looked at the student fees process and made recommendations for improvement.

Live Streaming Senate Meetings: In the 60th Session SGA was told that they were not in compliance for assessability when we were livestreatming senate meetings via Facebook. Thus the livestreaming stopped. When the 61st Session came in they began to explore options to begin livestreaming senate again. They met with various campus partners and made an agreement with the Rhatigan Student Center to buy the cameras for the senate meeting room. The cameras and other equipment was installed in Fall 2018 and tested the beginning of the spring 2019 semester. On February 20, 2019 SGA began to livestream senate meetings via YouTube in complaine with assessability guidelines. Over the course of seven meetings, we ended the year with 1,538 views.

Graduate Assistant of the Year: The Academic Committee started an award to recognize the work of graduate assistants. They sought nominations and asked individuals to apply for the award. There were two finalists, Kaitlin Patterson and Rheanna Pierce and one winner, Evan Waite. The winner received a nice trophy.

Campus Survey: In November 2018 SGA disseminated a survey to a representative sample of 4,000 students. This survey covered a vareity of topics including safety on campus, personal services on campus, inclusion, general education, strenghts and the student advocate.

Auxiliary Funding: Stella Yang, SGA Treasurer and Gabriel Fonseca, SGA Advisor created the Auxiliary Funding process. In lieu of a legislative request to allocate the funds, a Committee was assembled made up of the Budget and Finance Committee, the Student Body President, Student Body Vice President, Student Advocate and SGA Advisors to award funding requests. Student Fee funded departments/groups could apply up to \$5,000 per year while student organizations could apply up to \$3,000. This year the Committee awarded over \$35,000 in funding. A new fund was established with the SGA Org to hold all roll over funding.

Inaguration: For the 62nd Session, we started an offical inaguration ceremony. The president and vice president, along with 23 elected senators, were sworn in during the ceremony.

Human Trafficing Gallery Show: The Safety and Student Services Committee, in partnership with the Human Trafficking Center hosted a art showcase auction to raise funding to donate to the Center. An anonymous donor agreeded to match the total funding, donating over \$700 to the Center.

Department Mission

Student Involvement is committed to students and the WSU Community by intentionally creating co-curricular experiences through student engagement and development, resulting in a vibrant campus culture that enhances their journey as a Shocker.

Department Highlights and Accomplishments

- We completed and implemented our Department Strategic Plan
- A search was conducted to bring a Muslim sorority to campus and Mu Delta Alpha Sorority was selected for fall 2019
- The Multicultural Greek Council and the Step Show celebrated 10 years
- After over six years of planning, the Multicultural Greek Council Quad was unveiled
- 300 student organizations were recognized this year, with 26 new organizations
- Food for Fines, a Student Government initiative, was started this year with 6,610 items collected
- Leadership programming expanded to include strengths based leadership modules
- Scholarships were added and the amount increased as well as the process formalized the Graduate Student of the Year award

Impact on Student Retention and Graduation

Executive Board: 58 students coded in either fall 2017 or spring 2018. Out of the 58, 28 re-enrolled for fall 2018 and 19 graduated, so that gives a “success rate” (success=either re-enrolled or graduated) of 81% (28+19=47; 47/58=81%).

Members of Directly Advised Groups: 190 students coded in either fall 2017 or spring 2018. Out of the 190, 110 re-enrolled for fall 2018 and 40 graduated, so that gives a “success rate” (success=either re-enrolled or graduated) of 78.9% ($110+40=150$; $150/190=78.9\%$).

Just for reference, there were 10,970 degree-seeking undergraduate students enrolled for fall 2017, so while we can say students who have these codes have the above success/persistence rates, we can't say that students with these codes are persisting/ more successful than those without these codes due to only 2.3% ($248/10,970$) of the degree-seeking undergraduate student population having these codes.

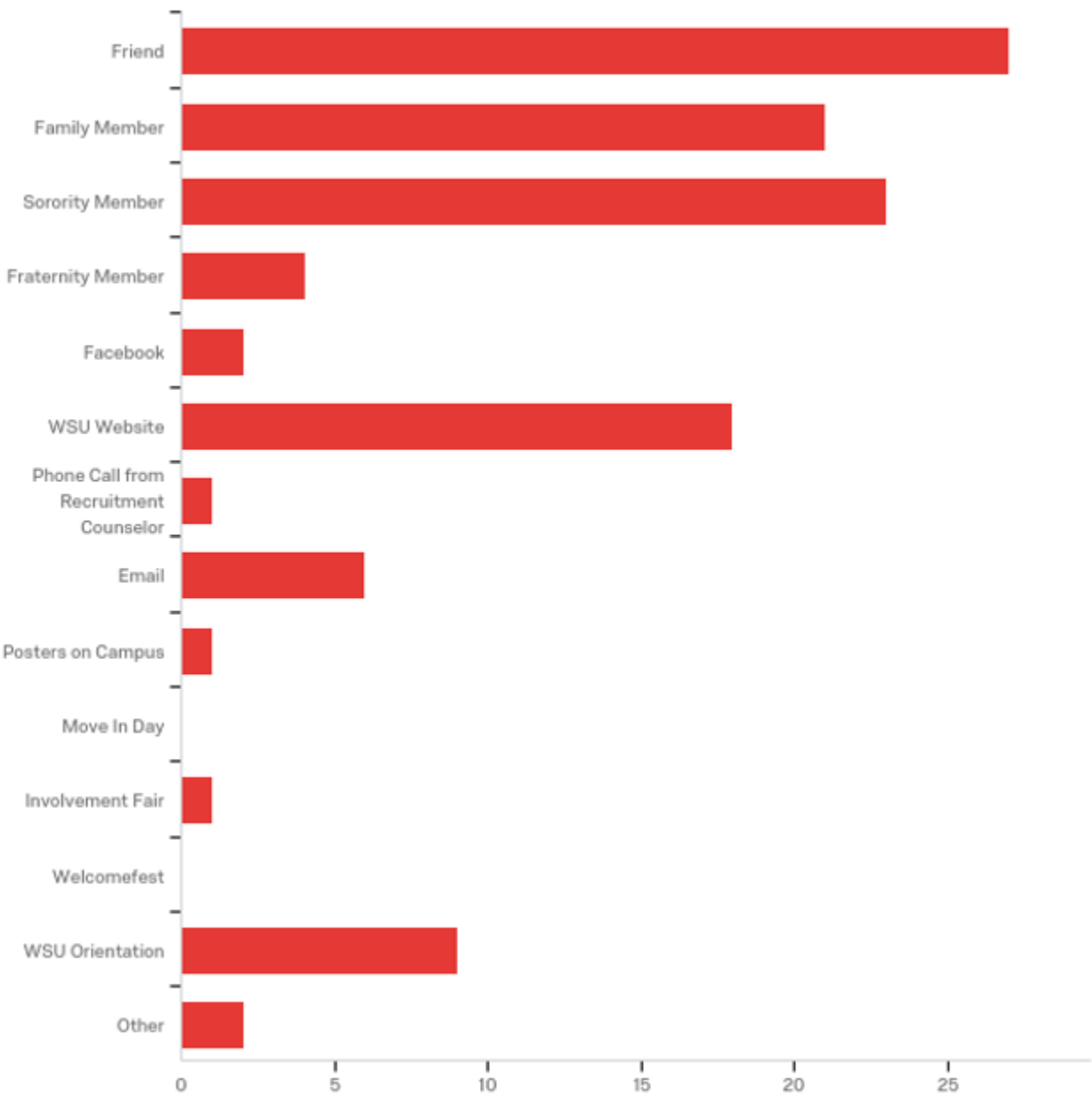

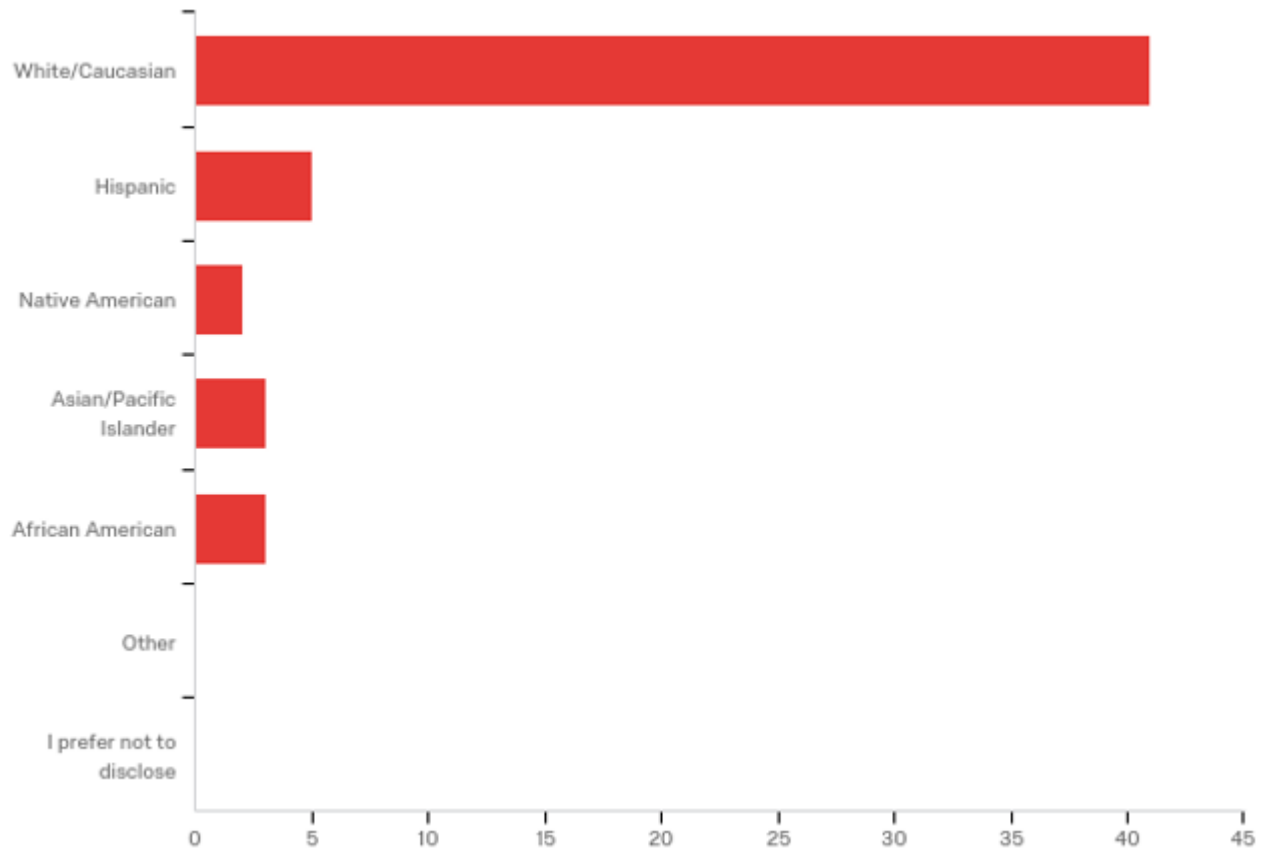

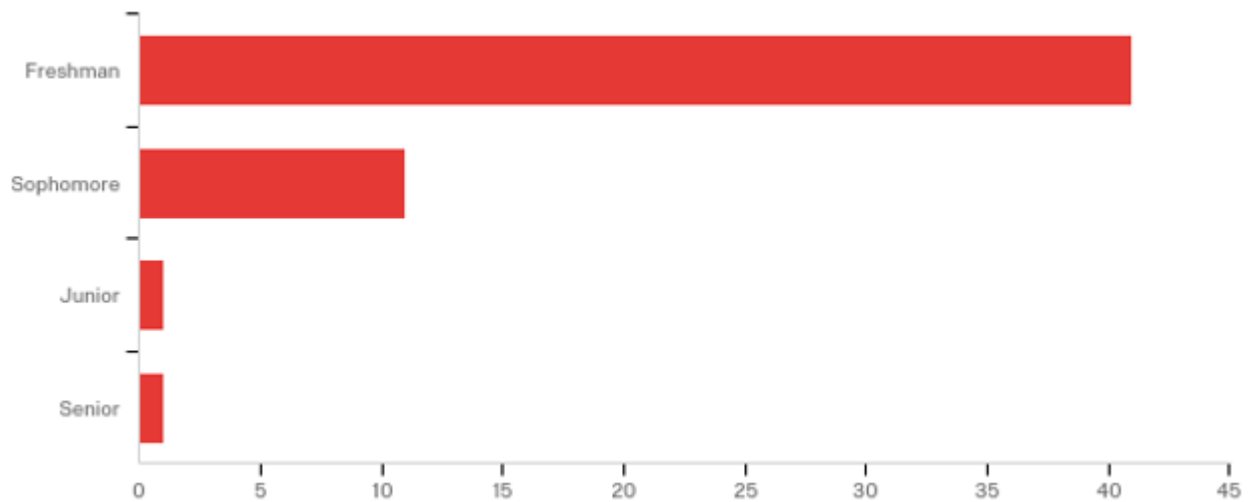
How did you hear about Sorority Formal Recruitment? Please check all that apply.



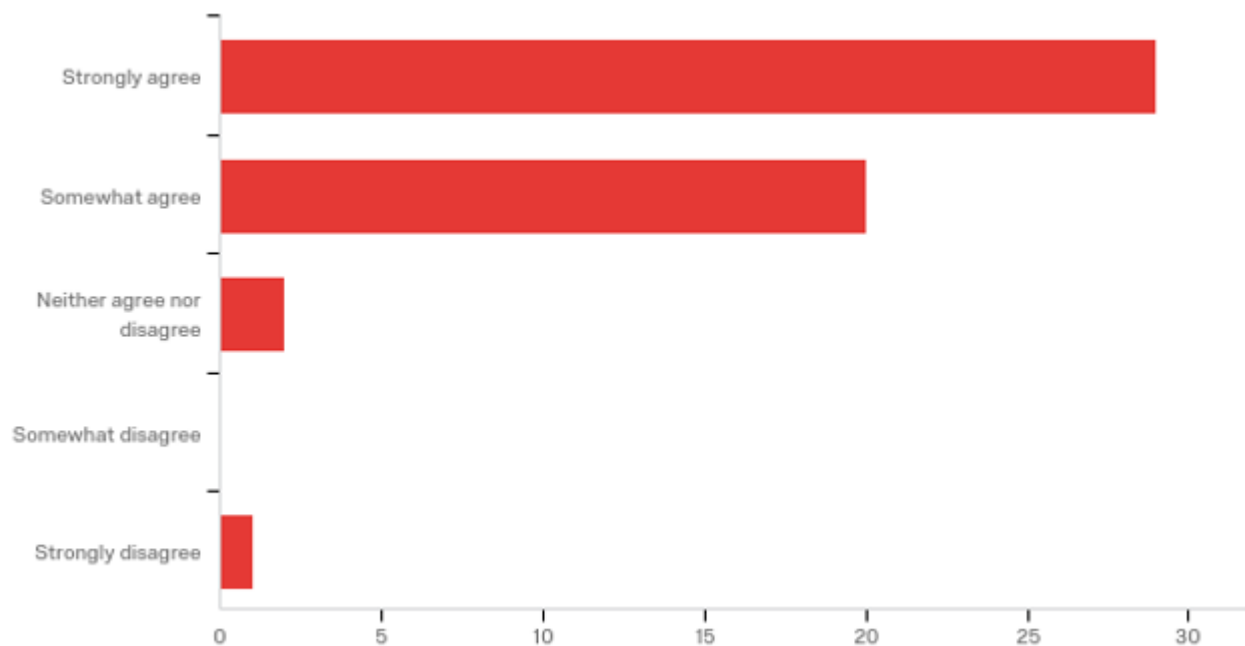
What is your ethnicity/race?



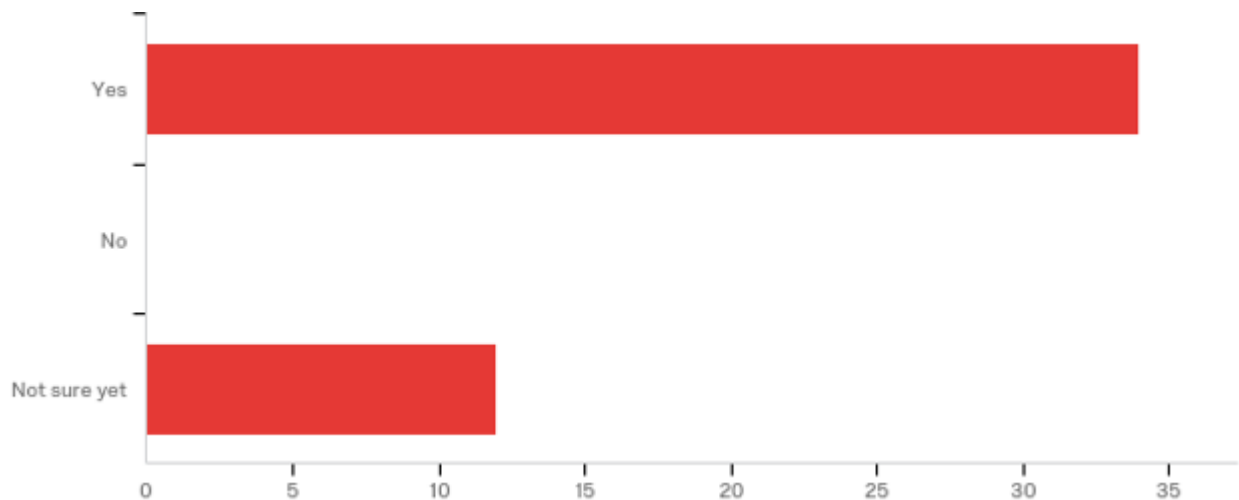
What is your Wichita State University Academic classification?

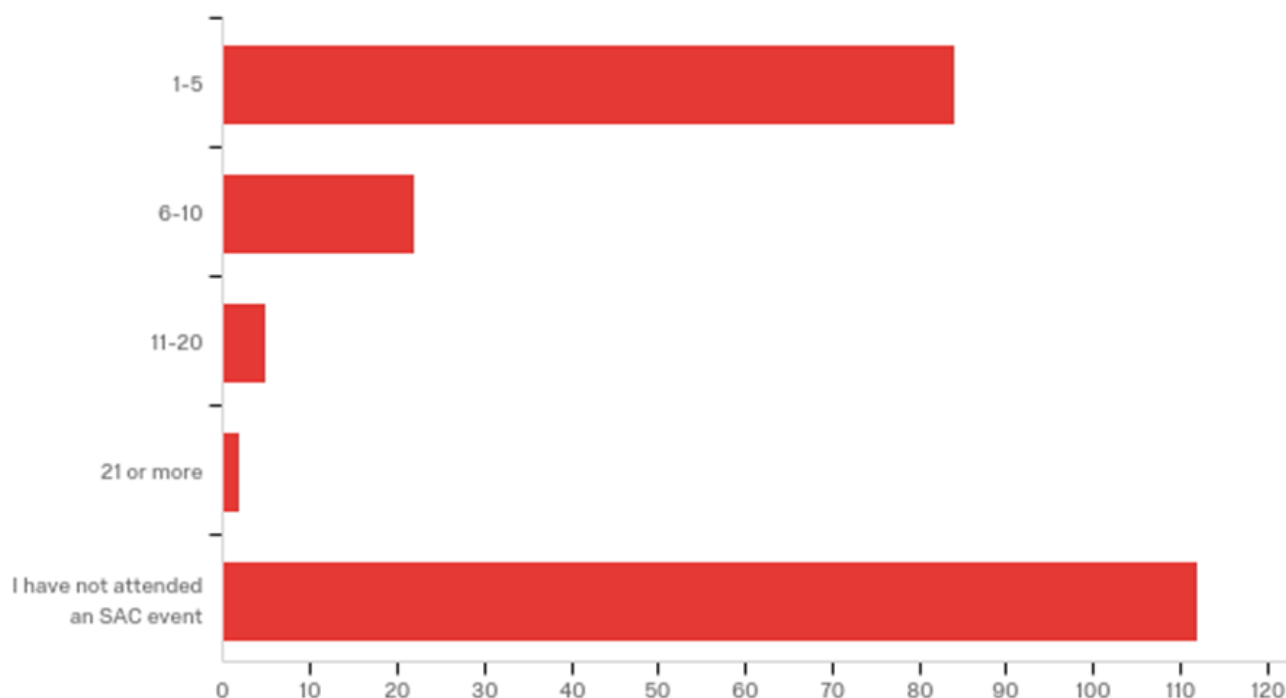

Campus Activities Survey Results per Executive Summary

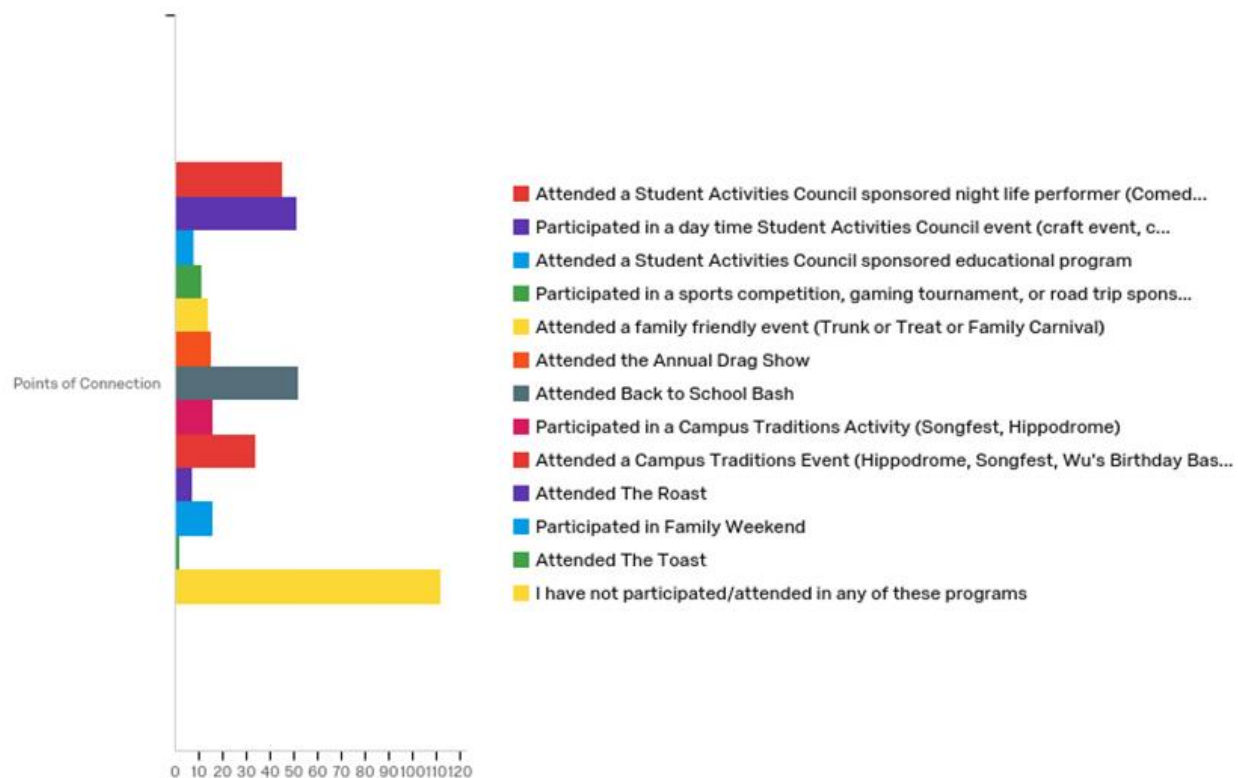
Over the past 12 months, how many Student Involvement events or activities have you attended/participated in?

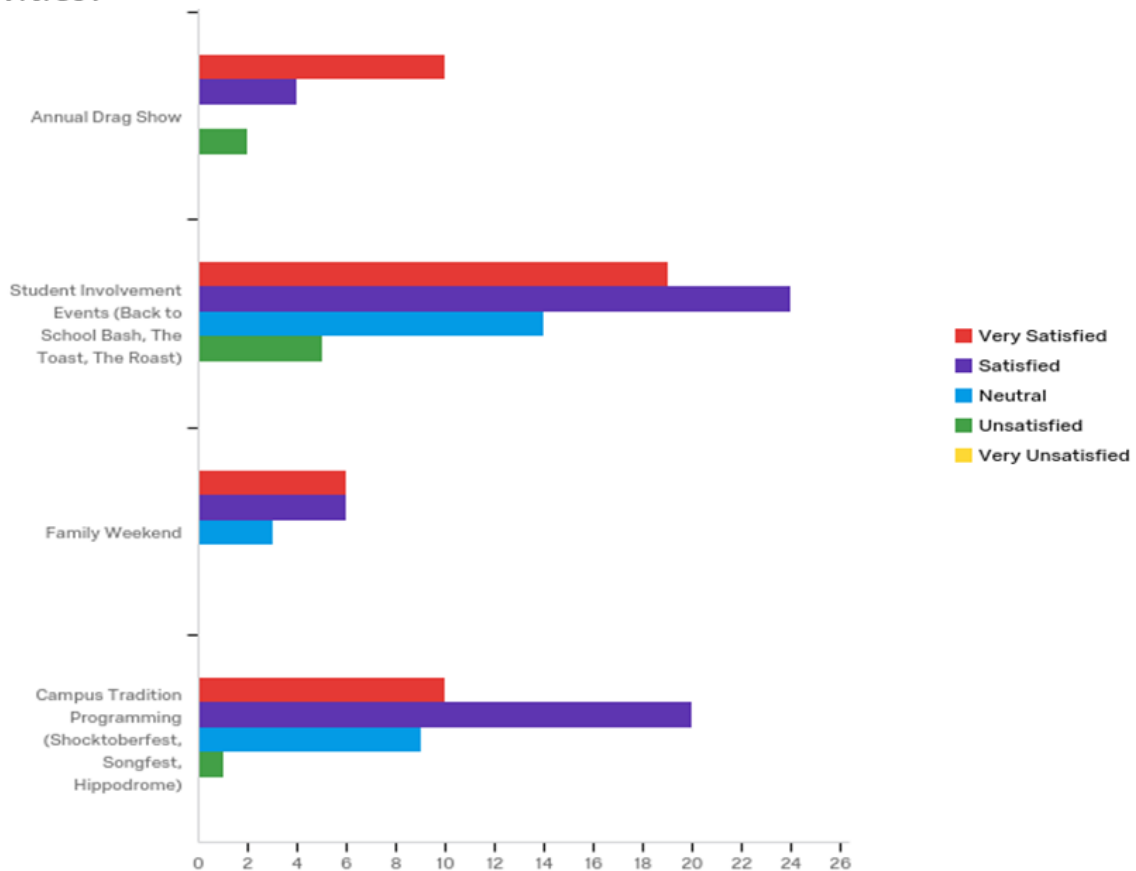

What are the most important variables when deciding to attend an SAC event? (1-Most Important, 10-Least Important)



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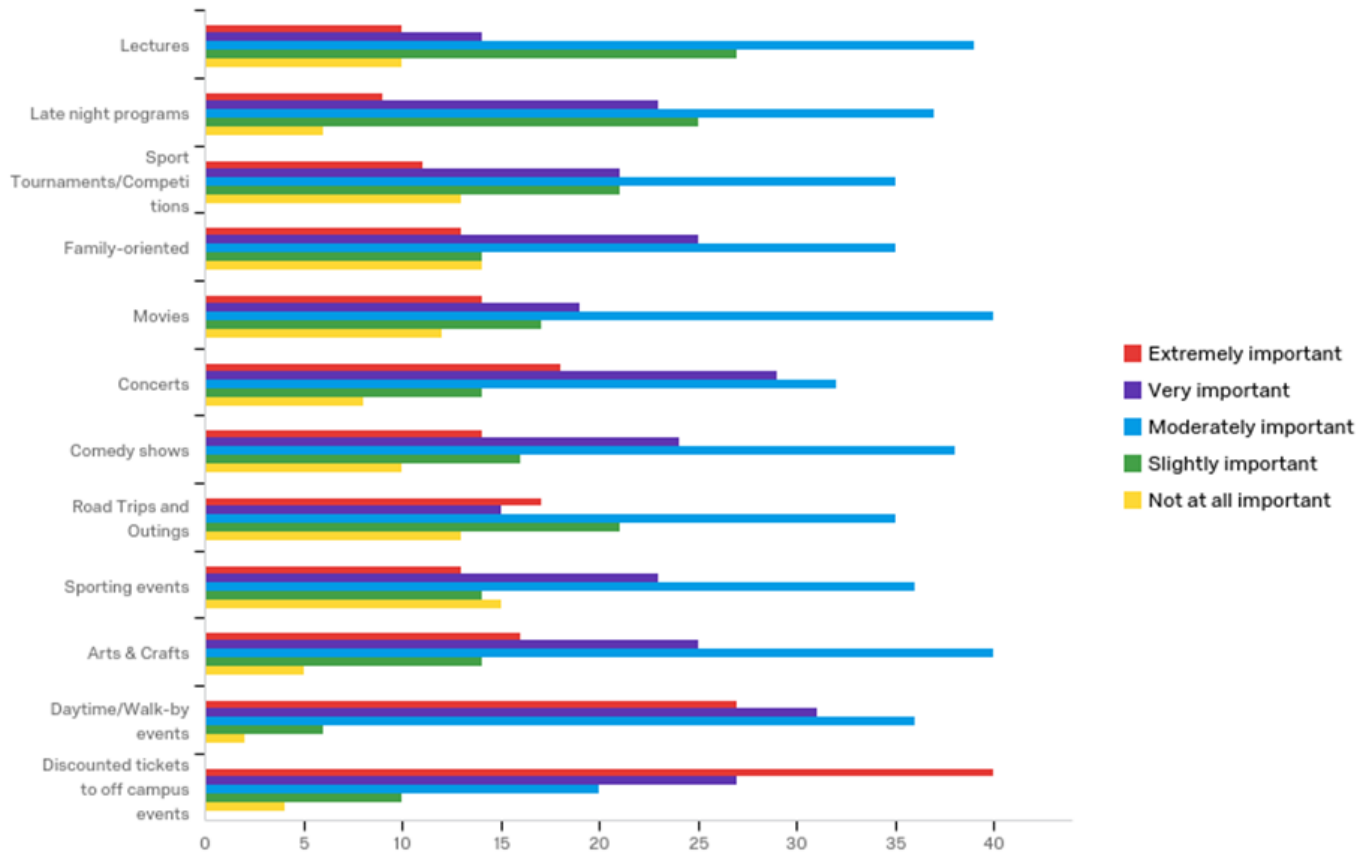

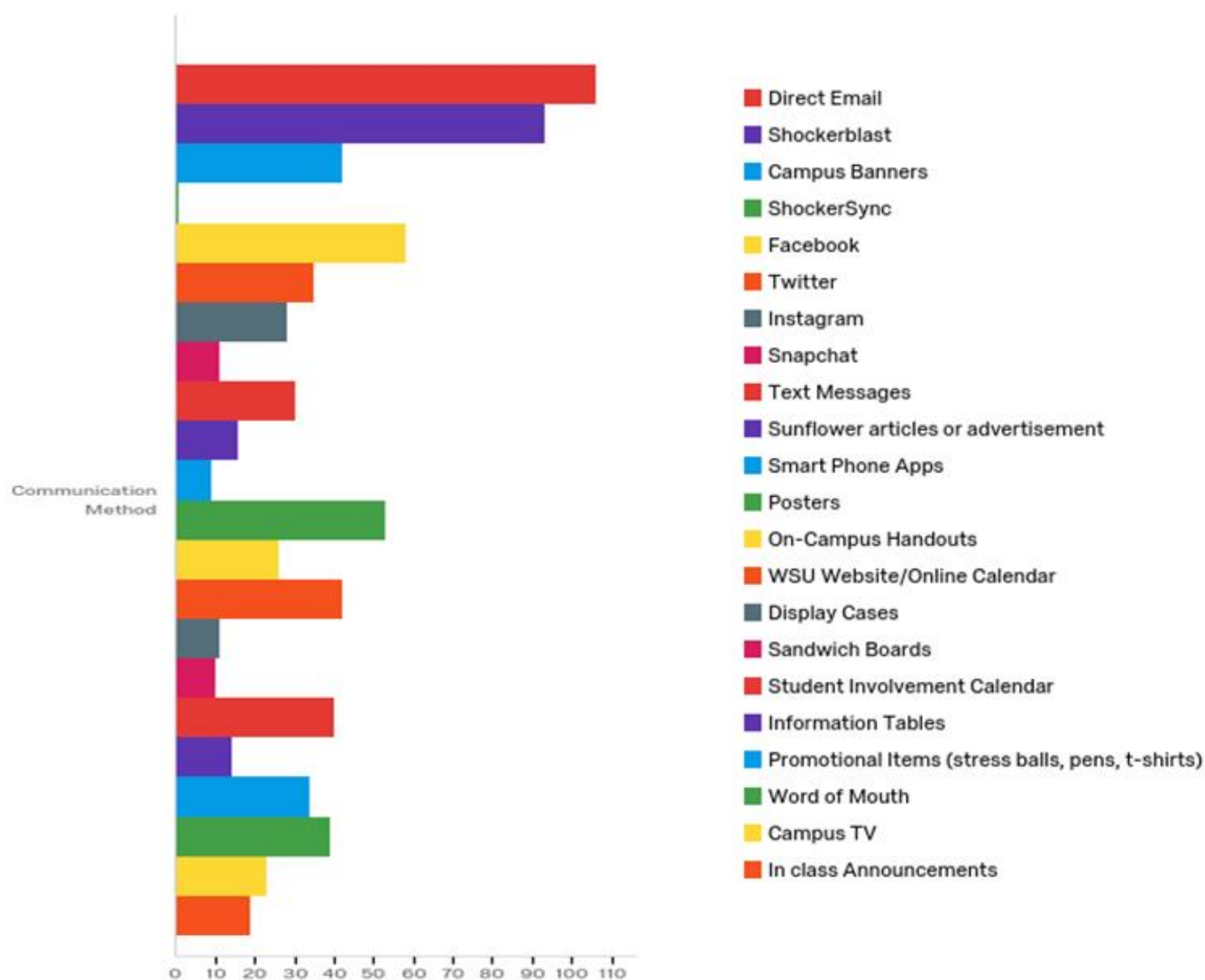

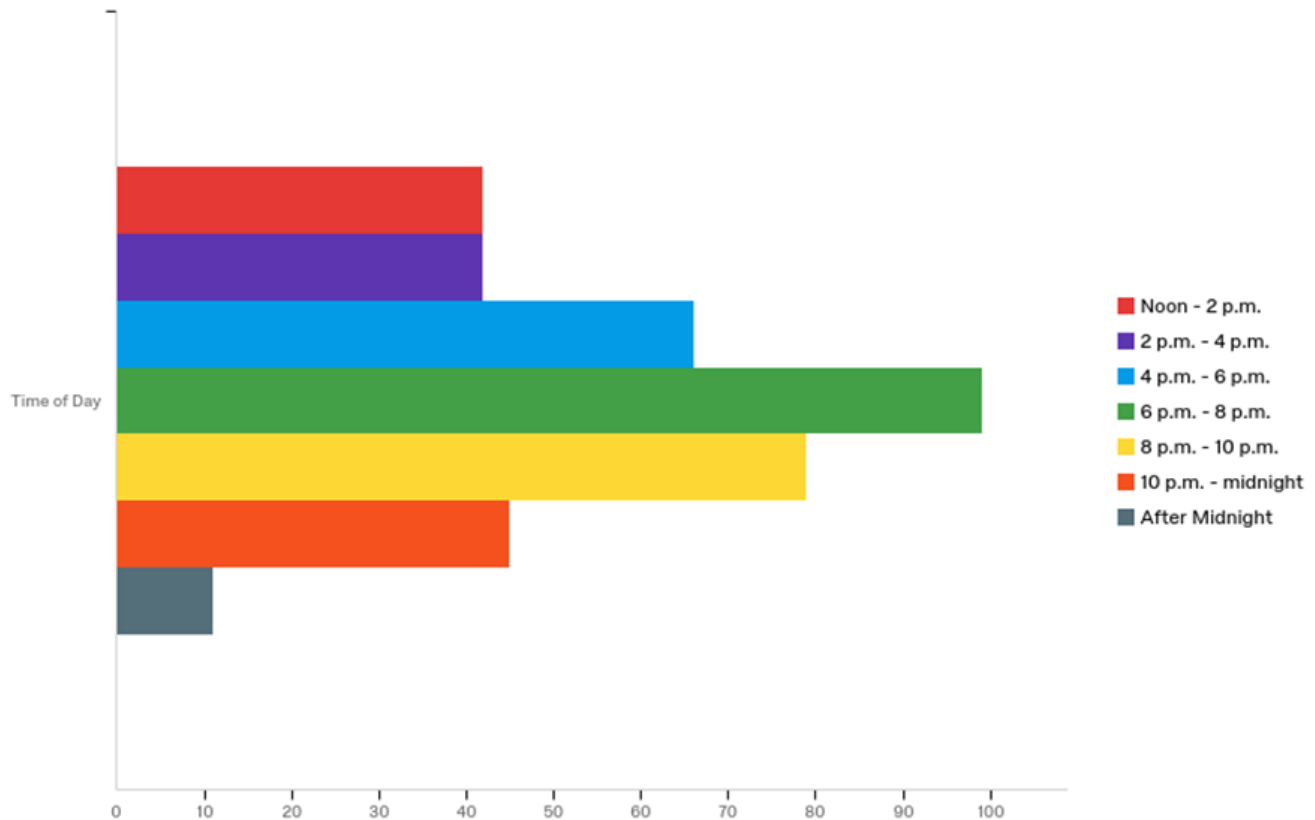

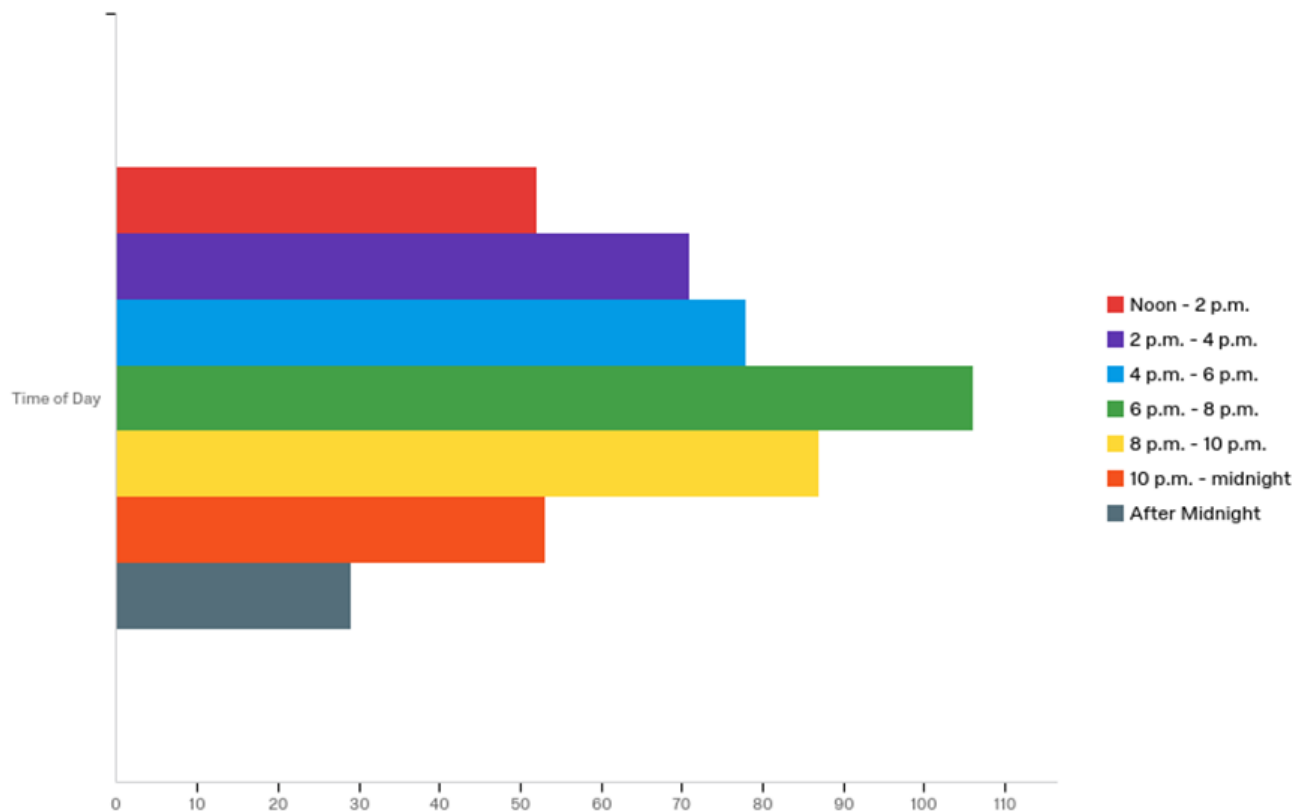

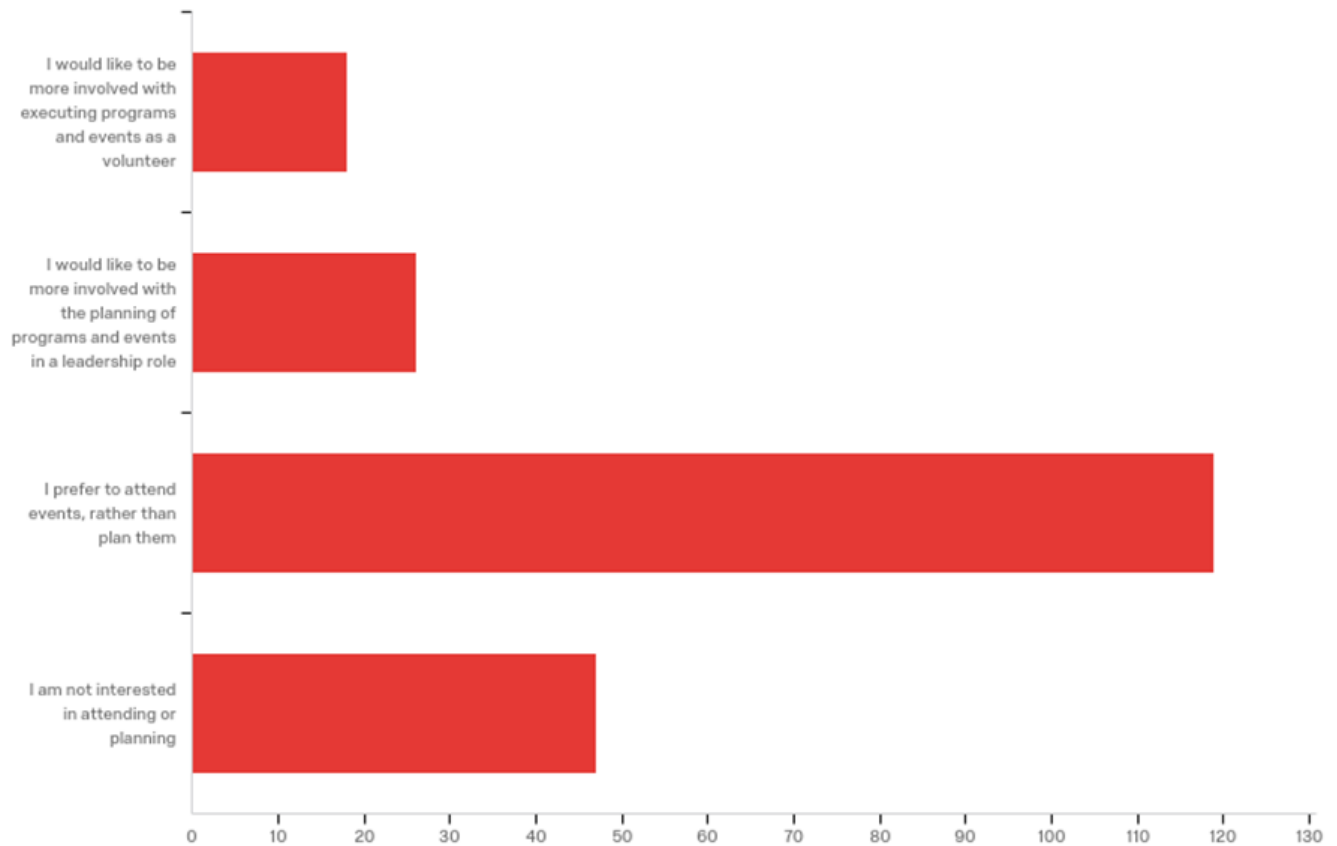

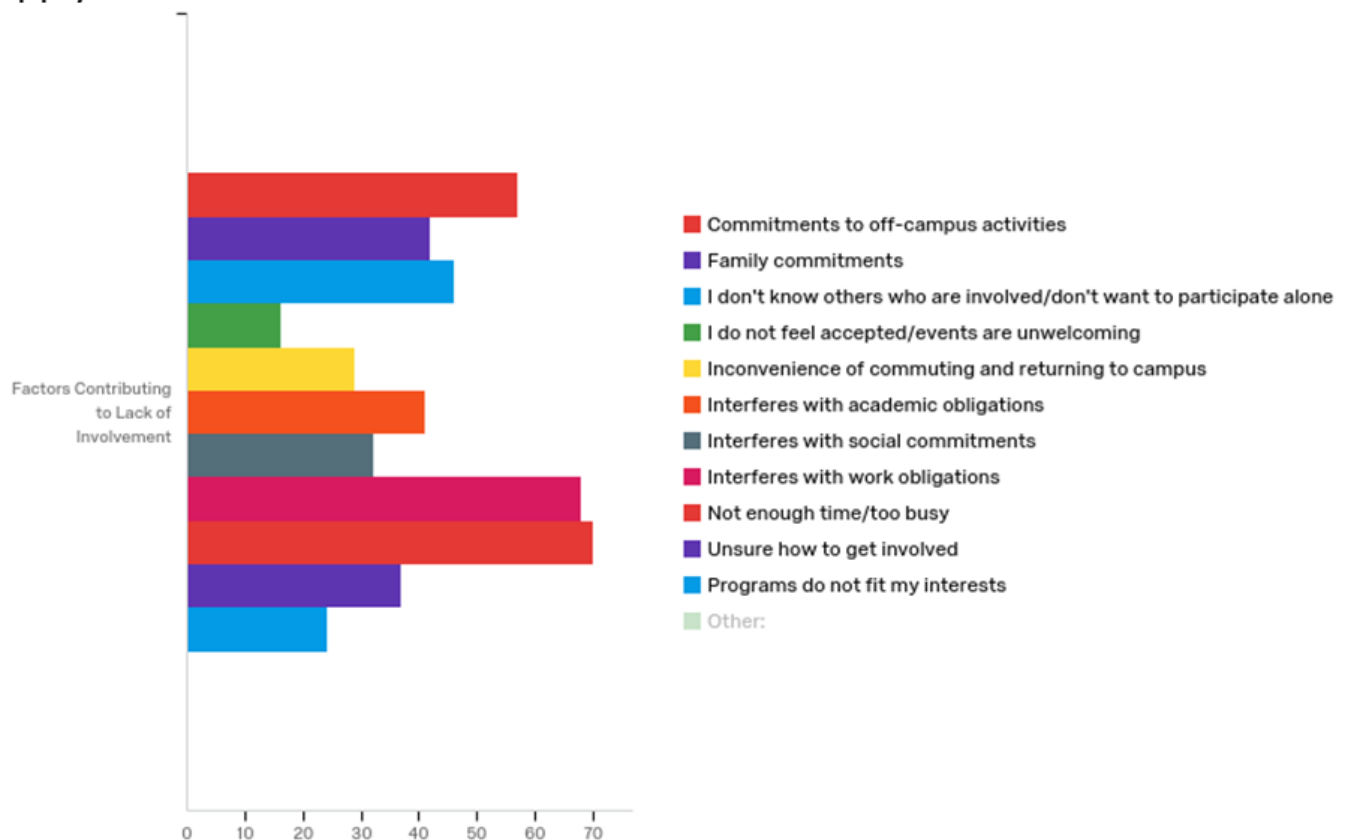
Are you as involved in the planning of Student Activities Council events of Campus Traditions as you would like to be?

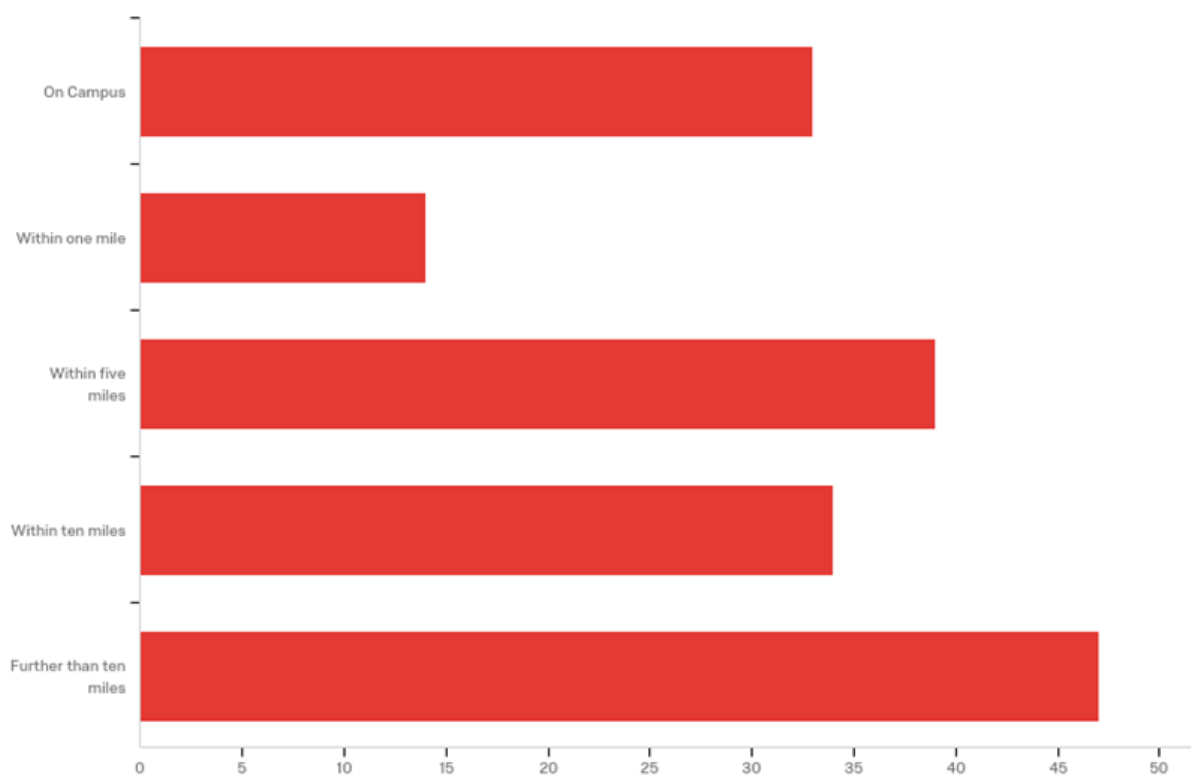
Have you or are you currently serving in the military?

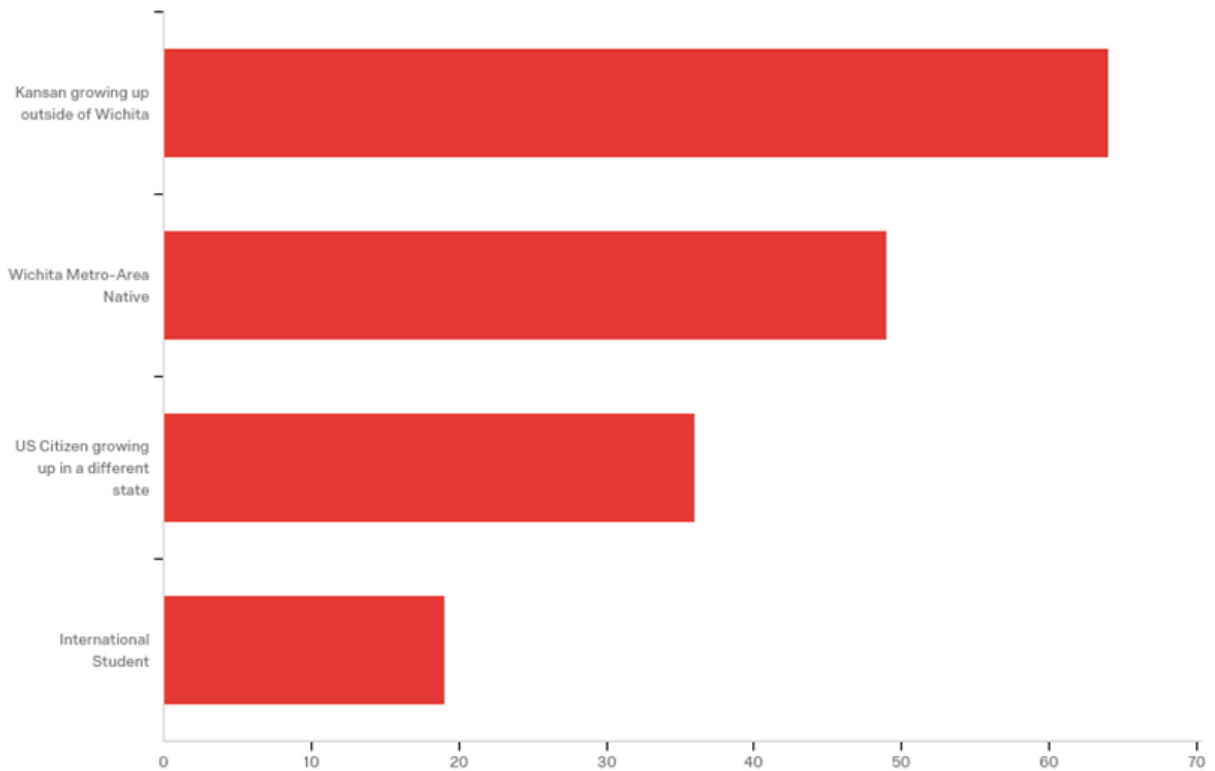
Currently, how far do you live from Wichita State University?

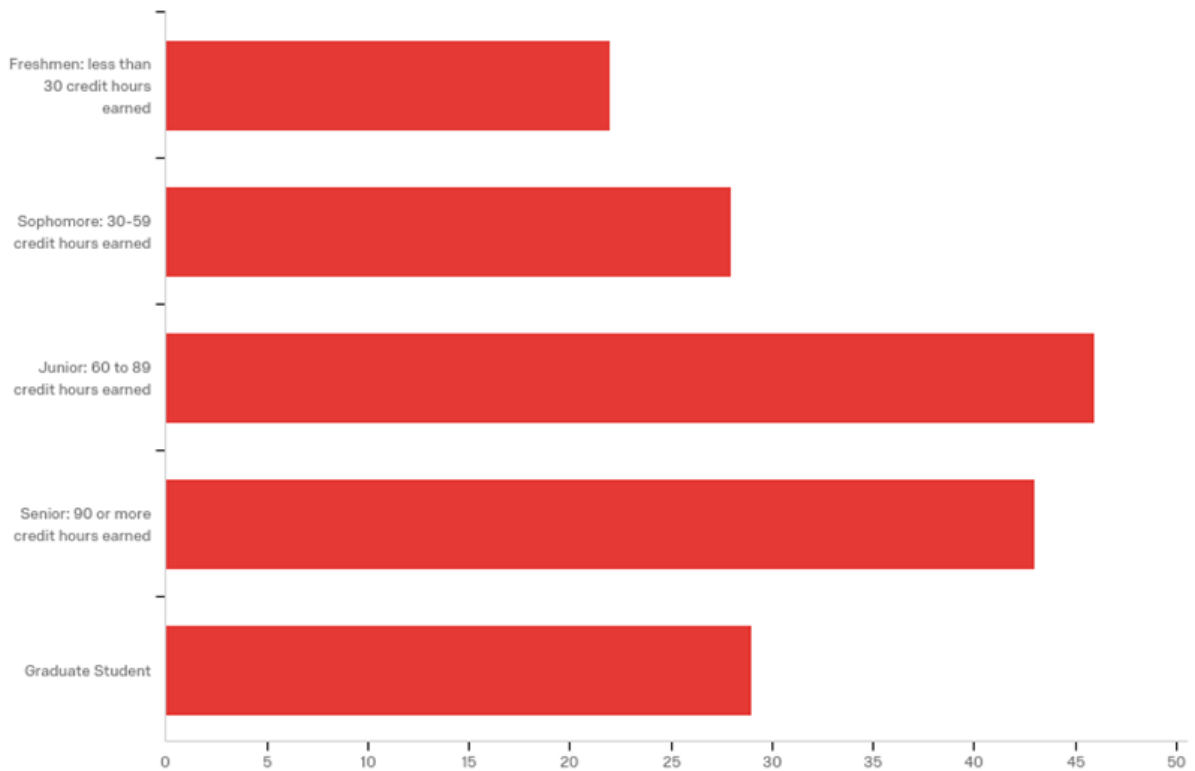

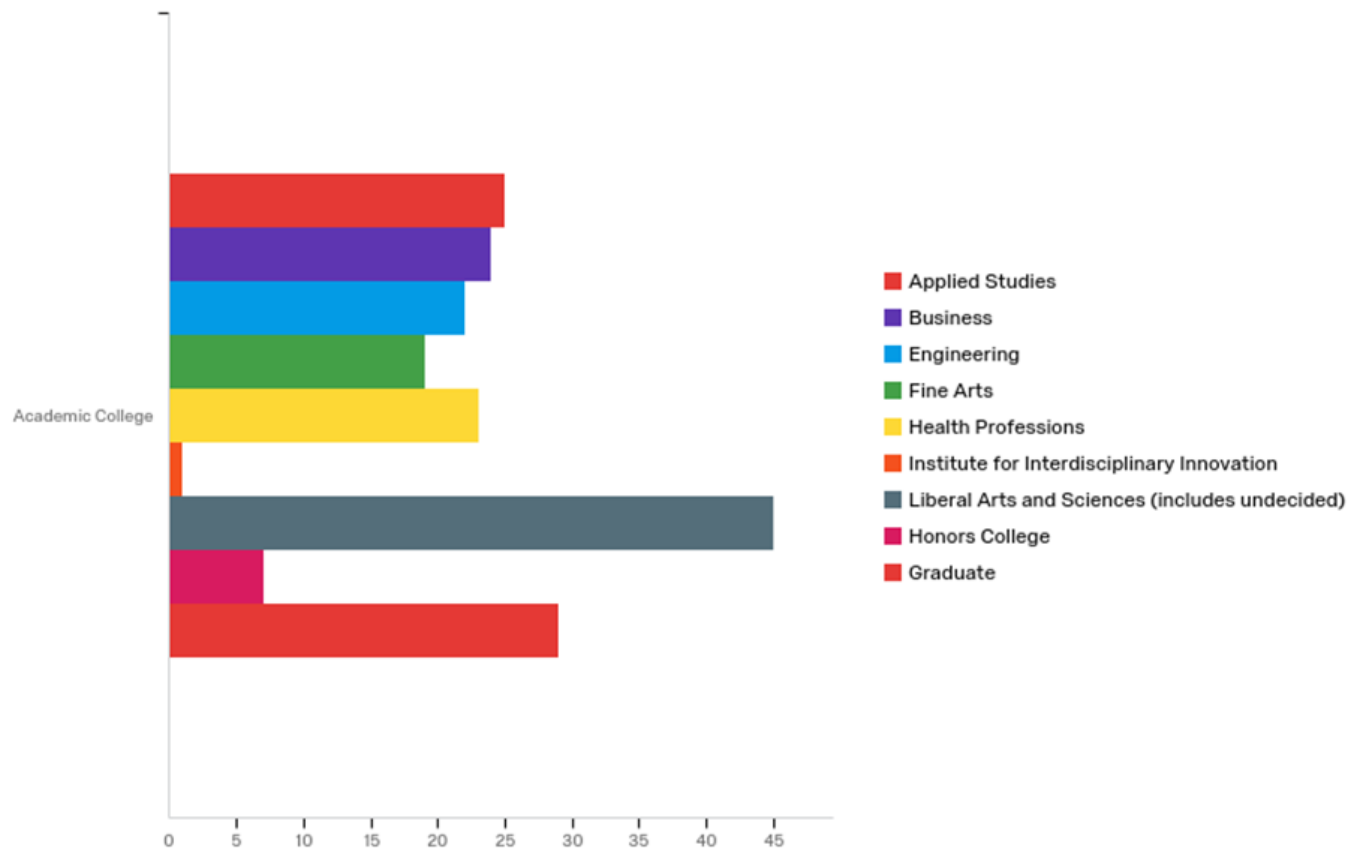

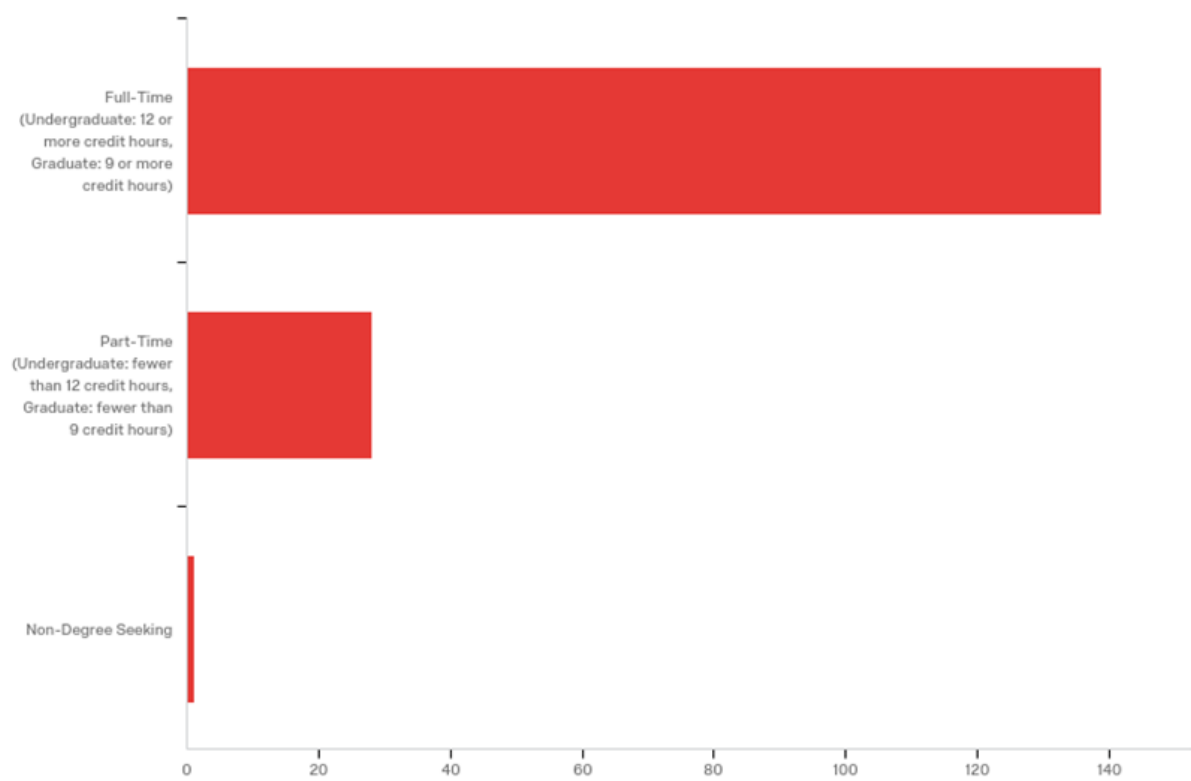
What academic college are you currently enrolled? (please select all that apply)

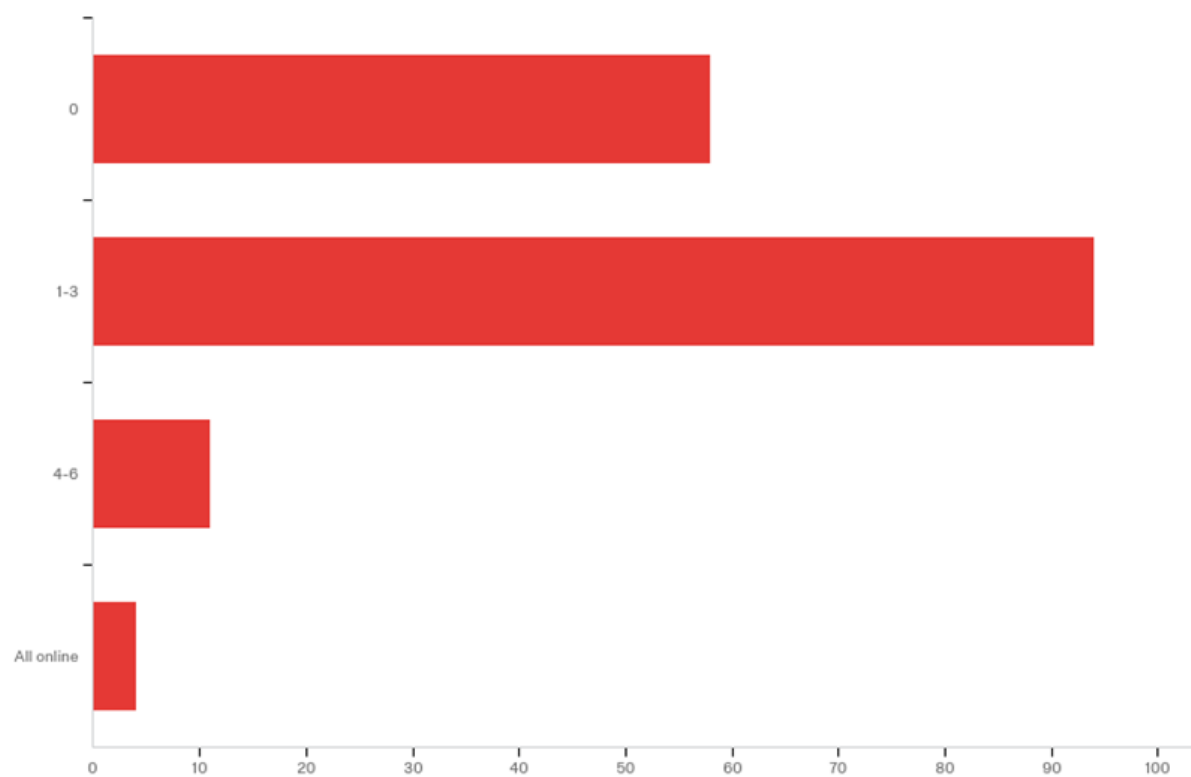

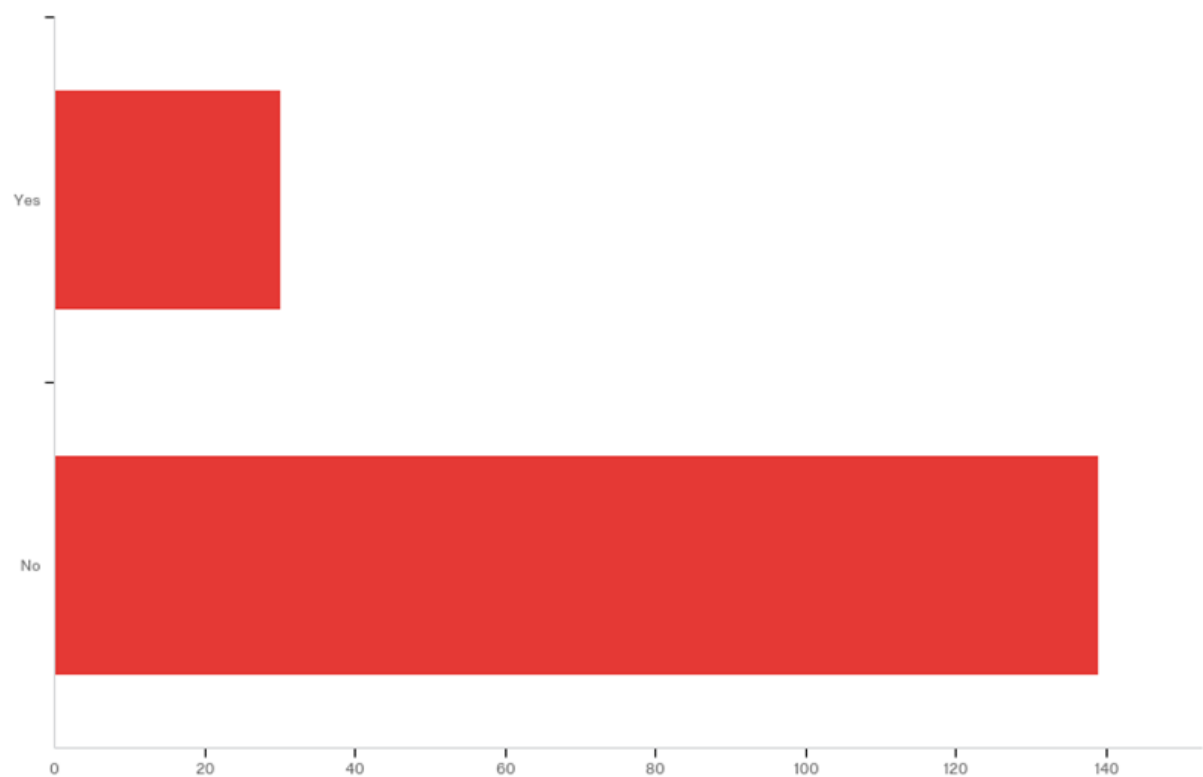
How many online classes do you typically take in a semester?

Do you have children?



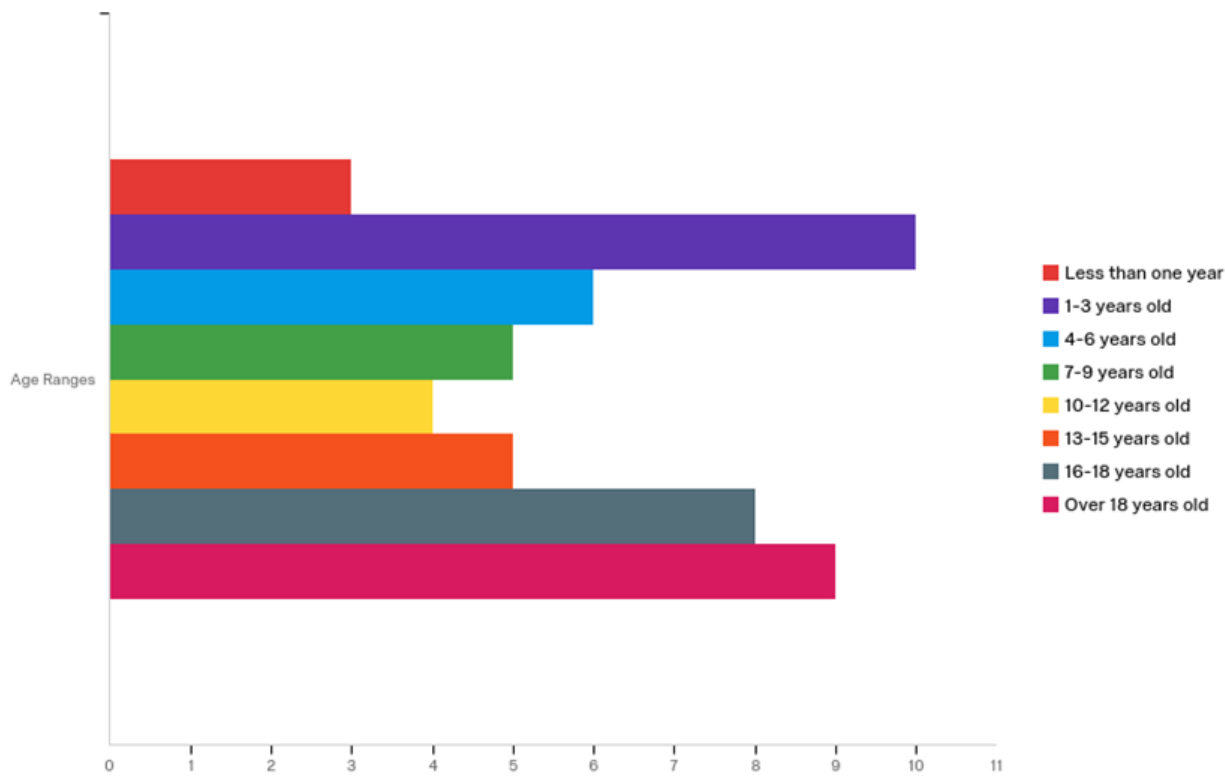

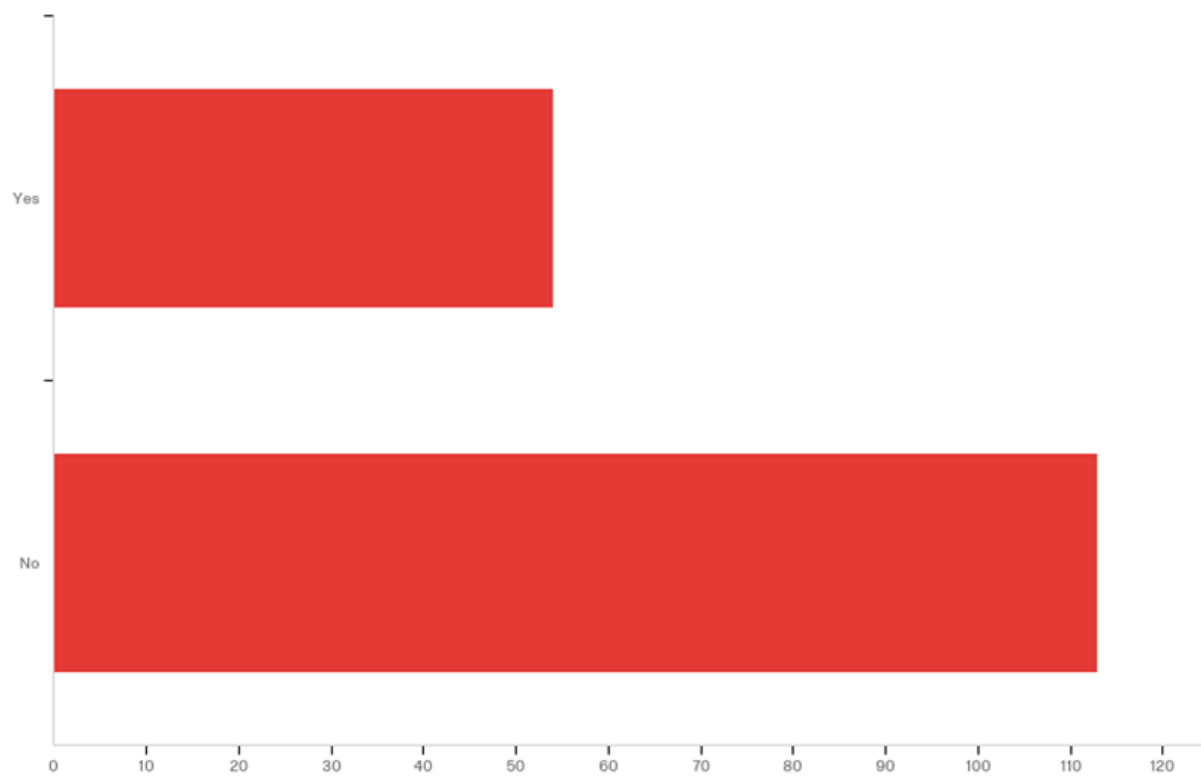
What are their age ranges? (Click all that apply)

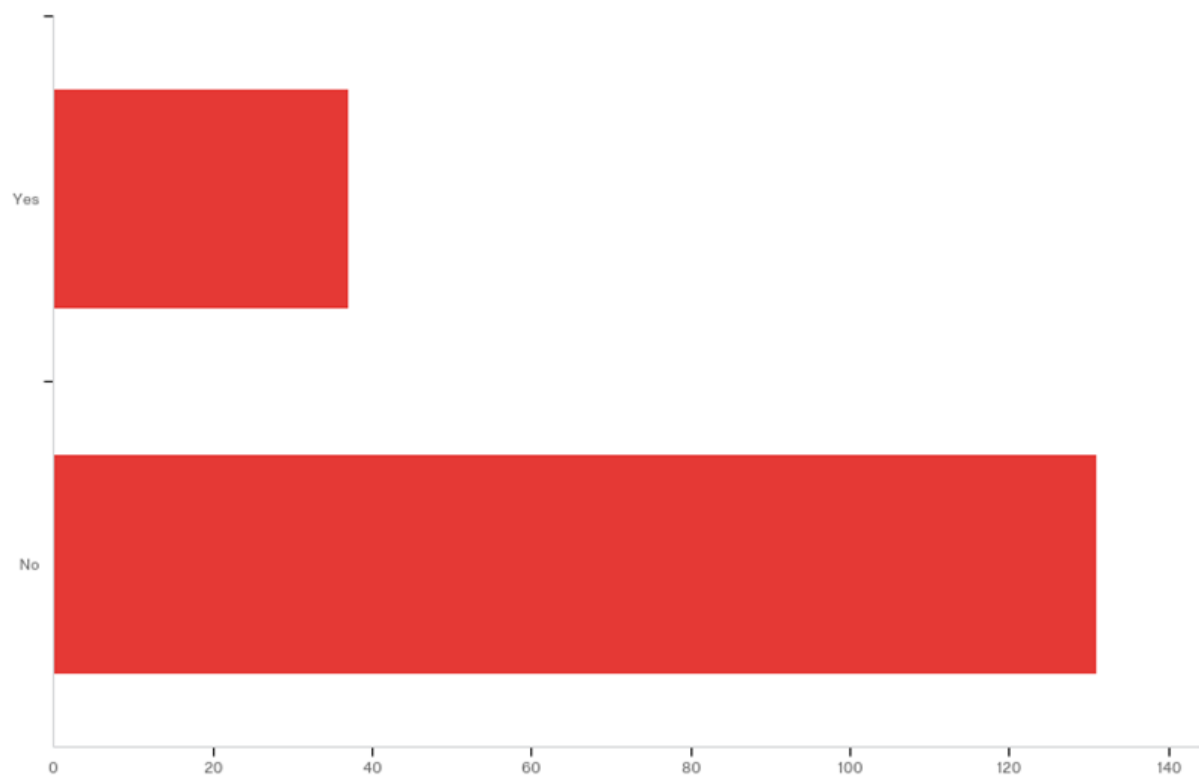
Are you a first generation college student (student whose parent(s) or guardians have not received a four year college degree)

APPENDIX II: POLICIES & PROCEDURES

STUDENT INVOLVEMENT POLICIES & PROCEDURES

Student Involvement Policies and Procedures are general guidelines and instructions set forth. They may be changed, modified, suspended, or canceled, in whole or part, at any time according to the needs of the office. The Student Involvement Office Manager or designee is responsible for oversight of office policies.

Policy 1: Bomb Threat or Suspicious Object Response

A bomb threat or suspicious object response may be warranted for the following:

- Receiving a threatening phone call
- Receiving a suspicious letter or parcel
- Discovering a suspicious object somewhere on the premises
- A suspicious item can be anything which is out of place and cannot be accounted for or any item suspected of being an explosive device
- You may be the one who makes the discovery, or you may be the one to whom it is reported

Bomb threats are delivered in a variety of ways. The majority of threats are called in to the target. Occasionally these calls are through a third party. Sometimes a threat is communicated in writing or by a recording. Two logical explanations for reporting a bomb threat are:

1. The caller has definite knowledge or believes that an explosive or incendiary bomb has been or will be placed and he/she wants to minimize personal injury or property damage. The caller may be the person who placed the device or someone who has become aware of such information;
2. The caller wants to create an atmosphere of anxiety and panic which will, in turn, result in a disruption of the normal activities at the facility where the device is purportedly placed. Whatever the reason for the report, there will certainly be a reaction to it. Through proper planning, the wide variety of potentially uncontrollable reactions can be greatly reduced.

If you receive a bomb threat by telephone:

- Remain calm
- Listen carefully – be polite and show interest
- Try to keep the caller talking so you can gather as much information as possible about the device, the validity of the threat, or the identity of the caller
- Use the [“Explosive Device Data Record” sheet](#) as a guide to question caller and gather as much relevant information as possible. Form is located on the Activities Share Drive:/!Student Involvement/Policies
- If a threat has been received by another individual, get as much information as possible
- Upon completion of the call, immediately notify the University Police Department at 911 (from a campus phone) or 978-3450

In the event you discover a suspicious object:

- Keep anyone from handling it or going near it
- Do not use portable radio or cellular equipment within 100 yards of a suspicious item
- Notify the University Police Department IMMEDIATELY
- Remain calm
- Guide all those in the vicinity to a safe location at least 100 yards away

Policy 2: Computer Usage

Student Involvement computers are to be used primarily for student group related work. Students may use the computers for personal use, but if another student, office assistant or staff member needs to use the computer for Student Involvement related work, this will take precedence.

Student Involvement computers are not to be treated as personal computers. Do not download programs onto Student Involvement computers without permission. Do not save files on the desktop or create folders under My Documents. Documents related to Student Involvement areas should be saved under the appropriate folder on the appropriate network drive. The Activities Share drive (I:) is to be used for documents, information, Excel sheets, etc. pertaining to Student Involvement areas. The Photos Share drive (V:) is to be used for saving quality event photos/serves as an archive for photos over time.

When printing from a Student Involvement computer, students must use the appropriate print code/group name. If printing items that are unrelated to Student Involvement, let the front desk know and they will provide assistance. Black and white copies, for personal use, are \$.05 per page and color copies are \$.15 per page.

Laptops: Laptop usage follows the same guidelines as above in addition to:

1. Laptops must be reserved on the equipment calendar
2. Laptops may not be reserved or kept overnight without prior authorization

Policy 3: Display Cases

The Student Involvement display cases, located on the first floor of the Rhatigan Student Center (RSC), are a service provided by Student Involvement for student groups, organizations and departments of Wichita State University (WSU) to promote their activities and/or recruit membership for their areas. Reservation of these cases is handled in Student Involvement, RSC 216 according to the following guidelines:

Reservations

1. The display cases can be used by any recognized WSU organization or department at no cost.
2. Reservations are made on a first-come, first-served basis.
3. Reservations of either case are limited to a one-week period, beginning and ending on a Friday at 2 p.m.
4. Due to a high demand for use of the cases, each group can only reserve one case during a semester. However, discretion of use and length of use can be determined by the Student Involvement Office Manager.
5. To reserve a display case, the name of the group, a contact name, telephone number, email address and dates needed must be provided.
6. Cancellations should be made at least one week in advance by calling 316-978-3022 or emailing getinvolved@wichita.edu.
7. The display cases are to be used exclusively by WSU organizations and departments. Exceptions require approval by the Student Involvement Office Manager.
8. If a display case is reserved and the group does not call/email to cancel in a timely manner or does not use the display case at the reserved time, the group will forfeit display case privileges for their entire organization for the remainder of the semester.

Set-up/tear down

1. All displays must be put up sometime between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the Friday afternoon before the reserved week. If an exception is needed, this must be discussed in advance with the Student Involvement Office Manager.

2. All displays must be removed between 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on Friday (at the end of the reserved week). If a display is not taken down by this time, Student Involvement reserves the right to remove the display for the next group. Student Involvement cannot assume responsibility for damage or theft while taking down or storing the display items.
3. Keys to the display cases may be checked out by leaving a WSU Shocker Card or valid driver's license with Student Involvement. Keys must be returned immediately after any exhibit is put up or taken down. *Keys cannot be checked out overnight.*

Guidelines

1. The cases do not come with accessories. Groups must provide their own display materials and accessories.
2. Nails, screws, or any material causing permanent marring of the display cases are not to be used. Peel-off stickers are not to be applied to any part of the case. No materials should be placed on the outside of the cases.
3. Usable Internal dimensions of the cases are...
 - a. 43" high x 95" wide x 14" deep across from Groover Lounge.
 - b. 43" high x 95" wide x 14" deep across from Shocker Store.

Display Materials Policies

1. The display cases cannot be used to promote, advertise or otherwise advocate an illegal activity or violation of any WSU policy.
2. All materials in the case must be written in and/or have a translated copy displayed in the English language.
3. Any group using the display case must identify the display as being sponsored by their organization/department and include a telephone number, email and website for further information.
4. If a group violates one or more of these policies, Student Involvement will notify the group to rectify the situation immediately. In the event a member of the sponsoring group cannot be reached, Student Involvement reserves the right to take down the display and will notify the group of the action taken. Student Involvement reserves the right to deny future use of the display cases to any group who has previously violated policies.

Damages/Liability

1. Wichita State University, the Rhatigan Student Center and Student Involvement are not liable for damages to items in the display cases.
2. Any damages to the display cases done by a group using the cases will be charged to the organization or department.

Policy 4: Dress Code

The personal appearance of every staff member is an important component of maintaining a student-centered learning environment. In order to achieve the total educational process an appropriate dress code which promotes a positive image of the university must always be presented. Staff are expected to dress business casual Monday-Thursday and may wear casual dress on Fridays, unless their schedule dictates otherwise. Student staff are not expected to dress business casual but must also follow the standards set in the table below. While at events, student councils governed by Student Involvement are also expected to maintain appropriate dress, which will be dictated by the staff member that advises the group.

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Accommodations: If the above policy causes religious concerns or concerns based upon any other legally protected class, an employee should contact their supervisor to discuss an appropriate accommodation. If a student or staff member has any questions on the policy or exceptions to this policy, they should speak with their direct supervisor.

Policy 5: Equipment Use

Student Involvement has equipment available for checkout to WSU campus organizations, clubs and departments on a first-come, first-served basis. Equipment is for use mainly on the Wichita State main campus. * Reservations must be made ***at least six business days in advance of the event*** by completing the Equipment Use Form. * Equipment requests are considered on a timely basis and must be signed before getting approval. Once a decision is made, Student Involvement will contact the group by phone or email.

Precedence for equipment use is given as follows:

- Tier 1: Student Involvement staff and student groups directly advised by Student Involvement
- Tier 2: Recognized Student Organizations
- Tier 3: Campus Departments

Tier 1 groups can utilize any equipment available in Student Involvement. Tiers 2 & 3 may only use equipment listed on the approved equipment loan list.

Advanced reservations will be taken no more than one semester in advance. Any special requests will be considered on a case by case basis according to the availability of the equipment. Equipment used after normal office hours should be returned to the Student Involvement office by contacting an RSC Building Manager at (316) 978-3028. Overnight check-out of SOME equipment is allowed, but the student organization advisor or a full-time departmental staff member must check out the equipment. Damage to the equipment during use due to negligence will be the responsibility of the reserving party, who will be billed for the cost of repair or replacement, and will also result in forfeiture of equipment use for a full semester's time.

Equipment not returned on time will be charged a fee of \$5.00 per hour for the first three hours. After three hours, a charge of \$40.00 will incur. If the equipment is not returned within 24 hours of the original return time, the responsible party will be charged the cost of the equipment.

If the responsible party fails to pay any incurred fees or fines within 30 days, the debt will be transferred to the individual checking out the equipment.

Equipment not returned on time, not picked up as requested or returned damaged will result in forfeiture of equipment use for a full semester's time.

The following equipment is available for checkout; this does not include all items. For a complete list, please contact Student Involvement:

- For use only on RSC property: large sound system, spotlight

- For use only on Wichita State main campus: small sound system, microphone, mic equipment, electrical cord, power strip, laptop, projector, two-way radios, projection screen, sporting equipment

Student Involvement reserves the right to approve or reject any request.

*Some equipment can be loaned for off-campus use or with a shortened timeline at the discretion of the Office Manager and with approval from organization advisors or department heads.

Policy 6: Fire Procedure

In the event of a fire emergency, all building occupants should evacuate the building by using the stairway, **NEVER AN ELEVATOR**, and follow the emergency exit signs to the stairs. Occupants must evacuate **into the wind at least 200 yards** for fire emergencies and hazardous materials release emergencies. SI staff and students should note that there are two exits from RSC 216, the fire exit should only be used if deemed safe and exits to the south of the RSC, lot 7.

The Rhatigan Student Center has Emergency Building Coordinators who have been trained to handle such emergencies. Emergency Building Coordinators will be identified by a yellow vest. These coordinators are responsible to ensure that all building occupants move to an appropriate fire exit and that no occupants use an elevator. A search of the RSC/CAC Theater will be made to assist visitors and persons with disabilities to an area of safety. If it is not possible to assist persons with disabilities to an area of rescue, the coordinator will request the assistance of the fire department on an evacuation plan.

NOTE: The University has stair tracks equipment to assist persons with disabilities to go up or down stairs. This equipment is stored in Devlin Hall and Wiedemann Hall. **The use of this equipment will be coordinated with the fire department.**

Student Involvement

If you are in the Student Involvement office or at a Student Involvement sponsored event within the Rhatigan Student Center when a fire alarm sounds, calmly proceed to the nearest exit and leave the building. Do not concern yourself with cleaning up the event or office, securing items, or locking doors; just proceed to the exit. The meeting location for Student Involvement is the **south side of the RSC parking lot**. Please meet up at this location so we can assess the situation.

If caught in a building filled with smoke, individuals should drop on hands and knees and crawl to the nearest exit. Test all closed doors before opening them by feeling the back of the door. If it is hot, do not open it. Turn and go to the second route of exit. If the door is not hot, open slowly but be prepared to close it again if there are flames.

If you are blocked in a room, attempt to cover the bottom of the door with clothing or non-flammable materials in order to keep the smoke out. If possible, signal for help by calling or going to a window (window should remain closed unless instructed differently by emergency personnel).

Policy 7: Hazardous Materials

Chemical Spill or Hazardous Material Release

If you are in the direct area of a significant chemical spill or hazardous material release, call the University Police Department immediately. Lead yourself and others away from the site of the hazard to a safe location. If evacuation is necessary or an alert from the university has been issued, please calmly exit the building and

move at least 100 yards into the wind. Do not leave the area until you have been cleared to do so by the proper authorities. If toxic hazardous material comes in contact with skin, immediately flush the affected area with water.

Explosion Response

In the event of an explosion, keep away from windows, mirrors, overhead fixtures bookcases and electrical equipment. If an evacuation is required, lead yourself and others away from the explosion. Do not move seriously injured persons unless they are in obvious immediate danger (of fire, building collapse, etc.). Upon exiting the building, open doors carefully and move at least 100 yards from the exit.

Policy 8: Inclement Weather

If the University closes due to inclement weather, full-time unclassified and University Support employees should refer to University Policy 20.03.

In the event that all University operations have been shut down, the following procedures will apply:

Student Involvement Related Events

- All University sponsored events must be cancelled or postponed. Staff members should contact any contracted or hired professionals associated with the events or programs scheduled.
- Best efforts should be made to notify the public of any event cancellations or postponements. This should be done by:
 - Website Update
 - Social Media Updates
 - Email (where applicable)
 - Standard phone message

Student Sponsored Events

- All programs and events taking place on campus must be cancelled or postponed. Due to the University closing, students will no longer have access to venues and services. Group members should contact any contracted or hired professionals associated with the events or programs scheduled.
- Off-campus programs must be approved by the RSO advisor to take place. Best efforts should be made to notify the public of event status.

Policy 9: Medical Emergency

In the event of a medical emergency, the procedure will be:

1. The person who becomes aware of a medical emergency must first contact **Campus Police (316-978-3450)**. Campus Police must initially be notified so they can dispatch trained personnel to the venue immediately, and so they can provide immediate assistance to off campus emergency personnel in directing them to the correct building location.
2. If the incident take place in the RSC please notify the RSC Director's Office or Event Services immediately after calling the Campus Police.
3. If the event is happening at an off-campus location, 911 should be called.

Student Involvement Supplement

There should be a first aid kit at all events. First aid kits are in the office mailroom.

There is a blood borne pathogen kit located in the mailroom. This is only to be used by trained professionals.

- **Minor Injuries:** First aid kits are used to supply individuals with products for handling minor injuries such as small cuts, scrapes and bruises. Never give out medicine.
- **Major Injuries:** If the person is lucid, ask them if they want help first. If they want help or are unresponsive, call Campus Police immediately by dialing 316-978-3450. They will notify the appropriate authorities. Call Event Services (316-978-3475) or RSC Building Managers (316-978-3028) if the event is taking place in the RSC. Keep the area around the injured person clear. Do not make contact with any bodily fluids. Do not leave the injured person alone.
- The staff member on site should inform their supervisor and Director, Student Involvement of the situation as soon as possible and then document the incident within a business day under the incident report on the shared drive. The Director, Student Involvement will contact any additional appropriate individuals.
- Within one day, an incident report should be filled out and shared with the individual's supervisor and the Director.

In the event of a severe medical emergency, do not administer first aid. If you administer first aid, you may be held liable.

Policy 10: Office Access

Staff Access

All full-time Student Involvement staff will be issued a master office key. The office key provides access to all Student Involvement offices, storage closets, workroom and Cadman Art Gallery. Full-time Student Involvement staff will also have access to the Rhatigan Student Center beyond regular operating hours. Access may be gained through use of the Shocker Card and an access code provided by RSC Administration.

Student Employee and Graduate Assistant Access

Student Assistants employed to work the front desk of Student Involvement and Graduate Assistants employed within Student Involvement will be issued an office key to be used only in accordance with their scheduled work hours on a case by case basis. This key will provide them access to offices, storage closets, workroom and Cadman Art Gallery.

Other students employed by Student Involvement will be issued keys to access Student Involvement if deemed necessary by their immediate supervisor.

Student Volunteers

Students who hold a position on one of the executive councils or who serve as an SI Ambassador will have access to the Student Involvement office after hours and during RSC operating hours. If no full-time staff are in the office, these students can gain admittance to the office by contacting the RSC Building Managers. Students in the office after regular office hours are responsible for the security of the space and for any other students they allow into the office. Any other student may be in the Student Involvement office anytime during the regularly scheduled office hours.

Policy 11: Office Supplies

Staff Usage

Office supplies are available for staff use on a regular basis. If a staff member's office is unequipped with certain items, items should be ordered by the Office Manager. Supplies that are requested for events or projects should also be requested by the Office Manager but should be made available for all staff use if any

items are leftover. Supplies specifically purchased for reoccurring programs should be appropriately stored and labeled with the contents of the container. Office supplies should not be used for personal use.

Student Workroom

A general resource room is equipped with office supply items/project materials and is available for student use. Items should be used for Student Involvement/RSO project-related tasks and should not be removed from the office. Consumable office supplies are meant for SI advised student groups. Office supplies will be refreshed on a semesterly basis. Requests can be made to the office staff for items not available in the community supply area.

Recognized Student Organization Usage

Please refer to RSO Handbook for benefits of office supplies

Policy 12: Opening and Closing Procedures

Student Involvement

When opening the Student Involvement office, the following procedures should be followed:

1. Turn on the front desk computer.
2. Unlock front desk cabinets.
3. Unlock copier room door.
4. Unlock mail room door.
5. Turn on lounge computers and television.
6. Turn on Suite 2 computers
7. Take front desk phone off "Send All Calls" & check messages.
8. Check GetInvolved e-mail and Calendars (including staff).
9. Check the Work Request folder.
10. Turn on the Fish Tank light and feed the fish.
11. If the front door is unlocked and/or open when you arrive, notify the Office Manager immediately.

When closing the Student Involvement office, the following procedures should be followed:

1. Make sure that the front desk, office and copy areas are neat and well-kept.
2. Turn phone to "Send All Calls."
3. Shut down computer.
4. Lock front desk cabinets.
5. Shut the copier room door.
6. Turn off the lounge computers, Suite 2 computers and television.
7. Make sure light(s) and fan are turned off at the front desk.
8. If someone is in the office, let them know you're leaving and are locking the door. SAC, CSB, SI Ambassadors and Greek Council exec members can be left in the office. Other students should be asked to leave unless they are working directly with the exec members.
9. Lock the front door.

Cadman Art Gallery

When opening the Cadman Art Gallery, the following procedures should be followed:

1. Do a walk-through of 'The Looking Glass' and check all art work and labels to make sure none or damaged or falling apart.
2. Complete a check of inventory supplies and return any items to their specific location.
3. Open main entry all the way

4. Make sure gallery is clean and tidy.
5. Check lighting and fix any broken lights or inconsistent lights.
6. Check all art work and labels in the main gallery to make sure none are damaged or falling.
7. Make sure comment book is set up properly and has a working writing utensil.

When closing the Cadman Art Gallery, the following procedures should be followed:

1. Make sure gallery clean and tidy.
2. Make sure attendant desk and counter top organized.
3. Check all art work and labels to make sure none are damaged or falling.
4. Display “CLOSED” sign.
5. Close and lock glass door.

Policy 13: Posting

Student Involvement will accept materials from WSU departments, student groups and Recognized Student Organizations.

- Acceptable forms of publicity and promotion include:
 - Event-specific publicity
 - Department or organization calendars
 - Recruitment posters
 - Student related hand-outs, such as health and well-being information
- Length of display time
 - 2-3 weeks in advance of event/deadline
- Approval process for student group materials
 - Publicity and promotion related to events to be posted, must contain the following:
 - Event Title
 - Event Date
 - Event Time
 - Event Location
 - Contact information
 - Sponsoring Organization
 - Attendance cost (if applicable)
 - Rain location (if applicable)
 - Entry deadline (if applicable)
 - Submitted materials will be approved only by full-time Student Involvement staff
 - Student Involvement staff reserve the right to not display submitted materials
- Promotional items and non-poster publicity must contain or display the following:
 - Sponsoring organization
 - Contact information
- Designated posting areas for Student Involvement
 - Marketing Materials should be submitted electronically to Media Services.

Policy 14: Leave

For all types of leave, Student Involvement staff members should refer to University Policies. For unclassified staff, refer to WSU Policies and Procedures Manual, Section 6.08 and for University Support staff, refer to WSU Policies and Procedures Manual, Section 7.08.

Student Involvement

- Requests of any type of leave must be in writing in advance using the WSU Leave and Overtime Request Form. Employees must receive approval from their supervisor before leave can be taken.
- Employees should request all leave types as early as possible from their supervisor, but no more than three months prior to the date requested for leave. If special circumstances warrant (e.g., travel plans, medical procedures), employees can request vacation/sick leave from their supervisor sooner than three months out. When in doubt on the appropriateness of the request, the employee should make the request to their supervisor.
- When a Student Involvement staff member is sick, they should contact their supervisor via phone or text and email the staff team to let them know they will not be in. In addition, they should set up an out of office notification on their email. For full-time staff, when they return from sick leave, they should fill out a WSU Leave and Overtime Request Form and turn in to their direct supervisor.

Policy 15: Student/Staff Relations

While in a work situation, full-time staff members should maintain professional conduct in the representation of Student Involvement and Wichita State University. Staff should avoid inviting solitary students to private areas such as their homes and from consuming and/or providing alcohol or illegal/illicit drugs while working or supervising students in any capacity.

At events sponsored by Wichita State student organizations or groups, Student Involvement staff shall not partake in alcoholic beverages. It is recommended that staff members attending events with alcohol do so with another WSU staff person.

Policy 16: Tornado Warning

If there is a tornado warning, anyone in the Student Involvement office must either exit the office and go to the Shocker Sports Grill and Lanes or exit the building. It is an individual's choice to not seek shelter, but if they are not going to follow procedure, they must leave the Rhatigan Student Center.

If there is a tornado warning at an event or after hours, seek the closest, open tornado shelter. If the event is in the CAC Theater, individuals must seek shelter under the stage, in the Shocker Sports Grill and Lanes or exit the Theater.

Policy 17: Visitation

Student Workers

- Visitation/Communication
 - Family and friends should not visit work unless allowed by a supervisor.
 - If by chance a family member or friend does visit, keep the visit brief.
 - No personal communication should be used on office equipment without the permission of the supervisor. Communication includes:
 - Phone calls
 - Online chatting
 - Email
 - Faxes

- Facebook/Social Media
- Work/Homework
 - Personal work/homework while working is not permitted unless allowed by a supervisor. This includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - Studying and/or homework
 - Work related to an outside job, student organization, or volunteer group.
- Personal Property
 - Use of any device unrelated to your job should be approved by your supervisor.
 - Personal belongings should be kept secure.
 - Cell phone use is not permitted unless allowed by a supervisor.
 - Headphones are not permitted with any device without the approval of your supervisor.

Policy 18: Weapons

Purpose: It is the policy of the Kansas Board of Regents (hereinafter referred to as Board), to the extent permitted by law, to allow concealed carry of handguns and prohibit possession of other weapons and open carry of firearms on the University campus. This sets forth Wichita State University (hereinafter referred to as University) policy regarding the presence of weapons on University property.

Preamble: In view of the enactment of the Kansas Personal and Family Protection Act, subsequent amendments and Board policy, the Board has directed each state University to develop and follow policies and procedures for the safe possession and storage of lawfully possessed handguns and determine whether and to what extent otherwise lawfully possessed concealed handguns will be prohibited in any university buildings or areas of buildings.

Policy Statement:

- A. Beginning July 1, 2017, any individual who is 21 years of age or older and who is lawfully eligible to carry a concealed handgun in Kansas shall not be precluded from doing so on the Wichita State University campus except in buildings and public areas of buildings for which adequate security measures are provided, as restricted in this policy or Kansas Board of Regent's policy, and except as otherwise prohibited by law.
- B. There are no University buildings that have been designated as gun-free with permanent adequate security measures. The University may designate a specific location as temporarily gun-free, with appropriate signage, and use temporary adequate security measures after submission and approval by the Governance Committee of the Board. Appropriate notice will be given whenever this temporary designation is made.
- C. Each individual who lawfully possesses a handgun on campus shall be wholly and solely responsible for carrying, storing and using that handgun in a safe manner and in accordance with the law, Board policy and University policy. Nothing in this policy shall be interpreted to require individuals who lawfully possess a handgun to use it in defense of others.
- D. Possession of weapons, other than concealed handguns, anywhere on any campus location shall be prohibited. This includes the open carry of any weapon, including a handgun or handguns. Every entrance to each building and facility at any campus location shall be conspicuously posted with

appropriate signs indicating that openly carrying a weapon into that building or facility is prohibited. Additional signs may be posted as appropriate.

Definitions:

1. Weapons, firearms, explosives and other hazardous objects or substances covered by this policy shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
 - a. Any object or device which will, is designed to, or may be readily converted to expel bullet, shot or shell by the action of an explosive or other propellant;
 - b. any handgun, pistol, revolver, rifle, shotgun or other firearm of any nature, including those that are concealed or openly carried;
 - c. any BB gun, pellet gun, air/C’02 gun, blow gun, or any device, such as a Taser, which is designed to discharge electric darts or other similar projectiles; however, personal self-defense stun guns that do not fit with the preceding definition shall not be deemed to be a weapon for the purposes of this policy;
 - d. any explosive, incendiary or poison gas (A) bomb, (B) mine, (C) grenade, (D) rocket having a propellant charge of more than four ounces, or (E) missile having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than ¼ ounce;
 - e. any incendiary or explosive material, liquid, solid or mixture equipped with a fuse, wick or other detonating device;
 - f. any tear gas bomb or smoke bomb; however, personal self-defense items containing mace or pepper spray shall not be deemed to be a weapon for the purposes of this policy;
 - g. any knife, commonly referred to as a switch-blade, which has a blade that opens automatically by hand pressure applied to a button, spring or other device in the handle of gravity or by an outward, downward or centrifugal thrust or movement;
 - h. any straight-blade knife of four inches or more such as a dagger, dirk, dangerous knife or stiletto; except that an ordinary pocket knife or culinary knife designed for and used solely in the preparation or service of food shall not be construed to be a weapon for the purposes of this policy;
 - i. any martial arts weapon such as nunchucks or throwing stars;
 - j. any longbow, crossbow and arrows or other projectile that could cause serious harm to any person; or
 - k. any other dangerous or deadly weapon or instrument of like character.
2. The term “handgun” means:
 - a. A pistol or revolver which is designed to be fired by the use of a single hand and which is designed to fire or capable of firing fixed cartridge ammunition; or
 - b. any other weapon which will or is designed to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive and which is designed to be fired by the use of a single hand.
3. The term “firearm” includes any handgun, rifle, shotgun, and any other weapon which will or is designed to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive.
4. The phrase “adequate security measures” means the use of electronic equipment and armed personnel at public entrances to detect and restrict the carrying of any weapons into the University building, or any public area thereof, including, but not limited to, metal detectors, metal detector wands or any other equipment used for similar purposes to ensure that weapons are not permitted

to be carried into such building or public area by members of the public. Adequate security measures for storing and securing lawfully carried weapons, including, but not limited to, the use of gun lockers or other similar storage options may be provided at public entrances.

5. "Public area" means any portion of a University building that is open to and accessible by the public or which is otherwise designated as a public area by the board.
6. "Concealed" means completely hidden from view and does not reveal the weapon in any way, shape, or form.
7. "Approved storage device" should (a) be of a sufficient size to fully enclose the handgun while secured in an approved holster, (b) constructed of sturdy materials that are nonflammable, (c) have a combination, digital or other secure locking device that can only be unlocked by the individual using the storage device but devices secured exclusively with a key lock are prohibited, and (d) constructed specifically for the storage of a handgun and/or ammunition.

Procedures:

8. Individuals lawfully possessing a handgun, pursuant to this policy, should always keep it completely concealed on or about their person, maintain it within their immediate control and custody and not brandish or intentionally display the handgun except when lawfully using the handgun in self-defense or when to transfer to safe storage. This allows individuals to carry a handgun if it can be carried securely in a briefcase, backpack, purse, handbag or other similar personal carrier designed and intended for the carrying of an individual's personal items so long it is within the exclusive and uninterrupted control of the individual. This includes wearing the carrier with one or more straps consistent with the carrier's design, carrying or holding the carrier, or placing the carrier next to, or within the immediate reach of, the individual at all times.
9. Any employee, who is legally qualified, shall not be prohibited from carrying any concealed handgun while performing work for the University, including while in a means of conveyance, except in a campus building that has adequate security measures at all public access entrances to ensure that no weapons are permitted to be carried into such building and the building is conspicuously posted.
10. Weapons other than concealed handguns, as defined and allowed above, are not permitted on University property unless in the possession of a law enforcement officer, armored car security personnel, or private security pre-approved by the Chief of the University Police Department.
11. For the purposes of this policy, the term weapons would not include items or materials used in or necessary for the conduct of Board-approved academic programs or University-approved activities or practices. However, the University's Chief of Police should be notified about any such items or materials in advance of their use or presence on campus and mandate specific requirements for the possession, use and storage of such items or materials, including notification of other necessary University personnel.
12. Handguns carried by individuals, whether on their person or in a carrier, must be secured in a holster that completely covers the trigger and the entire trigger guard area and that secures an external hammer in an un-cocked position through the use of a strap or by other means. Handguns with an external safety must be carried with the safety in the "on" position. The holster must have sufficient tension or grip on the handgun to retain it in the holster even when subjected to

unexpected jostling. Semiautomatic handguns must be carried without a chambered round of ammunition. Revolvers must be carried with the hammer resting on an empty cylinder.

13. The concealed carry of a handgun by 1) an individual who is legally qualified to have a handgun and who has been screened in accordance with K.S.A. 75-7c20(d), 2) an employee who is legally qualified to have a handgun, and 3) those individuals identified in paragraph 10, above, is allowed while the individual is located in non-public areas within University buildings that have restricted access entrances that require a key, key card, code, or similar device to ensure only authorized individuals are allowed into those areas. The concealed carry of a handgun by any other individual in such non-public area is prohibited. Non-public areas within University buildings must be specifically approved by the President of the University, or the President's designee, after consultation with the University Chief of Police and the University General Counsel. Each restricted access entrance where concealed carry is prohibited as provided in this paragraph shall be conspicuously posted with appropriate signs indicating that carrying a concealed handgun into that non-public area is prohibited. The signage should be in accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the Kansas Attorney General as described in K.S.A. 75-7c10.
14. The University Police Department should be notified of a suspected violation of this policy by telephone, electronic mail, in person or in writing. Within a reasonable period of time after receiving such notification, the University Police Department shall investigate the matter and report its factual findings to Human Resources if any employee is involved or the Office of Student Conduct and Community Standards (hereinafter referred to as Student Conduct) if a student is involved. If it is a visitor, the University Police Department shall have the authority to handle the situation as deemed appropriate. Upon receipt of the factual findings, Human Resources or Student Conduct may conduct an independent investigation to determine if a policy violation has occurred. Any employee or student of the university who violates one or more provisions of this policy shall be subject to discipline in accordance with applicable university codes of conduct. Any individual who violates one or more provisions of this policy may be issued a lawful directive to leave campus with the weapon immediately. Any individual who violates the directive shall be considered to be in trespass and may be cited accordingly. Any individual who violates state or federal law may be detained, arrested or otherwise subjected to lawful processes appropriate to the circumstances.
15. Nothing in this policy is intended to replace municipal, state or federal law regarding weapons, firearms, explosives and other hazardous objects or substances or to be inconsistent with the authority afforded a lawfully commissioned peace officer.
16. This policy is intended to apply and cover any building or grounds owned by the university or the Board and any building or grounds leased by the university or the Board for university use and located within the State of Kansas. Buildings and land owned by or both owned by and leased to third parties that otherwise might be located on ground owned by the University are not included. This policy may not be applicable on all locations leased by the University if the University is not the sole tenant of the leased property. Leased locations leased and controlled by an entity that may lawfully exclude or permit firearms at their premises (concealed or otherwise) may choose at their sole discretion to exclude or permit concealed firearms from their premises, notwithstanding a lease with the University so long as the University is not the sole tenant on the leased property.

17. All University students and employees will be notified concerning this policy prior to the effective date of the policy. This notification will include learning when this policy applies, the availability of any known local or regional firearm safety instruction, how a handgun is carried and stored pursuant to this policy, how to report a suspected violation of this policy, who investigates reports, the potential consequences upon confirmation the policy has been violated and other topics relevant to this policy.

Student Involvement

If a weapon is spotted on campus, contact the WSU Police immediately and then let a WSU Staff member know immediately. Do not approach the individual suspected of having a weapon. If you find a weapon on campus, do not touch it. Call WSU Police if the weapon is found outside the RSC and CAC Theater.

Shooter Procedure

If there is a shooter on campus and you are in a classroom or office, close and lock or bar the door and turn off all the lights. Turn all phones on silent and call for help. Stay out of view and wait for help. Make sure to spread out across the room and not remain in a clump. If there is a shooter on campus and you are outside and can run away, do so in a zig-zag pattern and seek shelter.

If you are on campus and are aware of the shooter's location, you should evacuate if you are not near the shooter and will not be putting yourself in harm's way. Unless asked, do not approach the police to assist in handling the shooter.

Policy 19: Travel

Any time Student Involvement staff must travel for state-related business or sponsors a trip outside the Wichita metropolitan area, the following procedures must be followed:

- For staff members, a Request for Out-of-State Travel form with estimated costs must be filled out and turned in to the Office Manager at least four weeks in advance. It is to be noted additional paperwork is needed for the reduced stipend. An itinerary or schedule of events should be emailed to the Office Manager. After this information is entered into the Travel and Expense Management System, the system will generate a Travel Authorization with a TA number assigned. The Travel Authorization will be automatically forwarded to the traveler for review and electronic submission to the Budget Officer the TA number will be used to make any travel reservations provided to the Vice President for Student Affairs office for conference registration fees.
- If the Student Affairs registration card is used, the form must be filled out by the staff member and provided to the Vice President for Student Affairs office, along with a copy of the itinerary/agenda/schedule of events. A copy of the documents should be made for the Office Manager. If a staff member charges the cost to a personal credit card, they will not be reimbursed until after the conference.
- Within three days of returning from a trip, all receipts must be turned into the Office Manager. Receipts smaller than 8.5 x 11 should be taped down to a sheet of paper, and all receipts should be in "portrait" layout (versus landscape). The information provided will be entered into the Travel and Expense Management System for any necessary reimbursement to the staff member. After the

information is entered, the system will generate a Travel Reimbursement, which will be automatically forwarded to the traveler for review and electronic submission to the Budget Officer. In addition, the SI Travel Expense form must also be filled out and saved to the SI Share Drive.

- For students traveling, the Participant Agreement, Emergency Contact, Medical Form and if they are to be reimbursed a W9, must be filled out for each participant. A WSU University-Sanctioned Student Travel Registration Form should be completed at least one week prior to the date of departure and provided to the Vice President for Student Affairs office and the Student Involvement Office Manager. The online registration information can be submitted with an updated list provided later of checked in participants. A copy of each Student Involvement Emergency Contact form needs to be turned into Office Manager at least one business day before departure. It is recommended to have one staff member for each 20 participants.
- If transportation is provided by an outside company, a copy of the company's Certificate of Liability Insurance must be obtained and Wichita State University needs to be listed as the Certificate Holder.

Policy 20: Sidewalk Chalking Guidelines

Recognized student organizations and campus departments are permitted to chalk on University sidewalks in order to publicize a University event they are sponsoring, a component of the event to promote student participation or to market the sponsoring group or organization. For chalking on campus, the following guidelines have been established:

1. Student organizations and campus departments MUST obtain approval from Student Involvement prior to chalking.
2. Only water-soluble dry stick sidewalk chalk may be used. Aerosol spray chalk is not permitted. If the University must clean any permanent materials used, the group responsible will be billed for the cost of removal.
3. Chalk advertisements may be no larger than 8 feet by 8 feet, and each organization /department is allowed a maximum of six (6) chalking squares on campus at a time.
4. Chalking is only allowed on the main campus (including the Hughes Metropolitan Complex).
5. Chalking is permitted on horizontal, paved/concrete, uncovered campus sidewalks. Chalking is not permitted on covered sidewalks, stairways, curbs, or stair risers, on brick surfaces, parking lots, buildings, windows, benches, planters, trash containers, signs, pillars, light poles, trees, any other vertical surfaces, or anything other than the paved/concrete, uncovered sidewalks mentioned above.
6. Chalking must be at least twenty (20) feet from the entrance of a building.
7. All chalk advertising MUST clearly identify the sponsoring organization's name.
8. Chalking may not be used for commercial purposes by non-university groups, including advertising or other promotion.
9. Chalking must adhere to WSU Policy 11.10 and the Student Code of Conduct. Chalking cannot contain any obscene, derogatory or defamatory words or images, threaten physical harm or include messages that otherwise are not entitled to the protection of free expression.
10. All other chalking is subject to immediate removal and the individuals or groups responsible may be charged the cost of cleanup.
11. Overwriting, erasing, defacing, altering or removing the chalking of another organization is prohibited except by University personnel.

12. The University may remove, without notice, any chalked messages that do not comply with University policies and regulations.
13. Student organizations which violate these chalking guidelines will be referred to Student Conduct and Community Standards.

Policy 21: Yard Sign Guidelines

Recognized student organizations and campus departments are permitted to post yard signs on the property of the University in order to publicize an event they are sponsoring, a component of the event to promote student participation or to market the sponsoring group or organization. "Yard Sign" refers to a temporary sign placed in the ground in an outdoor space. For posting yard signs, the following guidelines have been established:

1. Recognized student organizations and campus departments MUST obtain approval from Student Involvement prior to posting yard signs.
2. Reservations must be made at least one month in advance of the time the group wishes to set up their signs by completing the Yard Sign Agreement and returning it to Student Involvement.
3. Sign panels may be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches, must be placed in metal "H" stands, and may contain content on both sides.
4. All wording on signs must be written in and/or have a translation in the English language.
5. All yard signs MUST clearly identify the sponsoring organization's name.
6. Signs may not be placed within five feet of trees, flower beds, fire hydrants or impede the flow of traffic.
7. All signs must be placed at least five (5) feet apart and at least three (3) feet from the edge of sidewalks.
8. Yard signs are only allowed on the main campus (including the Hughes Metropolitan Complex).
9. Up to ten (10) signs are permitted per event, per organization.
10. Reservations to use signs must be made one month in advance of anticipated placement. Signs may be left in place for a two (2) week period and must be removed by the end of the reservation date.
11. If weather conditions destroy or damage a sign, the sponsoring organization must remove it.
12. Yard signs may not be used for commercial purposes by non-university groups, including advertising or other promotion.
13. Signs must adhere to WSU Policy 11.10 and the Student Code of Conduct. Signs may not contain any obscene, derogatory or defamatory words or images, threaten physical harm or include messages that otherwise are not entitled to the protection of free expression.
14. The University may remove, without notice, any signs that do not comply with University policies and regulations.
15. Signs placed in compliance with these guidelines cannot be removed or relocated without prior permission from the sponsoring organization unless done so by University personnel.
16. Student organizations which violate these yard sign guidelines will be referred to Student Conduct and Community Standards.
17. Wichita State University and Student Involvement are not responsible for lost and/or stolen yard signs. Lost or stolen yard signs can be reported to WSU PD.

Policy 22: Compensatory Time Accrual Guidelines

PURPOSE

These guidelines will serve both classified and unclassified Student Involvement staff regarding procedures they should follow for timekeeping and leave-related matters.

TIMEKEEPING

All employees, regardless of exempt (salaried) or non-exempt (hourly) status, are expected to complete and submit actual timesheets (Exception Reporting or WSU In-Out Positive Time Reporting) to their supervisor for approval and signature, then to the designated timekeeping data entry staff member by the prescribed bi-weekly deadline. An Exception Reporting form should be signed and submitted even when leave is not used during that pay period. It is expected that employees will be truthful and forthcoming concerning time worked on their timesheet. It is the responsibility of the employee to ensure that time reporting is accurate and that leave time is used appropriately. All Exception Reporting forms submitted with leave should include in the Comments section the following statement: "Timekeeper has my permission to adjust my time."

STUDENT INVOLEMENT GUIDELINES FOR EXEMPT (SALARIED) EMPLOYEES

Exempt (salaried) employees cannot use fewer than four hours of any type of leave at any given time. Exempt employees should receive approval from their supervisor for all leave requests.

STUDENT INVOLVEMENT GUIDELINES FOR NON-EXEMPT (HOURLY) EMPLOYEES

For unclassified staff, Section 6.06 of the WSU Procedures and Policies Manual applies. For university support staff, Section 7.09 of the WSU Policies and Procedures Manual applies. In summary, hourly (full-time nonexempt university support staff and nonexempt unclassified) staff are expected to work 40 hours per week and adhere to these practices. Regular work hours for hourly employees are 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday-Friday.

- Employees are expected to record their time worked honestly and accurately. Employees must track their time in 15-minute intervals. Please refer to the WSU Positive In-Out Time Reporting sheet for guidelines on recording time in and time out.
- Any time worked beyond 40 hours per week should be accounted for on the employee's timesheet as compensatory time.
- Extra time beyond 40 hours per week (e.g., compensatory time) is credited at 1.5 hours for each extra hour worked.
- For an employee to earn compensatory time, the employee must physically work at least 40 hours in that week. In other words, any sick, vacation or other non-working hours incurred in the same week will not count towards working 40 hours for a given week.
- If an employee physically works less than 40 hours in a week, hours will be accrued on a straight time basis.
- For each eight-hour day worked, employees can take a 30 minute to 1.5-hour lunch. Exceptions to the length of lunch can be made when lunch time is used for Extra time hours (E-hours). Lunches should be taken between 11a.m.-2 p.m. Employees should work with their supervisor to schedule this time accordingly so that the office can be adequately covered during normal business hours.

- For university support staff, a maximum of 120 hours of accrued compensatory time can be carried forward for a period not to exceed twelve months (see Section 7.09 of WSU Policies and Procedures Manual). For unclassified staff, a maximum of 120 hours of accrued compensatory time can be carried forward for a period not to exceed twelve months (see Section 6.08 of WSU Policies and Procedures Manual).
- Any hours worked beyond 40 hours per week must be approved in advance in writing by their supervisor. In other words, employees cannot simply plan to work more than 40 hours to earn compensatory time at their own discretion, without any prior authorization from their supervisor.
- Their supervisor reserves the right to adjust work schedules and possibly enforce mandated leave in order to ensure utilization of compensatory time.
- Running errands, responding to text messages, social media and email outside of established work hours is not acceptable. Exceptions are in emergency situations. If an emergency situation occurs, their supervisor should be notified.
- Employees are expected to report in to the office at the start of their work day. An exception to this is if the employee is out of town on work sponsored travel.
- Staff should keep in mind the following:
 - o E-hours are to be utilized to meet the needs of the employee's position, the department and the constituents they serve.
 - o E-hours should be utilized during the same week they are earned, when possible. For example, if employee X works an E-hour on Monday, they should work with their supervisor to find a time in their schedule in the same week to work one-hour fewer. Adjustments are to be made in the following order: day of, days preceding E-hour day and days after E-hour day, but within the same work week.
 - o When adjustments to the regular work schedule are needed, employees should keep in mind what schedule best meets the needs of the students, staff, department and other entities they are serving.
 - o Official work-related travel which occurs during regular work hours is considered compensable work time. An exception is traveling to and from an airport terminal or train station, which is not considered hours worked. Time spent waiting at a terminal until arrival at the destination is considered hours worked. Travel while a passenger in a vehicle is not considered work time, but if driving the vehicle, it is considered work time.
 - o Travel outside the Wichita metro area for work must be approved in writing by their supervisor at least a month in advance. An itinerary of the conference/retreat/etc. must be submitted and reviewed with their supervisor at least two weeks in advance of the trip.
 - o Conducting official business over a meal-time is work time. Meals for social occasions and during retreats/conferences/traveling/etc. are not considered work time unless the meal has a featured speaker.
 - o During retreats and conferences, time spent in educational programs is considered work time. Time spent in social endeavors and non-educational components are not considered to be work time.

- Conducting business or volunteering outside the scope of the employee's job responsibilities or responsibilities of the department is not considered work time. Exceptions can be made with the approval of their supervisor.
- The nature of unclassified positions is that some of the required work cannot be done during a typical 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. workday. What is critical to note is that full-time employees are expected to work 40 hours per week, be on time for work and work the schedule they have outlined in their proposed work schedule.

- These guidelines are in no way meant to be exhaustive and may be modified or added to at any time.

Policy 23: Educational Release

[WSU Policy 3.13 / Benefits Applicable to Eligible University Employees](#)

Section: Leave Types

Part d. Education Release Time

The release of an employee to attend University classes during regular work hours is subject to the requirements of the employee's department. Release time may be granted to regular and probationary employees (full-time or part-time) to take one course per semester. Makeup time is not required for academic classes related to job duties or as preparation for promotion within the University. Release time for classes unrelated to the employee's job or performance must be unpaid, made up or charged to vacation leave with supervisor's approval.

Student Involvement Policy

Before registering for any courses during regular work hours*, the employee should have a conversation with their supervisor to discuss the goals of the course/degree program, relation to the employee's goals, personal development and connection to their position. Any class taken during regular work hours needs to be approved in advance by the employee's supervisor. If there are multiple course offerings, preference should be given to courses which fall outside the employee's regular work hours.

Staff members may be granted flex time up to five hours a week (no more than four hours for one day per week) to attend a course related to their job responsibilities or degree completion. These hours cannot be accumulated over time. The regular work hours missed by attending class must be made up and the employee should work with their supervisor to develop a plan to make up these hours. Any time above five hours a week or four hours in one day, the employee will have to take vacation or unpaid leave. If for some reason the class is cancelled in advance the staff member should report to work and will not have to make up that time for class. If an employee is taking a class not related to their job responsibilities or degree completion, they will have to take vacation or unpaid leave. Employees must report in written format to their supervisor whether they passed or failed each course. If an employee does not receive a passing grade the employee should have a conversation with their supervisor about maintaining educational release status in future semesters.

When taking a class during the regular work day, the job responsibilities of the employee outweigh class obligations. If an employee is required to be at or attend to an aspect of their job, which conflicts with class

time, the employee should comply with the needs of the department. If a major class obligation conflicts with a required or vital work obligation the employee should have a conversation with their supervisor. The employee should be cognizant that class work/projects should not be done during regular work hours.

Educational release is not guaranteed and the employee's supervisor and/or the director can choose not to grant educational release time for the employee.

** Regular work hours are what is defined in the employee's position description.*
